**France Ends Ration Decade**

Moralists Say Period Has Hurt Integrity of Honest Citizens

 Paris—(AP)—The coffee coupon has at last disappeared from the French scene of life, wiping out the final trace of 10 years of food dictatorship.

The passing of a decade of rationing was scarcely noticed by the average Frenchman. The monthly four-ounce allotment of coffee per person was so inadequate that only the "economic" class bothered with it in the last year of rationing, when coffee was abundant on the black market.

Nevertheless, the 10 years brought about a radical change in living for the French. Moralists consider rationing impaired the integrity of every honest citizen, and they wonder how long it will take Frenchmen to forget the large amounts of food which they had to buy on the black market, and the changes and general trickery which rationing imposed on the most straightforward citizen if he wanted sufficient food, clothing and fuel.

### Marshall Plan Misses Italy's Little People

#### Italian-American Affairs Speaker Criticizes Funding of U. S. Aid to Industries

The Marshall Plan, as it has been called, has not yet fully reached the Italian people from a "hole" of the latter of two weeks. Alessandro Chiostergi, of White Plains, told 250 members and guests of the first annual banquet of the Italian-American Society, Inc., at the Italian-American club on Ederidge street yesterday.

Other speakers on the program included General Manager George H. Waddell, Judge Wesley Gryn, Senator Charles S. House, Attorney George C. Leonard, Congressman Anton Sadiak, Aldo Pagani, Chas. Herman Schendel, and Emelio Bialotto, of Stamford Springs, president of the Italian Alliance club of North America. James Trivigno was toastmaster. Catering was by Arnold Pagani and George Freeman.

The remarks of Attorney Chiostergi, who recently returned from a first hand survey of conditions in Italy, follow:

The constant threat of communism, the plague which had hovered over Italy in 1946 like a gruesome specter, had by no means subsided in 1948. On the contrary, it is still rampant on the peninsula to an extent unknown before.

Although its manifestations are hardly obvious to the casual observer, its influence is dangerously lurking in the background, overshadowing every sphere of private and public life.

The fact that the majority of the people in the last Italian election, cast their votes for the present government, can be attributed not to their sympathy toward the regime or its policies, but to the conditions, but represent merely, as Italians will tell you with utmost frankness, the choice of the lesser of two evils.

"Our Marshall Plan is supposed to offer Western Europe an alleviation from post-war misery, a refuge from dictatorial autocracies, a return to normalcy and sound economic conditions. There is no doubt in my mind that its original intentions are good and commendable. E. R. P.'s machinery could obtain the most remarkable effect by setting the right tools into the right spots—with the aim of achieving the results Europe is desperately yearning for, the results we ourselves are striving after for the good of our own economy.

"I have studied the present-day effects of the Marshall Plan in Italy very thoroughly. It seems to me that its main lapse in that country, badly impoverished country, lied in its oversteering of Italian industrialism, which, so far, it has not undertaken to ascertain the reason why the broad masses are brooding in its deplorable conditions. A more intensive research to discover and uncover the real cause of the proletariat's misery would lead to vastly more effective remedies.

Pulsant Contrast "While the proletariat's life is

to Devere" (dealing with distribution of unutilized land) and subsequently the "Legal Decree" (dealing with distribution of poorly cultivated land) have failed miserably as the present "Riforma Agraria" now under way is bound to fail because of total lack of technical advice, housing, and transportation facilities which would accompany a distribution of land often far remote from any town or village.

"Lending more effective assistance to rural districts, instead of overfeeding industrialism, would most beneficially influence the welfare of those 48 millions crowded in the small space of the peninsula. Also here, a closer co-operation between E. R. P. and the government would achieve visible results.

"Last but not least I am inclined to touch one of the very important issues of E. R. P.'s registration in Europe. Although there can be no doubt that our American Marshall Plan officials are highly skilled persons with a profound knowledge of the many problems involved, I cannot help wondering how many of them are absolute knowledges of this special foreign mentality.

