the Republican party for the past eighteen years. As Governor Dewey recalled, there was a time when the Republican party was vigorously the champion of the working man. But in the last eighteen years, too many of the figures in control of party strategy and erator and votes in Congress have left the championship of the working man to the Democratic opposition.  
 At the same time, such Republican leaders have called upon the common people of the country to defend their "liberties." But, as Governor Dewey noted, it has been obvious enough that some of those talking about "free enterprise" and "liberty" were thinking mainly of their own profit welfare.  
 Governor Dewey at Princeton said "I doubt if the most conservative Republican would suggest abandonment of such concepts as unemployment insurance, collective bargaining, bank deposit insurance, regulation of securities exchanges and old age and survivors insurance." Yet there were Republicans who opposed these measures, and who warned the common people of this country that such measures were plots against their liberties. And there are all some prehistoric Republicans who indulge in impossible dreams of still wiping them out.  
 These Republicans never dream of a majority inside the Republican party, but often in places of too prominent a leadership have been the head of the party. They have had to carry for the past eighteen years. The party is not likely to win so long as it accords them any dominance in policy.

**"Recount" in Greece**  
 Thanks purely to American intervention—stern words from our diplomats heaped by the fact that our largesse to the country were not needed, the people of Greece are being restored some thing of a victory by their recent election.  
 In that election, they voted for domestic political reform. We had advised them to vote that way. They did vote that way. Then the old reactionary clique which had been misguiding Greece since the war, in league with King Paul, decided to sidestep and ignore the election result. They took over Sophocles Venizelos, the so-called liberal, and cast him in the role of their new puppet. He was made the new premier.  
 Then came our really stern intervention. That intervention was backed by the resignation of Venizelos, and the bringing to office of a government which might be in some sympathy with the things the people of Greece have always voted for in the election.  
 To our intervention Venizelos and the King have now bowed. Venizelos has resigned. The King has called General Nicholas Plastiras, the popular hero of the election, to form a new cabinet, which is expected to be a middle of the road affair dedicated to honesty and decency in governmental policy and to a healing of the wounds of the civil war we hoped and.

That what is happening in Greece is for the good of Greece seems beyond question, particularly if the elements which were dedicated to reform stick to their principles and their aims.  
 Whether it is good for us is perhaps another question. For the reactionary elements in Greece have already begun their campaign against us. They attack us for interfering in the domestic political affairs of a supposedly independent country. They will be out from now on, to make the American unpopular in Greece, and they will accuse their successors in office of being puppets for American policy. And, unless things go very well inside Greece, there may come a time when, despite our good motives, we are regarded as villains by the Greeks.  
 All this risk being considered, there is this much to feel good about. We have intervened, true enough. But it has been on the side of decency, and it has been with the idea of giving the Greek people themselves a break. And it has been in recognition of the fact that the only way to make any country safe from Communism is to give it a sound democracy of its own.

**Dewey Again**  
 In one of his Princeton speeches, Governor Dewey left no doubt that he differed from the Senator Taft faction of the party in his approach to foreign policy.  
 In the last speech of his series, the New York Governor left no doubt that he also differs from the Taft wing of his party in his domestic policy philosophy.  
 Governor Dewey was talking about some of those who shout loudest and most loudly about the thing called "private enterprise."  
 "When such men have shouted about 'free enterprise,'" said Governor Dewey, "they have not meant free enterprise at all—they have been thinking of their own narrow interests."  
 That fact—well evident with some of the loudest voices of the Republican party—has been the fact which has put the curse on

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### School Board Lists Session

#### To Meet This Evening To Tack Up the Building Program

The question of "where do we go from here" as regards Manchester's school building program is expected to be at least partially answered tonight when the Board of Education meets at 8 o'clock at the high school in its first regular meeting since two out of three school construction and expansion proposals were defeated in the referendum March 26.

