### Big Real Estate Deal In North End Reported

**Coughlin Block on North Main Street Changes Hands Today; Gradadio, Sales Agent**

A deal, reportedly involving \$50,000, one of the largest real estate transactions in town in some years, has been completed with the sale of Numbers 181, 183, 185, 187 North Main street by Michael J. Coughlin to Robert G. Sandala and Dorothy H. Sandala, operators of the North End Pharmacy.

C. Gradadio, prominent Manchester realtor, was agent in the sale of the premises which includes two buildings. The buyers were represented by Attorney John D. LaBelle, who represents the seller by Attorney Vincent McPadden.

No. 183, 185, 187 North Main street is a brick building containing a soda shop and bakery, with a barber shop upstairs and four apartments.

No. 181 North Main street is a single family dwelling with a rear six car garage. The property has a frontage of 80 feet by 247 feet deep. It is being purchased for investment purposes.

The block involved was originally known as the Morton-Dwyer block. The three story brick structure was built 50 years ago by J. E. and Willie T. Morton.

### Acheson Accused Of Asia Betrayal; Firing Is Urged

that "of hitting Communists at the front door with a silk handkerchief while they beat the brains out of your friends at the back door."

He said it was "masterminded" by Lattimore and "Mr. Acheson has bought it and applied it to the entire Far East."

He went up with this direct plea to Mr. Truman, now en route back to Washington from a trip to the Pacific northwest.

"Come home, Mr. Truman, and fire the Red Pipers of the Politburo. Fire the hoodlums who betray us in Asia. Fire the collaborators of corruption, those purveyors of mimicry of the Moscow party line in the Republican party here."

McCarthy also made a passing reference to the Senate speech last week by Senator Chavez (D., N. M.), who said that Louis Budenz, ex-Communist editor, was a "Red agent" who had been in the State department.

Denials that they ever told Budenz any such thing about Lattimore have come from some of the Communist leaders he said gave him that word.

McCarthy said of Chavez's speech: "Chavez was supported on the Senate floor in his attack on Louis Budenz by the administration leadership. Senator Lucas (R.), and the chairman of the investigating committee, Senator Tydings."

"Obviously, in this rugged fight, the Kremlin is reaching into high places for dupes to spear its malignant aims."

"A much more dangerous and smellier breed of skunk is now being dug out of Washington."

McCarthy prefaced his latest attack on Acheson, Lattimore and Jenson by saying that Generalissimo Joseph Stalin of Russia intended to turn the Pacific ocean into a "Red lake."

But before this can be done, he said, it is necessary to conquer the Chinese Nationalists who now have been driven off the mainland and are making a last-ditch stand on Formosa.

The Communists have officially declared that the total destruction—the mopping up of those anti-Communist forces on the island of Formosa is the Number One plank in their platform," he said.

McCarthy said the fight in which he now is engaged is the roughest he has ever been in "and it has the Pacific northwest."
