made—be dismissed at all. It will not be dismissed for two reasons. First, it proposes not merely a revival of that moribund hope of a real foreign policy which President Truman has captured the imagination of the Republican party in the past, but a new creation of a real foreign policy, in which Republicans would be consulted before the deed, instead of after it.

Second, by inference at least, Mr. Stassen's proposal includes an amendment to the existing United States position, as expressed by President Truman. Those who believe it is quite as important for the United States to determine what it will do in any "Mid-Century Conference" as it is for Russia to appear in a more reasonable mood, will welcome Mr. Stassen's inferential willingness to amend the Russian plan.

Mr. Stassen stressed international control and adequate inspection, but neglected to list international ownership of the main atom-bombing block located between the Russians and the British Plan. It may not be the only stumbling block, but even if it is eliminated, there may be some other factor of the Russian Plan which the Russians will still refuse to accept.

Nonetheless, the American attitude has urged that actual international ownership be discarded as a hard and fast British Plan requirement. And it would be making a new fresh effort at international agreement until we shift our position on this point.

One of the most prominent Americans who have now recommended that we should break up the pattern of world destruction existing at the present time, should, directly or inferentially, some departure from existing American policy.

CHICKENPOX STILL MOST PREVALENT
 Hartford, Feb. 21.—(AP)—The incidence of chickenpox is dropping, but it still remains Connecticut's most prevalent disease, as it has since before the first of the year. There were 202 new chickenpox cases last week, the State Health department said today, compared with 278 new cases the week before.

Declines also were reported in measles, mumps and diphtheria. Measles dropping from 67 to 47, mumps from 108 to 74, and diphtheria from 25 to 14. German measles from 12 to 11, bronchitis pneumonia from 48 to 31, and infantile paralysis from one to none.

Increase in new cases of disease included: Tuberculosis from 24 to 29; scarlet fever from 25 to 32; gonorrhea from four to 10; streptococcus throat from eight to 13; mumps from 107 to 112; and meningococcal meningitis from two to three.

Connecticut has had no cases of diphtheria for five years and none of typhoid fever for 18 weeks.

UP TO LIFE Term Urged
 Hartford, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Legislation that would continue all convicted psychopathic sex offenders up to a life term has been proposed by a subcommittee of the State Legislative council.

The proposed law calls for the examination by two psychiatrists of all persons convicted of specific sex crimes and the confinement in an institution other than prison for all persons found to be "aggressive sexual deviates" (unable to curb abnormal sex impulses).

Present Connecticut law provides for the imprisonment of such persons. Many Superior court judges frequently have deplored from the fact that they are prevented by law from imposing terms in mental institutions rather than the state prison at Waterbury.

Psychiatric Examinations Proposed
 The new law also proposes that examinations be made every two years of persons sentenced. Their release is provided for if they are found to be sane and to have no tendency to relapse.

State Police Capt. Paul Lavin told a subcommittee hearing yesterday that sex crimes have increased about 60 per cent in Connecticut in recent years. He said it was "discouraging" to state and local police, under current state law, to arrest a person for a sex offense, obtain a conviction in court and then find the same person on the streets ready to commit another such crime "after a short time."

Speakers for welfare, prison and other police groups also testified at the hearing in support of the proposed measure.

These were the specific sex crimes listed in the proposal: Indecent assault, bestiality, sodomy, seduction of a minor or child, adultery, and incest. They also listed a minor female child, distribution of obscene literature or pictures, indecent exposure, attempt to carnally know a feebleminded female of any age under 16.
