Hartford, April 3.—(AP)—A partisan battle over the powers of the governor is expected at tomorrow's fifth public hearing on the State Organization commission's report.

Three proposed acts, Nos. 7, 8 and 9, are scheduled for hearing in the hall of the House before the Joint Organization committee of the Legislature.

They raise the governor's salary to \$23,000 and the lieutenant governor's to \$2,500 and give the governor power to appoint all heads of a streamlined executive department without confirmation by the Legislature.

This new power of direct appointment, opposed by Republicans, is one of the key commission recommendations. The bills also cover salaries of new education boards and agencies in the judicial and legislative departments. Act 9 not only gives the governor direct appointing power, but lets each department commissioner or executive director appoint bureau heads and assistants.

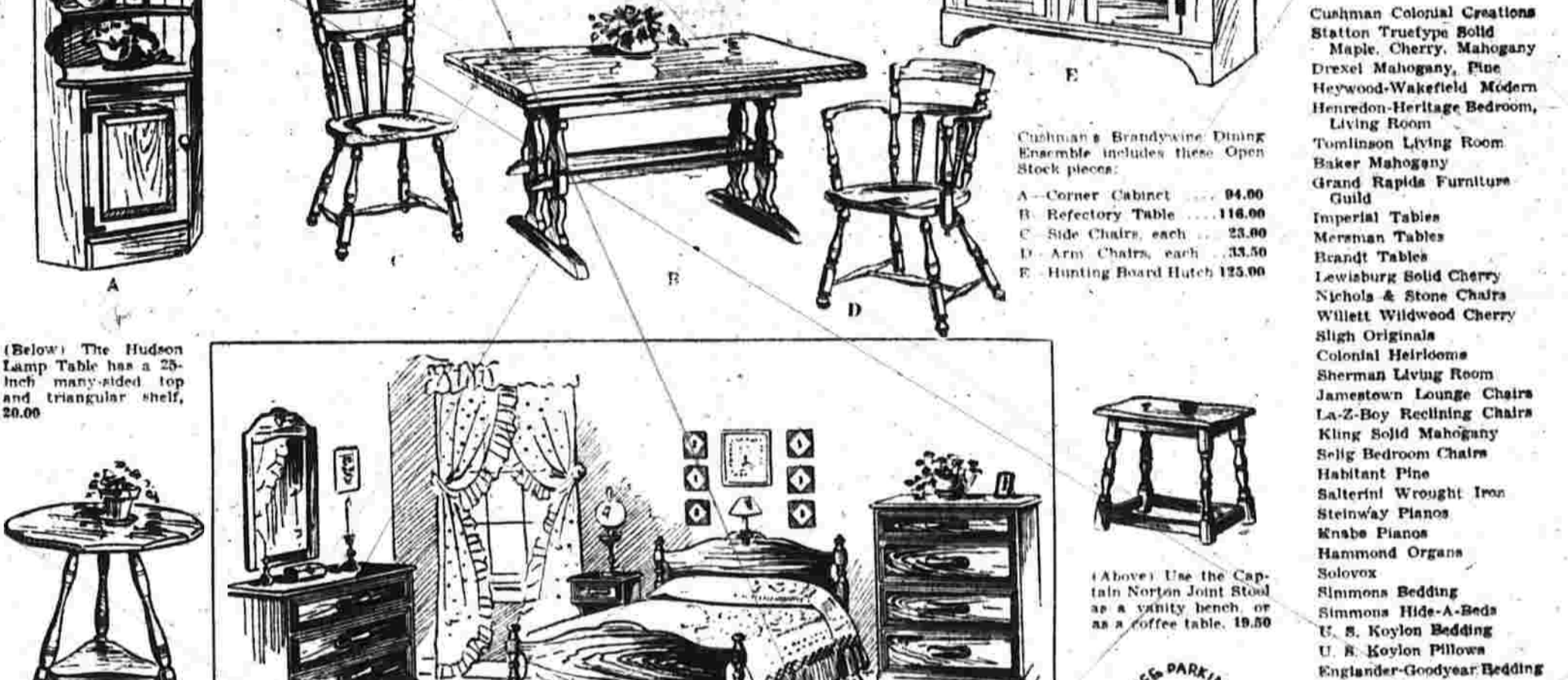
