## China Reds Block Evacuation Plans

**Refuse to Allow Two Landing Craft Enter Shanghai Port; American Officials Told To Press for Reconsideration of Decision**

Washington, March 20.—(AP)—The State department said today the Chinese Communists have blocked a mass evacuation of Americans and other foreigners from China by a last minute refusal to let two landing craft into Shanghai.

American officials said the landing craft were to ferry 1,000 Americans and other foreigners from Shanghai to the American Presidential General Gordon—have been ordered to remain at sea. The Gordon was instructed to return to Hong Kong.

Nearly 2,000 foreigners including 310 Americans are being held in the city. The Chinese government has refused to let them leave.

The United States ordered all American diplomats and their families to leave the country two months ago after the Communist government had taken over. American consular property there is being guarded by the Chinese.

Apparently the Communists had "unwarranted apprehensions" that the landing craft were to ferry American officials to the mainland. The State department said it said they were strictly Communist property.

### Ex-Convict Faces Trial in Slayings

Conklyn, Miss. March 20—A white ex-convict goes on trial today for the massacre of three Negro children.

**What About Cheney Brothers**

The third important phase of the Manchester school building problem is that opened by Cheney Brothers' candid and good-spirited presentation of its own tax problem.

We think all Manchester people should keep in mind, as they evaluate the Cheney position, two obviously sincere and important facts of the firm's official statement.

"Our position," reads one portion of the statement, "may be very simply stated. It is that we are not opposed to a necessary and proper school expansion, but we are forced to protest against an increase in taxes. The company does not wish to put any obstacles in the way of the provision of adequate public school education for the children of Manchester and its vicinity."

The second portion of the statement which should be kept in mind, as an index to the mood in which the whole problem should be discussed, was this:

"As you know, we have no wish to move from the Town of Manchester, as Cheney Brothers has for years been an integral part of the community. Instead of leaving, there is any three-story building, we wish to state that it is our intention to remain here and do our fair share in supporting the community."

Cheney Brothers, in other words, is not attempting to dictate to this community, or to threaten the established rights of our elected town officials, nor does it claim that it should suddenly become a school and school expenses on schools and school needs. We do not think the company's management has had any intention of such directions. There would certainly have been considerable resentment if any such intention had been displayed. So we there is no such intention in the statement, no such intention possible, for that matter, in the brand of management the company is privileged to have.

All this being kept in mind, what is the Cheney Brothers problem? It is primarily a tax problem, to which there are several angles. One of these angles, which happens to have brought the problem to a head at this particular time, is the cost of providing the schools Manchester has to have.

But if it had not been schools which brought the issue to a head, it might have been the paving of some new street, or the building of additional members of the police force—or that sewage disposal problem which is waiting for us around the corner.

Any one of our necessary town expenditures may be the particular expenditure which threatens to become part of those tax burdens which, "whether they be little by little or in one blow, tend to kill the goose that laid the golden egg."

It claims that it is assessed too high, and that other Manchester taxpayers are assessed too low. Further, it claims that the Manchester assessment is out of line with the assessment it would receive if it happened to be located in Hartford.

Obviously, Cheney Brothers has a perfectly right to ask a thorough study of the possibility that it bears a disproportionate share of the Manchester tax burden—a burden disproportionate in relation to other Manchester taxpayers.

Obviously, as well, there should be a clear determination of how the claimed difference between assessment of the same property in Manchester and in Hartford could exist. This claim indicates either that Manchester or Hartford is wrong in its policy of industrial assessments. Let's find out which is right, and if it should turn out that a wrong theory is in practice in either locality, let us start correcting it, for that circumstance, we are in accord to continue to be an exception to that practice.

The third angle to the Cheney problem is not one stated by the company itself, but it is inferred from the statement, and is particularly important in Manchester, but the whole field of relationship between local and state tax-payers.

The Cheney Brothers statement points out that the new school building in Manchester is to a large extent financed by state aid. It points out that the state aid is a development here—residential development which represents something of a deficit, so far as very young schools is concerned.

"Someone," says the statement, "has to make up the deficit. Cheney Brothers, having the largest increase in taxes, naturally bears the greatest part of the burden of making up the deficit. The new housing developments are not for the purpose of providing homes for Cheney Brothers."

That is the statement which leads us into the field of state aid, which should be kept in mind, as an index to the mood in which the whole problem should be discussed, was this:

"As you know, we have no wish to move from the Town of Manchester, as Cheney Brothers has for years been an integral part of the community. Instead of leaving, there is any three-story building, we wish to state that it is our intention to remain here and do our fair share in supporting the community."

Cheney Brothers, in other words, is not attempting to dictate to this community, or to threaten the established rights of our elected town officials, nor does it claim that it should suddenly become a school and school expenses on schools and school needs. We do not think the company's management has had any intention of such directions. There would certainly have been considerable resentment if any such intention had been displayed. So we there is no such intention in the statement, no such intention possible, for that matter, in the brand of management the company is privileged to have.

All this being kept in mind, what is the Cheney Brothers problem? It is primarily a tax problem, to which there are several angles. One of these angles, which happens to have brought the problem to a head at this particular time, is the cost of providing the schools Manchester has to have.

But if it had not been schools which brought the issue to a head, it might have been the paving of some new street, or the building of additional members of the police force—or that sewage disposal problem which is waiting for us around the corner.

Not for the new buildings, we Manchester citizens have voted and are now building two schools—the Vergilack, Old St. and the Bowers, Princeton St., and the first approximately the mill to build Broad Street and add to the Hollister Street school will be one mill (a vote on Saturday, March 25th will make this possible) under the plan proposed new High School (on which we will be asked to vote funds at a later date) should cost approximately two mills—the total building program to be \$1,000,000.
