sphere of influence and domination has acquired since the war. Are we willing to give up the Baltic states, on Poland, on Czechoslovakia, on Rumania, on Hungary, on Bulgaria, on China? Any agreement to end the cold war would not mention these states by name. Yet if we agreed to live in peace with Russia, we would actually be ratifying Russia's varying degrees of domination these countries.

It is true enough that in all our formal definitions of our own cold war aims, we have pronounced ourselves in favor of halting the further expansion of Russia. We have never said we intended to push Russia back. Therefore, by implication, we have said that we might be satisfied if we did succeed in "containing" Russia within its present sphere of domination. But we haven't really made up our mind either in our State Department, or in our popular thought, to abandon the cold war. We should make up our mind to do it. Should we go ahead in abandoning the cold war, peace and should all other considerations of the Russian satellite victims from our policy and in this country have opened the possibility that there could now be some agreement for an ending of at least the surface activities of the cold war.

Advocates of the cold war in Russia have, for some six weeks past, been calling for a more positive American diplomacy. Inside Russia, these American proposals have performed a kind of miracle. They have succeeded in cracking the iron curtain. They have done this by getting publicity for American points of view in the Russian press. They have done this by gaining answers and comments from Russian officials. The debate on peace has moved inside Russia.

It has not done so, of course, without the connivance of Russian leaders. They themselves, for one reason or another, join these Americans in desiring that the time is ripe and ready for an extraordinary discussion of peace. Perhaps one simple reason is that they don't want war, any more than we do. Perhaps they too can see that nobody has anything to gain from an armaments race, or from the war which would climax it. Or perhaps they see the current world situation as one which is ripe for a peace which would amount to a Russian victory in the cold war.

At any rate, the Russians say they are willing to talk, and to re-examine positions. They are giving American positions more attention in their own press and talk. Sometimes they are merely scoring these American positions. But they are debating them publicly, which is of unusual significance.

There is a possibility, therefore, that we may be entering an era in which the more dramatic phases of the cold war can be brought to an end. There is a possibility that we may be able to negotiate an international agreement on atomic weapons which will be satisfactory to both sides. There is a possibility we might make some headway in the business of general disarmament. There is a possibility that Russia may agree to call off its fifth column in western countries, and to enter more respectfully and cooperatively into the world business of the United Nations and its agencies are trying to conduct. There is a possibility Russia may be ready to negotiate peace treaties with Austria and Germany, and to step aside while we arrange a peace treaty with Japan.

All of this, from the surface point of view toward the cold war, would look like the jack-pot. If one has been paying attention only to the obvious drama of the times—the bomb, the dreadnought in Germany, the unpleasantness in the United Nations—one might wish to accept such a bargain. Yet, even if all this is offered, our State Department will hesitate. It will hesitate because there, when all the surface drama of the cold war might seem ready to be eliminated, it would be left face to face with the issue on which it is not yet prepared to surrender, not even in any tacit fashion. It is an issue which does not have to be faced while other differences are kept alive between Russia and ourselves.

It is the issue of whether or not we are willing to concede Russia, not by any express agreement, but inferentially, by the act of making peace with her in order respecting, the retention of

There is a deep, fundamental ideological controversy involved in the report of the State Reorganization Commission. It would make the headlines, for the negative side of the controversy is not popular. Those who oppose the report for the basic reason we are about to outline will take other, and more palatable, reasons for their formal opposition. Their real fear will be that the report would establish too much "democracy" in Connecticut. Their formal argument, however, will be that the report threatens to establish a dictatorship, or take power away from the General Assembly, or from the people.

The ideological division that report provokes in Connecticut is not to be found in the word "democracy" and the word "republic" as we know them. For such people, a weak government, a slow and obstructionist legislature, and a weak executive are actually Connecticut's greatest strengths, and protection against the potentially unwise and unskilled whims of the people as a whole.

A "republic" is a state in which the citizenry resides in the people or a certain portion of the people, and the legislative and administrative powers are lodged in officers elected by and representing the people. The differences between the two theories of government are easily noted. In the republic, more power is delegated from the people to their representatives. Further, and this is what is being debated, the frequent claims that we are intended to be a republic and not a democracy are at all, there is in the definition the phrase "in the people or a certain portion of the people."

Security Seen Abused Word
 Kickenbacker Asserts
 Million Americans Poisoned by Reds

New Haven, March 14.—(AP)—Security is the most abused word in the language today, Capt. Eddie Kickenbacker, famous flier of two World Wars, told the Junior Chamber of Commerce here last night.

"Red" president of Eastern Airlines, Inc., speaking at an "aviation" dinner of the Junior Chamber said that young men should be warned that the word "security" is being used to mean anything for less than any other system in the world.

"Nobody is entitled to anything unless they work for it. I know, however, three places where one can get security for nothing: a prison, an insane asylum and a poor house."

Kickenbacker said there are one million stupid Americans who have had their minds poisoned by 100,000 card-carrying Communists in this country.

"Think of it," he remarked, "people have come from the old world, from slavery, and tyranny, and imposed ideologies, which they themselves came to this country to escape from."

"In this country, he said, you can fail only because you have the opportunity to come back and succeed. That is the greatness of free enterprise."

Kickenbacker said certified airplane have made tremendous strides in 22 years. Up until Nov. 1, 1949, when a Bolivian fighter plane crashed into an Eastern Airlines plane killing 83 persons, Kickenbacker said the industry had gone 15 months without a fatality.

Referring to the plane crash Sunday in Wales when 83 persons lost their lives, Kickenbacker asserted, "nothing does aviation more harm than accidents like these."

He added, however, that as long as we have motion, we'll have accidents.

"Flies are human, they want to continue to live. Management doesn't want to kill anybody. And we are as personnel is concerned, they are going to better a phenomenal record."

In making comparisons, Kickenbacker said miles have looked 10 times as many people to death in one year than the air industry has killed and four times as many murders were committed on Manhattan Island than the industry has killed throughout the entire world.

At the conclusion of his talk, Richard Lee, president of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, presented Kickenbacker with an honorary life membership. An award was given to G. Harold Welch, Jr. by his contributions to aviation in the community during the past year.
