### Wholesale Changes Are Not Necessary

#### Conway Confident Much Can Be Done in Re-organization Without New Constitution

Hartford, April 5.—House Republican leader, George C. Conway, expressed confidence today that much can be accomplished in reorganizing Connecticut's government without wholesale changes in the state constitution.

The U. S. majority in the House at a caucus yesterday, turned thumbs down on a new constitution proposed by the Connecticut commission on government re-organization to replace the much-amended constitution of 1818.

Conway was asked whether he agreed with Carter W. Atkins, executive committee chairman, who has contended that adoption of the new constitution was essential for effective reorganization.

"No," he replied. "We think we can do a large amount of reorganizing by legislation alone.

"Not Closing Door to Changes," he stated, "We are not closing the door to any changes in the constitution. Any changes found necessary will be made by the regular amending process and not by the short-cut method proposed by the commission."

The G. O. P. caucus yesterday approved the commission's plan for submitting the new constitution to the voters in the state election next fall. The normal amending procedure takes about five years.

Senator Alfred Wechsler, leader of the Senate's Democratic majority, repeated an accusation he made at legislative hearings yesterday—that Republicans were "prejudging" the new constitution.

Wechsler contended that the new constitution was "essential to a good portion" of the reorganization program. He said that Democrats planned to proceed with efforts to get the new constitution adopted. As a first step, he said, he would introduce a bill.

Republicans drafting bills are going right ahead with reorganization work, Conway, adding that House Republicans already had made a "substantial" accomplishment in reorganization.

Conway said he didn't believe he would be able to abolish all of the independent boards and agencies as recommended by the organization committee, but said there was much that could be accomplished by legislation in reorganizing the executive department.

"And that's where most of the savings can be made," he said. "Conway added that changes in methods of handling state finances could be accomplished by statute.

The commission had included a "home rule" provision in its proposed constitution. "The Republican leader said his party's objection to the approach towards reorganization taken by the commission's report was a necessity of government, instead of a reorganization of its present form."

He said it was too early to list in detail the changes Republicans hoped to make. In general, he said, the G. O. P. aim would be to "sound" recommendations of the commission into Connecticut's traditional form of government.

Conway said that Republicans hoped to have their version of a reorganization program ready for consideration by the end of the month. Hearings on the commission's program have been scheduled through April 20th.

What effect the Republican decision to scrap the commission's approach to reorganization and proceed in a different way would have on the Legislature's special session remained problematic.

Conway said that the commission's reorganization plan included a bank reorganization. Although the governor has expressed opposition to the compromise on some details, he has given no indication that he would accept a drastic revision of the commission's program.

Wechsler's insistence that the new constitution was essential to much of the reorganization program indicated Democratic opposition to the commission's program. He was extremely reluctant to yield on this point.

If the two parties persist in different approaches to reorganization, the stage would be set for a deadlock similar to those which have arisen many times before in the politically-divided Legislature. Such an outcome would make reorganization an irrelevant issue in the political campaign next fall.

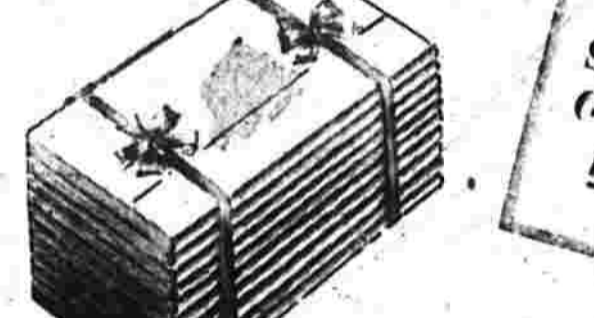

### Would Refuse To Trim Hats

#### Danbury Unions Propose Way to Halt Importation of Bodies

Danbury, April 5.—Danbury Hat Makers unions have proposed that union hat workers refuse to trim felt hat bodies imported from Europe as a means of forcing the industry of the United States to halt the importation of bodies.

The dramatic action recommended by the union was proposed as a means of protesting U. S. intervention in Europe, as well as the fact that the U. S. tariff commission has failed, so far, to take action on appeals of hat unions and hat manufacturers for an increase in the tariff on bodies imported from Europe.

Union officials are investigating the possibility that their resolution may violate a portion of the Tariff Act, he added.

Dennis M. Carroll, secretary of the local Hat Makers union, said the resolution calling for the ban on foreign hat bodies will be presented for approval by the United Hat Makers Association in New York City.

Little Opposition Expected—International officers have approved the plan, and since hat and millinery workers are unionized nearly 100 per cent, little opposition is expected to the proposal, Mr. Carroll pointed out.

He said importation of felt hat bodies from European countries, particularly Czechoslovakia, has increased 300 per cent in the last year and has affected seriously the hat industry of the United States which is centered in Danbury.

