Mr. Clarke, who is being taken on a tour of Hartford by Sir Alister Zimmer, visiting lecturer at Trinity college, said he was "impressed by the vastness" of the housing projects he had seen since arriving in this country April 22 for a nationwide lecture tour. "But the planning of these projects," he added, "is poor. They just seemed to be dumped somewhere instead of with foresight for the future."

Businessmen Advised To Do Own Speaking

Benton Asserts They Ought Not to Let Others Do So Much Talking for Them

Bridgeport, May 1.—(P)—Senator William Benton (D., Conn.), describing businessmen as both "misunderstood and misunderstood," said here today that they ought not to let "lobbyists, press agents and politicians" do so much of their talking for them.

The average businessman, said Benton in a talk presented for a luncheon meeting of Bridgeport's Chamber of Commerce, is prone to let other men run his public affairs and then complain about the result—or, more often, he hires somebody to speak his piece for him.

Recent attempts to "blash out" public programs, said the senator, provide an example of the only success in making their business clients look ridiculous and ungratefully ignorant.

Benton also criticized business representatives before Hoover Commission recommendations at congressional hearings.

Ray Large Part of Cost

"The National Association of Manufacturers was represented at the hearings by a patent committee," he said. "I should like to see a committee of 15,000 manufacturers, each with a committee of five, actually making their own case through their own representatives, pay a large part of the tremendous cost of government which comes in the way of inefficiency."

"Here is a case, it seems to me, where business could be constructive. Why shouldn't the N. A. M. have a manufacturer present at every one of these hearings, fighting hard for the reorganization program recommended by President Hoover's commission?"

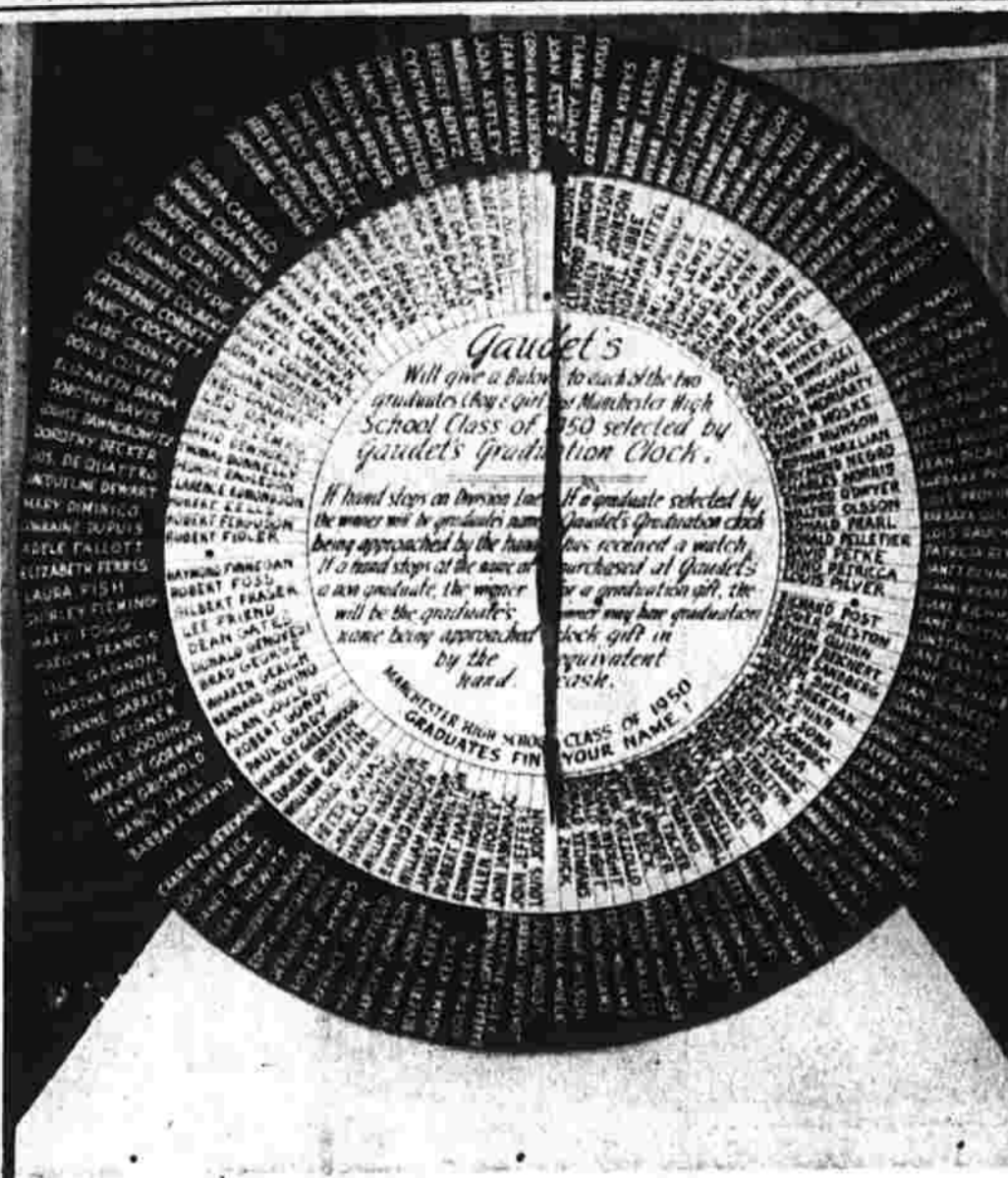
