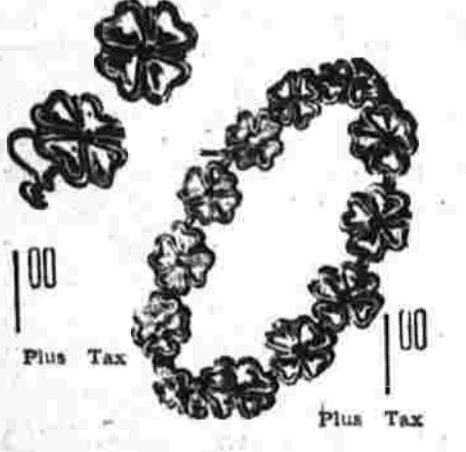

## This Is The Opinion On Broad St. School

### Crockett Gets Replies To Questionnaire; All Sorts of Comment Is Harvest of His Effort

Everything from fear of sex crimes in the Broad street neighborhood to a warning to "slow down from idealism" has been garnered by Director T. J. Crockett in his questioning of the Broad street section in regard to the type and location of a new elementary school there. Last week, in an attempt to sample public opinion on the school and its site, and to invite comment, Director Crockett sent out stamped, return postcards. Today he is a little bewildered at the diversity of the comment. The returns show that the population also is a bit bewildered. One person wants to know why the school isn't being located on a site exactly where it is now planned. Another wants to know "why weren't the people informed about this before a right developed"—overlooking the fact that full and complete publicity has been given the story for 10 months and that in two instances town meetings, voted purchases of land and surveys for the projects that recently came up at referendum. In this case, perhaps the reader didn't start his reading until late in the game.

But it's all interesting, and shows clear thinking along with the perplexities. One writer "prefers the original plan," which leaves some doubt since the really original Broad street plan weren't voted on. Another "is in favor of Mr. Little's plan," although Mr. Little has never submitted a plan. Another favors twelve room school at this site of contemporary design. "This is a mixer, since contemporary designing is so varied. Some of the comment, in its brevity, perhaps didn't get the full idea of the writer across, some writers said what they thought clearly.

The following samples will give an idea of what the public official gleaned when he asks for opinions: "The location of the school is a very good one. Broad Street site too isolated with so many sex crimes about. There would be a very costly item of sidewalk. Middletown West traffic too heavy for safety in walking. Children are bound to run into the road many times." "Congratulations for seeking this specific information. 'Cost' means little where life is concerned" is a bromide, but applicable here. As a former teacher, the hazards of the Broad Street location seem doubly obvious. I recall the Bd. of appeals because of townpeople's objection. Refused to allow a gas station to be built two blocks from the high school where I taught. Yet with aforethought Manchester is willing to risk lives of elementary children in a known business location.

"I would prefer the original plan." "The residents in the area definitely need a school on Broad street. In the past, our children have been refused transportation on the school bus. Having a school on Broad street would alleviate this trouble." "Let's get behind the board of education. They have the facts. They have the know-how." "Am in favor of Mr. Little Plan." "Tumpike and Broad streets must have walks for safety." "We feel that the original plan was satisfactory." "I think a new school should be built on the present site as soon as possible." "Closeness to present population and future development, rather safe from traffic hazards." "In a 12 room school adequate why the delay for such a period of years? Increase in taxes. Certainly—but many of the adults voted entertainment— is this more important than giving a child a good start?"

"Economy!!! Economy!!!!!!" "Think school would be better located at Win-ans and Broad streets, away from Tumpike traffic." "If we need 12, let's have 18. I think that the Board of Education and the school committee had a thoroughly thought-out plan. The anticipated savings of the opposition will be largely nullified by rising building costs to be encountered as a result of delay in the building program. I admire the fortitude of Messrs. House and Silverstein and want to raise my appreciation." (Continued on Page Four)