A thorough knowledge of each respective country's language, its mentality, its particular economic conditions, its customs, and so forth is essential in tackling the problems to the advantage and to the advantage of our own foreign policy and of the world economy which cries for recovery."

**Do They Want Recognition?**

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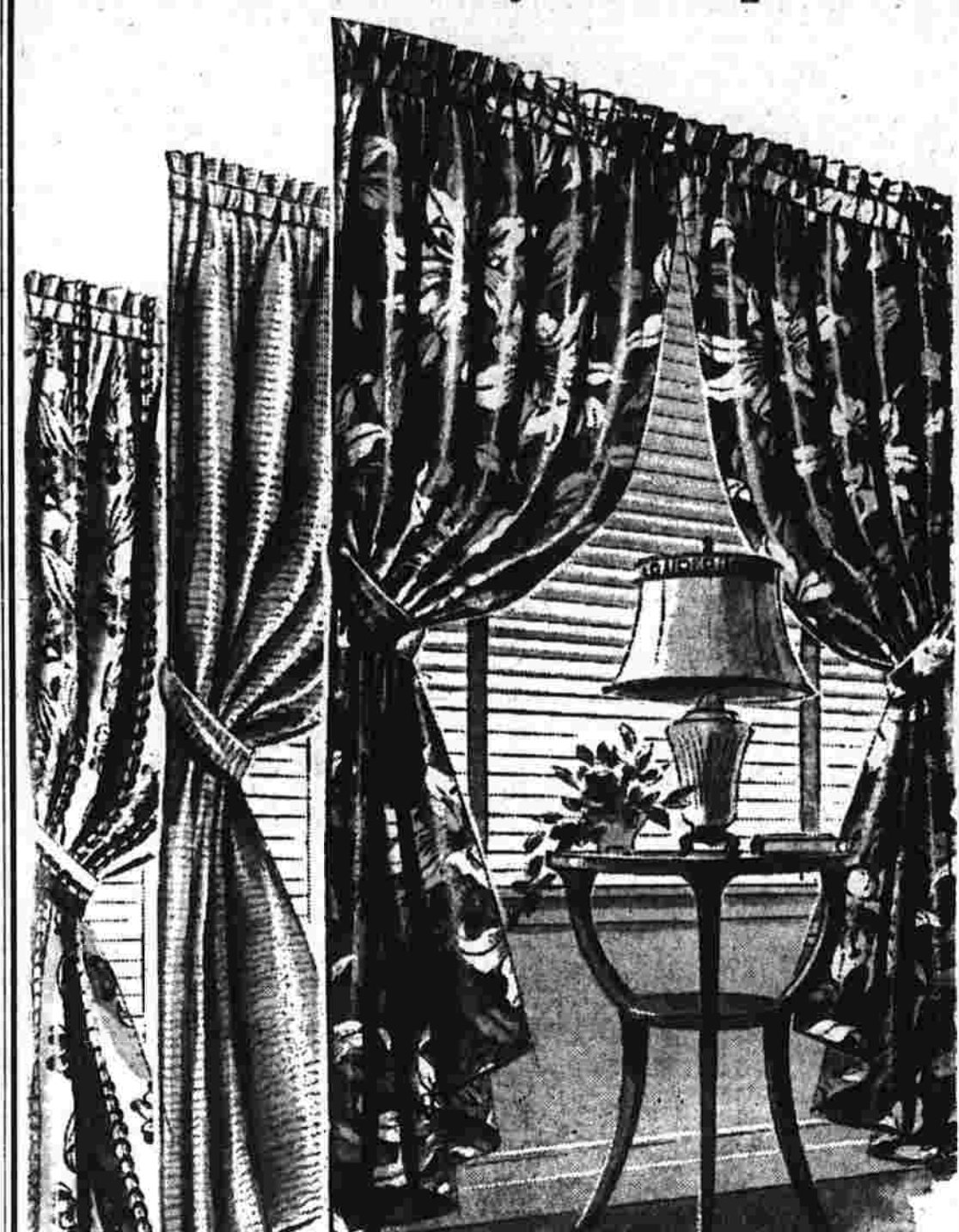
