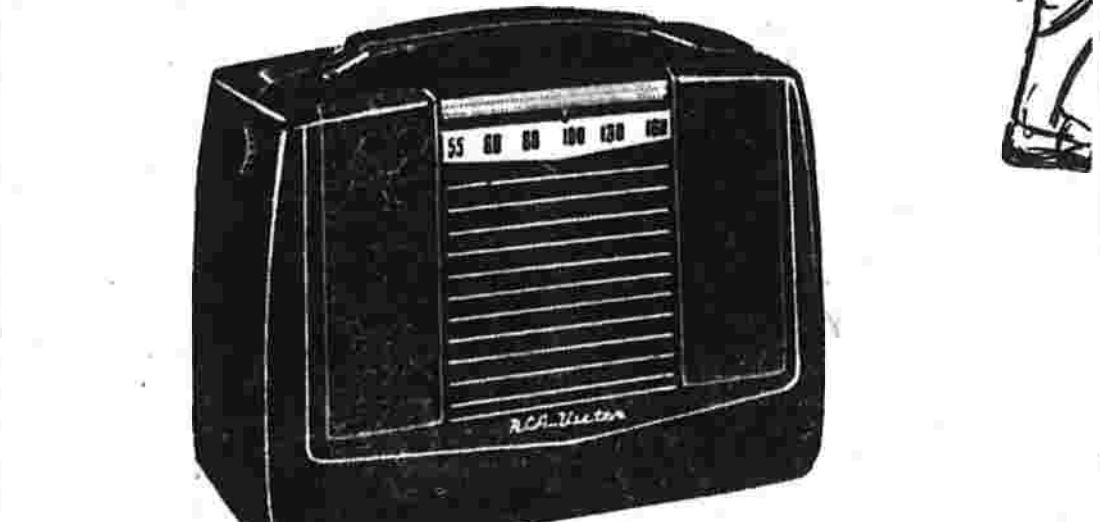

Rival Leaders Try To Get Agreement On Reorganization

Moves Made to Patch Up Differences Threatening to Cause Collapse of Negotiations; Assurances Given Bi-Partisan Talks to Continue

State Capitol, Hartford, May 18.—(AP)—Rival leaders lastly moved today to patch up partisan differences which flared up and threatened yesterday to cause the collapse of negotiations on the federal bill to reorganize the state government, pending before the General Assembly's special session.

From both Democrats and Republicans came assurances that the bipartisan negotiations would be pursued. Regarding Misunderstanding Both sides also were inclined to regard Wednesday's outbreak as a misunderstanding.

Senator Alfred F. Wechsler, majority leader of the legislature, controlled Senate, immediately upon arriving at the Capitol on Tuesday, May 16, received a letter from the Republican-controlled House, Rep. George C. Conover, majority leader, with the avowed purpose of trying to clear up the situation.

The House last week refused to give the bill a quick vote and then adjourned for a lack of a quorum. Yesterday, by accident or design, many House members were present, but a roll call showed only 137 on hand.

Amendment Rejected The House approved the bill by a 96 to 50 vote after rejecting an amendment which would have required specific approval by local towns before Sunday liquor sales could be legal in any municipality.

Connecticut Yankee
By A. H. O.

It is typical of the present troubled state of the Republic that in Connecticut, that it blows hot and cold on its own decisions.

This quality of irresolution, even after decisions have been made with great display of firmness and unity, has been on display in legislative policy. A short time ago, for instance, the Republican party came forward with its own Reconstruction proposal. Subsequently, there were bipartisan negotiations and tend to see a Communist under every bed in America. And if we become a jerry nation, not knowing what to do about or whom to trust at home, we are a weak nation, more at the mercy of Communist plotting upon our shores than masters of our own minds and policy.

Spindles And Tons

The Japanese are now plucking American officials by standing up and boldly demanding that the number of spindles in their textile plants be increased.

At present, under American occupation code, the Japanese are allowed to operate 4,000,000 spindles. Before the war, they operated 14,000,000.

They are claiming now that they can't get along with 4,000,000 from the point of view of employment, from the point of view of supplying their own domestic textile needs, from the point of view of the foreign exchange they need in order to achieve some economic stability of their own.

We presume they will get what they want, and we do not see that it is possible to deny it to them.

Even more so than in the restriction placed by the war victors on German steel production, the limitation of textile production in Japan is not aimed at keeping Japan from waging new war, but at keeping Japan out of markets the victor nations would prefer to have for themselves.

Although given of new German war industry is given as the headliner for the restriction of German steel production to 11,000,000 tons a year, a fear that a booming Germany might recapture its own pre-war markets is also important.

The restriction in Germany has not worked and is not working. The Germans are already producing more steel than they are authorized to produce. Soon, inevitably, they will be authorized to produce more. That will be one of the prices they exact from us which they play Russia off against us.

In recent years, the result of these continuing battles has been confusing to the voters of America.

The liberal, younger wing of the Republican party has usually been dominant in Republican National Conventions, in the selection of Presidential nominees, and in the writing of the party platform.

But the Old Guard, meanwhile, has been dominant in control of the party's policy in Congress. Only one thing has seemed clear. It has been that the party would probably do better at the polls if it could make its own mind one way or the other. But that requires a slow process by which, for the better solution, Republican policy in Congress should be brought more into line with national candidates and national platforms. It requires, for instance, such an operation as disrupting the legislative powers of Senator Robert A. Taft, whose legislative record has been the real target of every Democratic politician that promises future life and vigor for the party.

Well, in Pennsylvania the issue was clear cut. It was fought to a knock-down finish. And, when the votes were in, Pennsylvania Republicans had voted, three to one in favor of the kind of Republicanism that promises future life and vigor for the party.
