**Talks Given On First Aid**

Red Cross Instructors Hear Lecture by Public Utilities Experts

Charles J. McCarthy and Clinton O'Brien addressed the First Aid Instructors group last evening on safety and first aid at the monthly meeting held in the ARC classroom behind the Hospital Annex.  
Mr. McCarthy, head of the safety program for the Hartford Gas Company, stated that straining, falls, and eye injuries are the most common occupational hazards in the company. Worker suggestion sessions, periodic inspection for hazards, and reminders to use goggles on the job are methods employed to prevent accidents.  
The street department uses an electric device to detect gas leaks which sucks samples of gas from near leaks and indicates its presence on a dial. In addition, two men must always work together when it is necessary to descend into a manhole, with the descending man wearing a harness and masks attached to an air pump are also provided which send oxygen to the man below ground.

Magr. Kaas says this could only have been Nero's circus. This is the story of the excavations as told by Magr. Kaas: At the death of Pope Pius XI in February, 1938, orders were given to carry out his wishes for burial in the upper grottoes immediately below the basilica. These upper grottoes were early Pagan burials had been rarely visited in our century because of their low vaulted ceilings.  
Pope Pius XII gave orders for the door to be lowered, and mausoleum of the old pagan cemetery was uncovered.

form of a resolution which, if approved, could be the basis for the greatest psychological campaign ever turned against Communism.  
A one-time advertising executive Benton outlined a plan which would include:  
(1) A conference of non-Communist nations to devise a coordinated public opinion campaign.  
(2) The formation of a non-Communist network that would be organized to almost every radio receiving set in the world.  
To Explain Democratic Aims  
(3) A program to bring up-wards of 100,000 foreign students to study each year in the United States.  
(4) Increased pressure in the United Nations for world-wide freedom of information, and increased activity by the U.N. Educational, Scientific and Cultural organization.  
(5) Creation of a non-governmental agency to help Americans work through their overseas friends and relatives in fighting Communist ideas.  
"The kind of program we have in mind," Benton told the Senate, "is a full-frontal voice and not a whisper."  
Benton argued, with support from other senators, that the United States has neglected to wage an effective campaign for the minds of men — and that this is the area where Communism will be defeated.  
He declared that United States Communism is now pouring its deadly poison into the mind, into the conscience and the emotions of mankind.

Donovan Says Cold War Can Be Lost Without Firing Single Shot

Stanford, March 28.—(AP)—Maj. Gen. William J. (Wild Bill) Donovan, wartime head of the Office of Strategic Service, asserted here last night that the so-called cold war is just another name for what early in World War II was called "the phony war."

Speaking at a forum with Paul Reynaud, former premier of France, and Lord Layton, British Liberal party leader, Donovan said "what the Nazis did in nothing compared with what Russia is doing today." He declared that Russia has made clear her intentions to fight to the end, and gave it as his opinion that the cold war can be lost without firing a shot.

Stronger Europe League

All three speakers urged the strengthening of Europe as the best way to fight Communism.

Donovan urged that one of the most immediate needs was to preserve the European bulwark which, he said, "has twice saved this country by allowing us time to get ready to fight."

Lord Layton said that the only way of reaching "some state of toleration" between Russia and the west "is to demonstrate that the free world is strong militarily, politically and economically. In the past 50 years, he said, the tendency has been to break Europe up into smaller fragments. "This trend must be reversed," he asserted. "The only hope for Europe is to become united."

Marshall Plan

Former Premier Reynaud, likening Russia to other conquerors in the world's history and "a conqueror has never stopped" Reynaud declared the Marshall plan had been a great success and asserted that without it "we would have in western Europe, great unemployment and the spread of Communism."

The forum was staged at a dinner for the American Committee on United Europe of which Donovan is chairman. The next stop of the nation-wide tour will be at Palm Beach, Fla.

### Water Board Ponders Extension of Service

**Local Commissioners Discuss Future Possibility of Joining Up With Glastonbury**

Water and sewerage disposal problems—the next million dollar problem facing the town, were discussed last night in a session of the Board of Directors meeting at the Water Commission.

Without taking any action on the matters of water service extension beyond town limits, the Commission talked over possibility that at some future time parts of Glastonbury and Manchester might join to pool water resources and distribution systems. At the present time a few Glastonbury people just over the line and near the Buckingham reservoir, secure water from it, and near the Buckingham and pipeline located both in Manchester and Glastonbury, constitute the main water resource of the town.

**What Led To Discussion**

The question of possibility of some joint agreement for water supply arose when inquiry was made here of a projected 120 home development located in Glastonbury, might tie in with the Manchester water supply pipeline. It was explained that those Glastonbury homes now served, adjacent to the pipeline, are given water because of prior agreement. When the town took over the water system, previously maintained by Cheney Brothers, all agreements then in effect. One of these provided this town would service such Glastonbury property as was adjacent to the reservoir pipeline, even if outside the limits of Manchester.

**Becoming Major Problem**

Water resources are fast becoming a major consideration in all parts of the state and Manchester, like many other centers, has its main source of water in another town. It has, however, developed supplementary supplies by use of wells, one of which is just now being brought into use at Love Lane.

During the past summer the Glastonbury reservoir of this town went so low it could not be used. It is now up to normal stage.

The Commission discussed and set for hearing April 18 a proposal that 1,000 feet of 12 inch water pipe be installed from 691 Hartford road westerly to Bunce corner, under an easement for a 6 inch main, to provide present service for about 25 acres of privately-owned land on the south side of Hartford road. A commercial development is planned for the property.