### Raps Policy On Farm Aid

Chamber Executive in Sharp Statement Opposes Truman's Stand

Hartford, April 5.—In a sharply worded statement today, Wayne R. Dickerson, Executive Vice President of the Connecticut State Chamber of Commerce, took issue with both President Truman's Message to Congress, advocating the enactment of the basic farm program of the Truman Plan and the suggested modified plan as suggested by Connecticut's Governor.

Referring to the fact that the Board of Directors of the Connecticut State Chamber at a meeting on March 31 had gone on record as definitely opposing the Truman Plan, he stated: "This plan develops the dream of keeping commodity prices low and farm incomes high. But it is only a dream because the Government would have to collect billions in taxes from members of labor unions, business and the citizens generally to pay farmers the difference between market prices on nonexportable foods, which would be allowed to seek their own levels, and parity prices."

Raid Dickerson, "Let no one be misled by this plan. The basic issue is whether we shall give the farmer huge cash subsidies in the form of market agreements and price allotments, or continue to give him comparative freedom and protection with flexible price supports."

"The Truman Plan has all the earmarks of costing the American taxpayer untold billions of dollars in subsidies. It would undoubtedly take larger taxes from the business and the citizen."

"The Connecticut State Chamber of Commerce believes that the first aim of the Government should be to balance the budget and reduce expenditures. Since the Truman Plan would require the farmer to expend more money than he receives, it is an unworkable plan, as it affects labor, industry and agriculture combined."

The State Chamber executive said, "There is tremendous interest in Connecticut in the Government's plan to give the people what they know why the Federal Government is producing surplus potatoes and imported potatoes from Canada. Further, the people are concerned over what is happening as a result of the present recessionary farm situation, because it is becoming a handicap to both business and labor in this State."

Dickerson concluded: "In view of such conditions, the State Chamber of Commerce anticipates a large turnout on May 10 to debate this important subject."

