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

Hartford, May 16 .- (AP)-Gov. Chester Bowles urged the Connecticut General Assembly today to provide at once more liberal benefits for the state's unemployed. In a special message, the Democratic chief executive called for enactment of liberalizing amendments to the unemployment compensation act during the Legslature's current special session. Urges No Delay
