Judge Blocks Wage Order

Murphy Issues Temporary Injunction on Food Handlers Pay

Hartford, May 5.—A temporary injunction restraining the State Labor department from putting into effect a new minimum wage order for food handlers has been issued by Judge James E. Murphy, of the Superior court.

The wage order, issued by the Labor department on March 8, had been scheduled to go into effect on May 15. It would have required a minimum wage of \$28 for a 40-hour week, plus two free meals for food handlers working more than five hours any day or 65 cents for each meal not furnished.

Wage Order Held Up

Judge Murphy ordered that the wage order be held up until a court has decided whether it is constitutional and whether or not the wage board which drafted it was properly constituted.

"This matter undoubtedly will go to the Supreme court for that reason should do everything possible to expedite a trial upon its merits," the jurist asserted.

Three-Day Hearing

Judge Murphy's injunction was issued following a three-day hearing.

Local Position Wins in TWUA

Textile Union Convention Defeats Rieve Plan To Oust Baldanzi

The decision of Manchester's Local 63, TWUA, to support both Emil Rieve as president of the Union, and George Baldanzi as executive vice president was also the decision yesterday of delegates of 400,000 members in the Textile Union Convention in Philadelphia, 1,234, and Charles Serrano of Passaic, 1,162.

In congratulating Baldanzi on his victory, President Rieve said he was going to work to "re-establish the team," but he indicated he might resign if this was impossible. He said, in the event of failure "I would have to make a decision as to what to do next."

Baldanzi stated he would work with Rieve, but he also said he was now going to devote more time to Union business and give up his position as CEO organizing head in the South. He indicated he might later make a try for the TWUA presidency.

Manchester's convention delegates will report shortly to the membership here on the outcome of the convention.

In Manchester, President Frank Rieley of Local 63 reported prior to the convention that local delegates James Murphy, Michael Kinschmidt and Robert Adams would go to the meeting instructed to vote for both Rieve and Baldanzi.

Rieley said he thought that a difference of opinion and a certain amount of contention at top levels is a healthy thing and tends to preserve a democratic condition in the organization.

As the voting took place in Boston, Baldanzi ran far ahead of his rival, Mariano B. Bishop of Fall River for a victory of 1,038 to 742.

In addition, vice presidents who strongly supported Baldanzi led off in the returns, while his most outspoken opponent, among the

Secretary General Trygve Lie apparently has a chance of seeing Stalin. At least he announces that he is going to Moscow, and he would not be likely to get any assurance that his visit would be crowned with a visit to tell Stalin himself what the secretary general of the United Nations thinks about the world situation today.

We need not expect that Mr. Lie will get much of a chance to see the heads of great powers, engaged in a great cold war, have little time for such a man. For proof of this we need only refer to the fact that Mr. Lie, before he left for Europe, had a very difficult time getting any kind of an appointment with President Truman, and that the final allotment of the President's time to him was limited to 20 minutes.

This is the kind of attention President Truman was willing to give Mr. Lie. We can hardly expect the unenlightened Russian dictator to have more respect or consideration for him.

What is the cause upon Mr. Lie, so far as the heads of great states are concerned?

Mr. Lie is that unpopular phenomenon, a neutral.

He says so himself. He is very careful to emphasize, all the time, that he is neutral in the great power conflict now raging.

And, by his own very official position, he is supposed to be a neutral. He is the secretary general of the United Nations, an organization of all the nations and powers. It is his duty to be neutral.

But the big powers find it impossible to tolerate the idea that even should be neutral. Each of them despises and distrusts him for it. Each of them proceeds by the gib law that any one who isn't for itself must be against it. Russia has frequently attacked Mr. Lie for being too favorable to western interests. But our officials have also been very suspicious of Mr. Lie, fearing that, since he isn't wholeheartedly with us, he must be too favorable to Russia.

Neither we, nor Russia, such in our own self-righteousness, each in our own conviction that the conflict between us must divide all men, can quite understand or respect the possibility that someone should be neutral in the cold war.

Yet both of us should, perhaps, be thankful for the fact that such a thing as neutrality still exists, that there still exists some individual who does not consider the difference between the two sides as does not accept the theory that our division must go on until it divides the whole world and then plunges the two halves of the world into war with each other.

We should, both of us, be so thankful for the continued existence of a neutral point of view that we do some listening to it. Unless both of us can manage some adjustment of our own extreme positions, unless both of us can submit to some neutral opinion, unless both of us can acknowledge the possibility of giving up points as well as winning them, both of us are doomed. Mr. Lie's neutrality shocks us both. If we would give it a chance, it might also save us both.
