Just A Few Last Words Before The Battle, Folks

The Citizens' Committee on School Buildings has often been accused of objecting loudly to present school proposals, offering nothing in their place.

We suggest the following ideas, with the feeling that they have much to recommend them:

1. Build a 12-room elementary school at once in the Woodland-Broad street area at a cost of not more than \$420,000.

2. Leave the Hollister Street School alone as a neighborhood elementary school. The addition to this school seems positively ill-advised. A net gain of 10 classrooms at \$765,000 figures at \$76,500 a room, an all-time high for Manchester school construction. The proposed gymnasium looks like a big dairy barn backed out close to Washington Street. The new building will cover a good part of the school lot. This has caused the State Board of Education to advise in their letter of endorsement that more land be obtained in the block where the school stands, and we quote: "The one serious problem is the limited size of the site but this is something the Town can, and we feel sure it will remedy in the near future." This land will cost another sizeable sum to acquire.

This school was built for elementary purposes; why not leave it so to help serve its neighborhood younger children?

3. Start planning for a senior high school at an estimated cost of \$2,-000,000, possibly with a different committee. Skip the junior high idea until the senior high building is finshed

4. Let's stop a while then and see where we are. The results of these steps are as follows:

A. Whereas, with the construction of 12 rooms at Princeton Street, 19 at Olcott Street, 20 at Broad Street, minus 16 rooms at Hollister Street, the school system will have 35 additional elementary rooms-

By leaving Hollister's 16 rooms an elementary school, and building 12 rooms on or near Broad Street, the total number of elementary rooms in this plan is 59, or 24 more than the "experts" call for. That ought to relieve a lot of congestion where they say the "bulge" is at present.

B. When the senior high school is finished, all rooms occupied by the present high school can be taken over by the junior high section, and should be adequate for several years.

C. Total cost of the Official Plan: Princeton and Olcott \$1,685,000; Broad \$910,000; Hollister \$765,000; Senior High School, including plans, \$2,-050,000; Repairs, etc. including plans, \$215,000; Total \$5,625,000.

Our Plan: Princeton and Olcott \$1,685,000; Broad \$420,000; Senior High School \$2,050,000; Repairs, etc. \$215,000; Total \$4,370,000. Saving: \$1,255,000.

Is it worth while? Think it over.






