Remington Denies Being Communist; New Probe Opens

Commerce Department Economist Declares Anyone Disputing Him Does Not Know Facts Or Engages in 'Deliberate Falshood'

Washington, May 4.—(AP)—William W. Remington denied once again today that he ever was a Communist. Anyone who disputes that, he said, either doesn't know the facts or is engaged in "deliberate falshood."

Remington was suspended briefly two years ago from his \$9,870 a year job as the result of a Senate investigation. He was reinstated after the government's Loyalty Review Board ruled in his favor.

Remington, a wartime Navy intelligence officer, said in his prepared statement he had never been a Communist. He said he was a member of the Communist party in 1942.

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A-Bomb Data Handed Reds

McCarthy Says Persons Connected With Magazine Passed on Secrets

Washington, May 4.—(AP)—Senator McCarthy said today Senate investigators have a witness who can testify that persons connected with America magazine were "rolling and running" Communist atomic secrets to Russia in 1945.

McCarthy, Wisconsin Republican, told a new conference that State Department employees "were part of the espionage ring." He said A-bomb data was handed to the Soviet Union at least two months before the first atomic bomb was dropped on Japan.

McCarthy named the witness he said could give this testimony as Frank Bickel, a former editor of the wartime Office of Strategic Services.

At the time McCarthy held his news conference, Bickel was in London questioning about his performance by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee in investigating Communist infiltration of the State Department.

McCarthy protested the group's decision, rather than in a public hearing, to strip Bickel of his position.

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### Local Police Construct Outdoor Firing Range

If you happen to be in the Finley street area some day and hear the sharp sounds of gunfire coming from the deep woods lining the road, don't call the police—because they're there.

Utilizing the old gravel pit abandoned by the town, members of the Manchester Police department with their own time, labor and materials have constructed an outdoor firing range that was put into official use for the first time yesterday.

The new outdoor range, built on town-owned land, supplements an indoor shooting range in the old Union school. Two years ago the site, converted the second floor into a firing range and recreation room. The outdoor range will now allow year-round shooting through the hot summer months.

No expense was spared in the building of a work was built at no expense to the town of Manchester. The range is the result of a "time off" hours of labor contributed by members of the department. Any materials supplied by the cops themselves were donated by interested parties.

Eight men can occupy the firing line at the same time. The eight targets are hung from steel tending between two heavy posts. The target number placed on the target is clipped to a magnetic board. Two firing lines have been built in the field and 50-yard distances.

(Continued from Page One) National economic cooperation," as opposed to nationalistic stand which, it said, hamper the flow of world trade.

In urging the export of U. S. capital and technical knowledge, the Chamber stipulated that treaties should be signed in advance guaranteeing fair treatment for American investors overseas.

It also suggested that an advisory board, made up of citizens having experience in foreign trade and investment, be created to assist the government in developing investment policies.

Domestic Program Opposed As expected, the Chamber opposed much of President Truman's domestic program. It called for substantial tax cuts based on "trigger" provisions.

Another resolution opposed any attempt by the government to "guarantee the property of agriculture or any other segment of the economy, by subsidies, price supports or similar devices."

The Chamber said the nation's economic health depends on providing 400,000 new jobs a year. To insure that business has sufficient capital for such huge-scale expansion, it said, the public interest imperatively calls for a revision of tax policies.

Lowering of taxes levied on income, corporation, estate and the capital gains taxes, as well as repeal of the wartime increases in excise taxes.

Several resolutions called for intensified effort to bolster the nation's defenses. The Chamber endorsed a three-year extension of the selective service on a stand-by basis, a more aggressive program of stockpiling critical war materials, a speeding in civilian defense planning and legislation to permit joint U.S.-Canadian military purchasing.

### Gaming Laws Drive Starts

State's Attorney for New Haven County Gives Warning on Violations

New Haven, May 4.—(AP)—A campaign to stamp out violations of the gambling laws by sales of raffle tickets and games of chance at bazaars and carnivals has been launched by State's Attorney Abraham S. Ullman.

Ullman's drive came to light yesterday after a letter called the attention of Wallingford police to carnivals planned by two organizations there and requested them to notify the sponsors that violation of the gaming laws will not be tolerated.

At Wallingford, Police Chief Clarence D. Lane said the message was given to him by County Detective Jack Holz. He quoted Holz as saying that the state's attorney's office intended "to close up New Haven county as tight as a railroad country."

A similar campaign by State's Attorney Lewis W. Willis in Fairfield county last year resulted in the closing of a number of carnivals and carnivals planned by volunteer groups.

Ullman said the request of the Wallingford police was not an isolated instance. He said he has heard the police aren't doing anything, he said, "we go ahead and tell them the situation."

He said similar action had been taken in the past in connection with activities in Orange, West Haven and Ansonia.

Chief Lane said he had passed along the state's attorney's letter to the Wallingford Police A. A. and the Shaw-Simon Youth League, both of whom had planned carnivals this month.

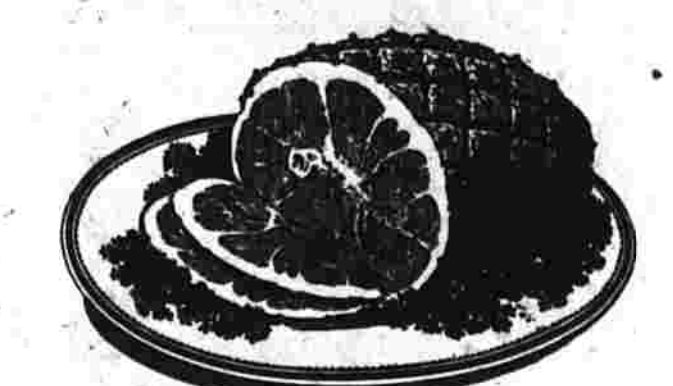

The announcement came after almost 48 hours of continuous negotiations. The old contract expired at midnight May 2.

A spokesman for management and the officers of Lodge 530 of the International Association of Machinists (I.A.M.) said details would be announced later today and the new contract included an incentive clause for certain maintenance workers, an important point in the preliminary discussion.

Being Put in Writing He reported that the agreement is now being reduced to writing and is to be submitted to the I.A.M. membership for formal ratification as soon as possible.