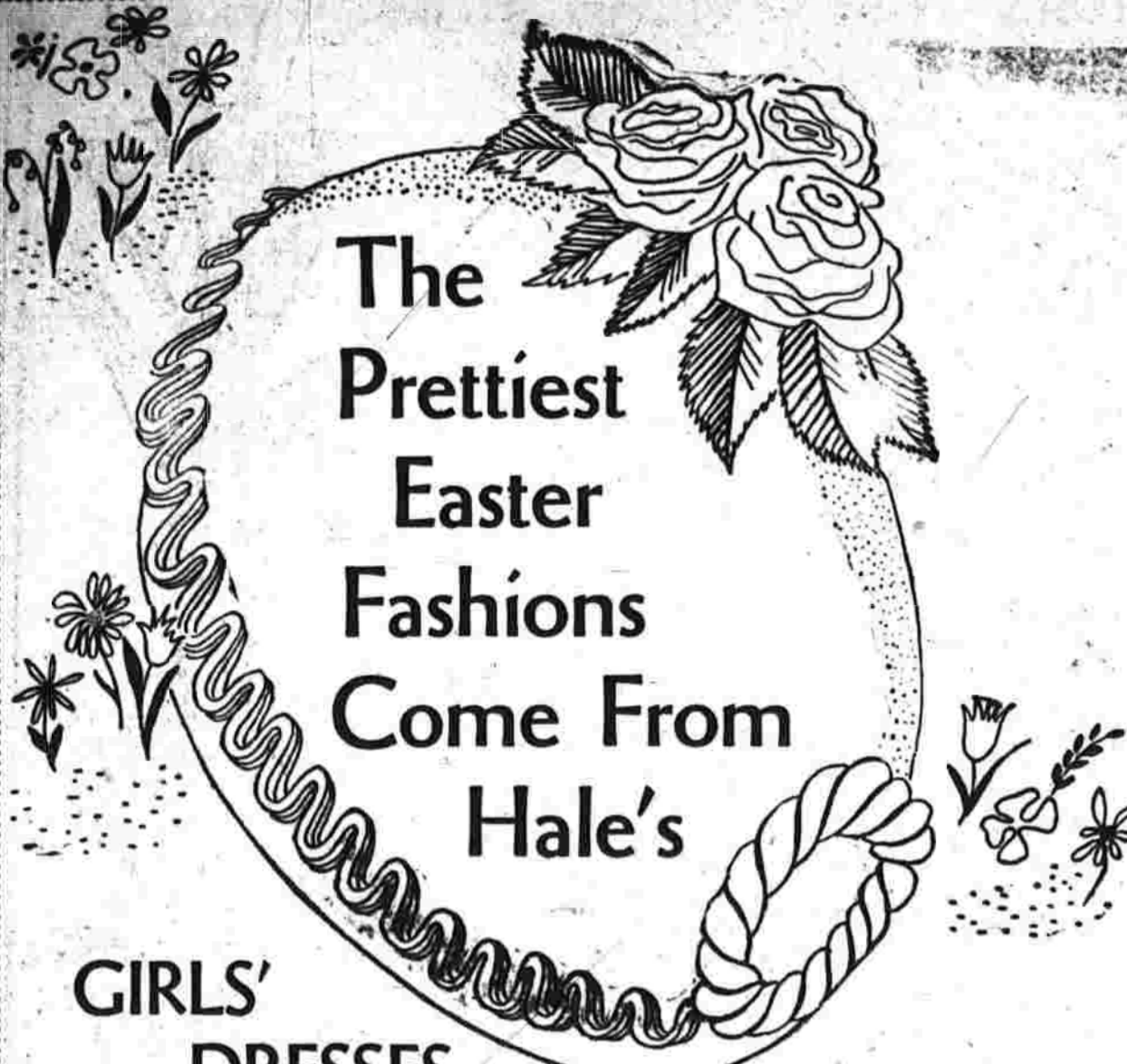

Oysters Give Grower Woes

Operator of 6,000-Acre Bivalve Ranch Tells About His Troubles

By Hal Boyle, New York. —P. Royal Toner has been throwing oysters in and out of beds for 41 years.

He doesn't do it for a laugh—it's his living. And it has given him a vast sympathy for people who raise century plants.

"Century plants must be the only things more trouble to grow than oysters," he said. Toner, who operates a 6,000-acre Long Island bivalve ranch, spoke with deep feeling. Right now he has some 700,000 bushels of oysters in his beds.

Can't See Crops Operating an oyster ranch is something like dry land farming, except you can't see your crops. And it is something like running an underground hotel, except the guests stay longer and are more finicky.

"You get them at birth and you have to switch them to different beds three or four times," said Toner grimly. "Each time you have to dredge them up and plant them in deeper water. And they don't shell out a profit until they're five or six years old and ready for market. All that time your money's tied up."

"You have to take more care of them than you do with children, too. A man can let his kids go swimming at Coney island, for example, but he couldn't grow oysters there.

"The bacterial count is too high," Toner explained. "The state wouldn't allow oyster beds close to polluted areas. It's even stricter about oyster raising than about dairy farming."

Spawning Time Dreaded The time every oyster rancher dreads most is the summer spawning time. For a few days after birth, until they settle and anchor on bits of old shell thrown on the shallow bottom, the young oysters are free-swimming larvae. They look like tadpoles and are a micro-cope.

"We're as nervous as expectant fathers then," said Toner. "Any storm or sudden cold snap can wipe out our whole crop. If the cash money we'll be counting on five years later."

"A big storm even churns up sand and smother the older oysters. The 1928 hurricane was the worst thing that ever hit our business. It not only lifted up our packing plant and dropped it down, kindling wood, it cost us about a quarter million bushels of oysters."

Change in Eating Habits Slow An even bigger blow to the \$70,000,000 a year industry was the change in eating habits that took place when Americans started ordering fresh fruit cocktail as appetizers instead of "half a dozen on the halfshell."

"It is easier to cut a grapefruit in half than an oyster," admitted the rancher. But a self-shucking oyster isn't necessarily the answer.

"The business is coming back now—everything moves in circles," said Toner. "Do you know the Chinese raised oysters 5,000 years ago? Julius Caesar sent oysters packed in snow all the way from Britain to Rome."

"The Chinese and Romans weren't dumb. They knew what was good for them. To get the most food value out of anything you have to eat it all and what one animal do people eat entirely today? Only the oyster. It has everything you need."

This seemed a good point to ask Toner a question that I've heard discussed often.

"You know what people say about oysters—is it really true?" I asked.

"Yes, it is quite true," he smiled. "You do sometimes find pearls in them."

"You have about a million to one chance. At least we did find two pearls in a least of two million oysters at our plant. But pearls from oysters in this area aren't of any really great value. Too much calcium in them. They don't buff well."

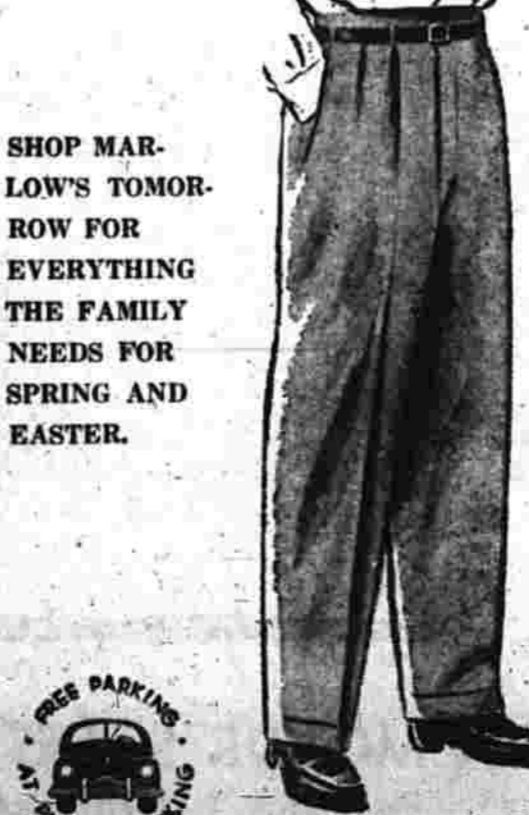