At a joint meeting of opposing factions held after the referendum, it was generally agreed that it is now up to the Board of Education to "carry the ball" in new school planning. Local government officials are expected to be at the initial meeting for new school planning, and that body is expected to endorse recommendations tonight that will be referred to the Board of Education for action.

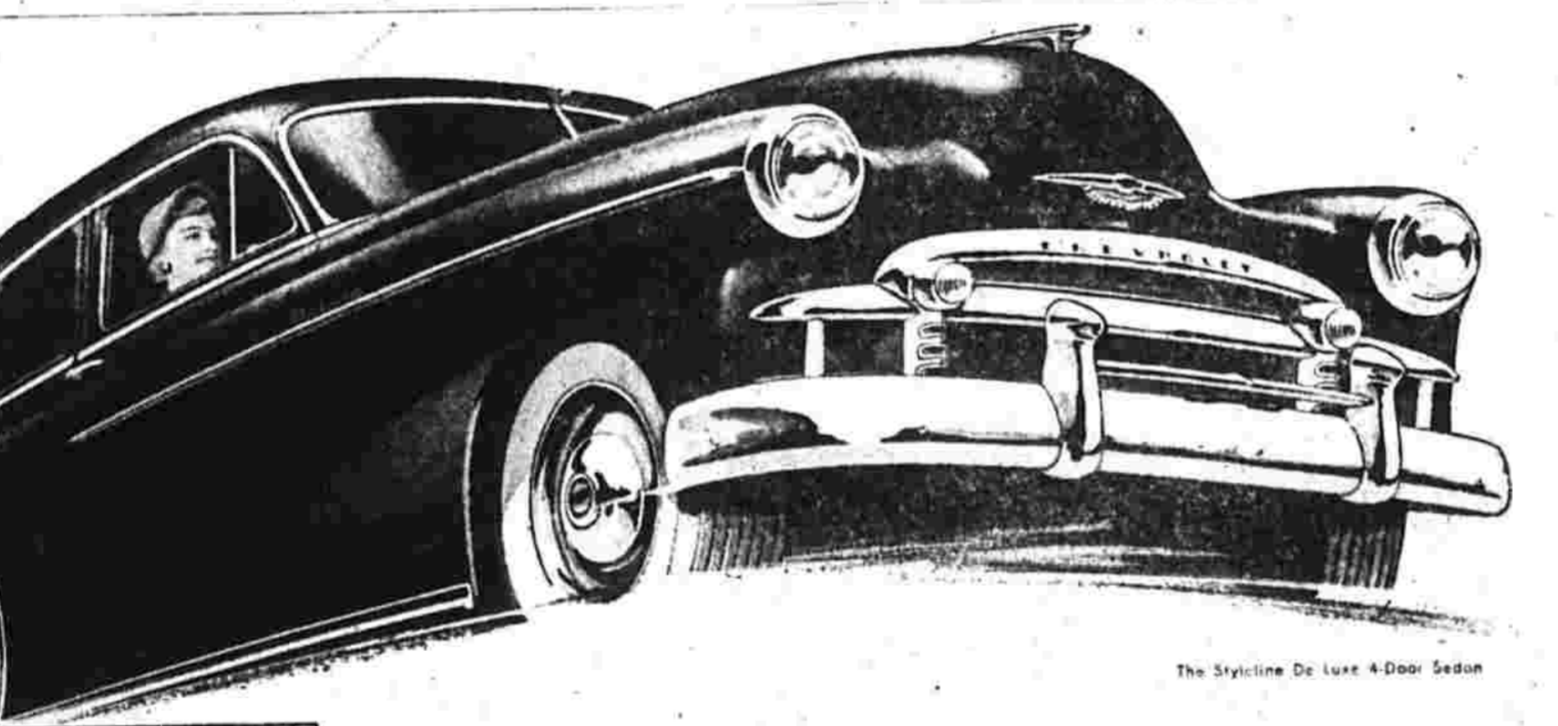
