Although scarlet fever has come to Manchester about two months earlier this year, the incidence and number of cases is actually less than has been true in other years. Dr. Robert R. Keeney, Jr., town health officer, said today.

"The sickness usually crops up in March, he said, but the first case was notified here in January this year. About twelve cases have been reported since then, he said.
