Candia, N. H., March 10.—(AP)—Dr. Hermann N. Sander, acquitted of murder in the death of a cancer-riddled patient, still faces a hearing before the State Board of Registration in medicine.

Time to "Rest Up" Allowed The board secretary said he will contact members of the group at once and that Dr. Sander will be allowed a reasonable time "rest up" before he is called.

The House of Delegates of the New Hampshire Medical society, which generally make recommendations to the board, plans to meet Sunday afternoon in Concord.

Dr. Wheeler pointed out, however, that it is his board that has authority to grant or revoke licenses to practice medicine.

He said the board requested Dr. Sander to appear before it in January—just after his indictment—but the physician requested postponement until after the trial.

Duane County Sheriff John W. Lynch and Deputy William Hartline were acquitted on two charges of a three-point indictment—general conspiracy and intimidation of Mrs. Mamie Gray.

It was at the Gray home at Hooker, Ga., that the seven Negroes were seized by Ku Kluxers last April 2.

The maximum sentence that can be given Lynch and Hartline is one year in prison and a \$1,000 fine.

ACTH To Be Given Child

Scotty Hanson to Get Emergency Treatment With New Drug

New York, March 10—(AP)—Three-year-old Scotty Hanson, slowly dying from leukemia, arrived in New York by air from Minnesota this morning for emergency treatment with the new drug ACTH.

He came through the help of Senator Hubert D. Minn., who asked New York's Memorial hospital to admit him. Young Couple Found Guilty

Convicted of Stealing Immigrant's Savings After His Kindly Act

Reading, Pa. March 10—(AP)—A Berks county court judge gave a middle-aged immigrant a chance yesterday to suggest punishment for a young couple convicted of stealing his life's savings after he befriended them.

But the 53-year-old Italian immigrant, Ignazio Lachino, was overwhelmed by grief at the "sea" of his savings and could only ask the court to get back his money.

"I said he had saved it over many years to bring his wife and two children to this country," Assistant District Attorney Leonard Yoder told the court that Lachino last October found Lawrence Plastino, 23, and his bride, 19-year-old wife, Jean, penniless and without shelter. Plastino is a former resident of Columbia, Pa., and his wife formerly lived at York, Pa.

Savings Found in Trunk Yoder said Lachino invited the young couple into his rooming house quarters to sleep. The next morning, the attorney said, when Lachino left for his laborer's job, the Plastinos found his savings of \$4,211 in a trunk and took the money.

As Lachino could not overcome his grief to suggest punishment, Judge H. Robert Mason sentenced Plastino to 2 1/2 to five years in Berks county prison and sentenced his wife to an indeterminate term in the State Home for Women at Muncy.

None of the \$4,211, which represented Lachino's savings, has been recovered.