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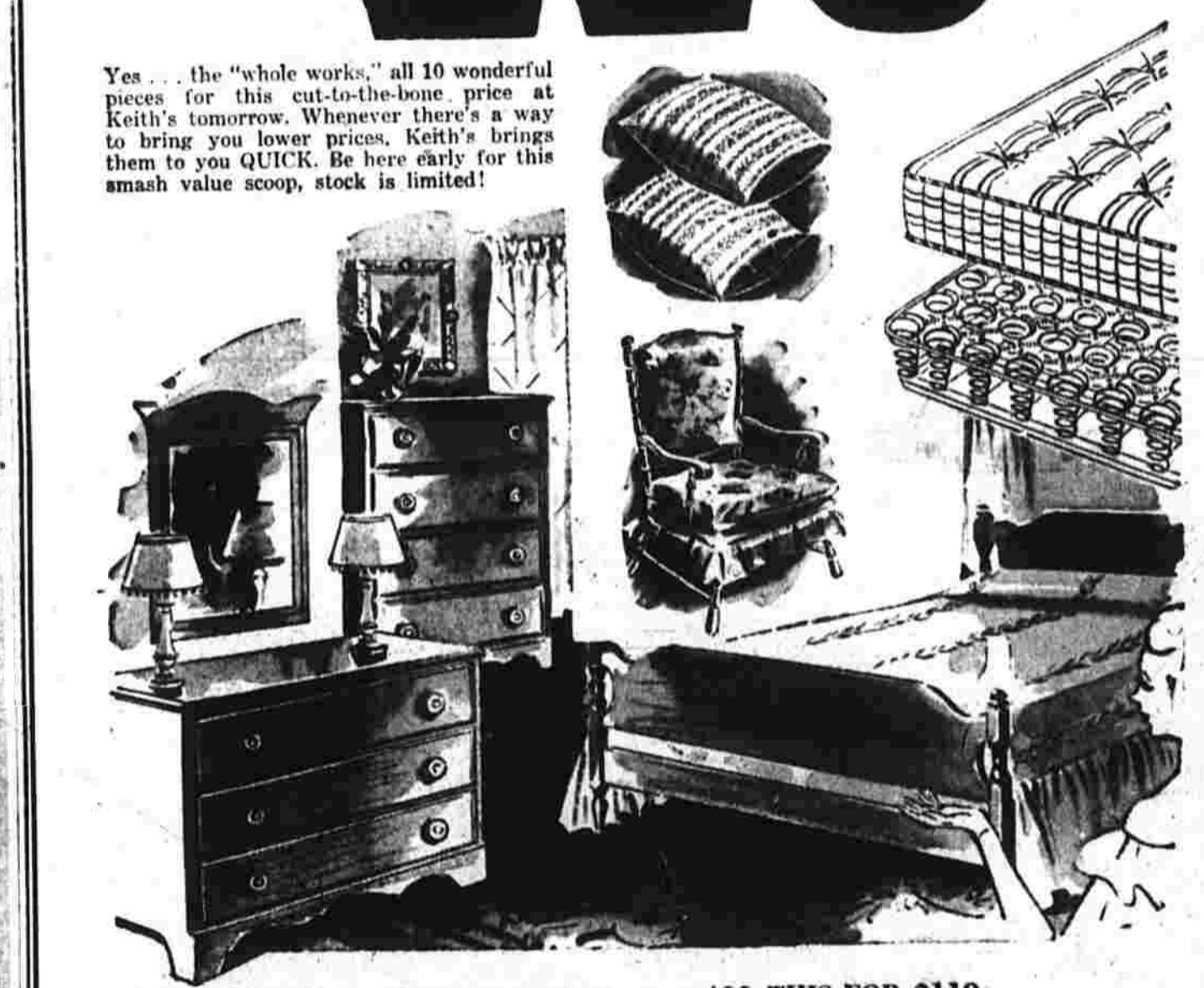

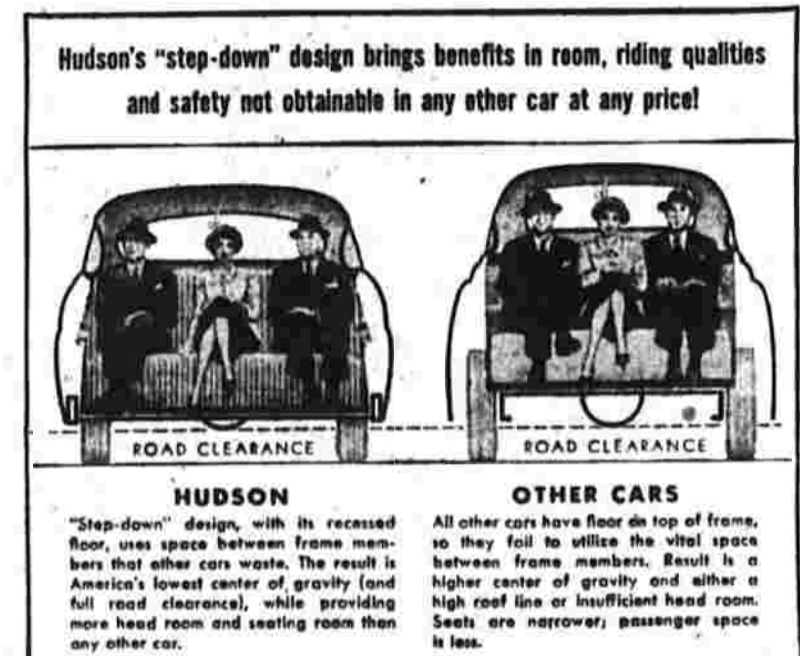
