



Cashier Testifies Employers Told Her to Falsify Her Accounts

Hartford, May 12-(#)-A 26year-old bottling works cashier on trial in Superior court here charged with embezzling \$46,781 has testified that her employers instructed her to falsify her accounts "for income tax purposes." Mrs. Mildred Eden Laurendeau of Terryville, made the statement from the witness stand yesterday after Judge Samuel Mellitz excused the jury when her lawyer, Francis J. Summa of Waterbury, challenged an alleged confession the state sought to introduce into

"You blackmailed her and got her property under false pretenses," Summa charged.
