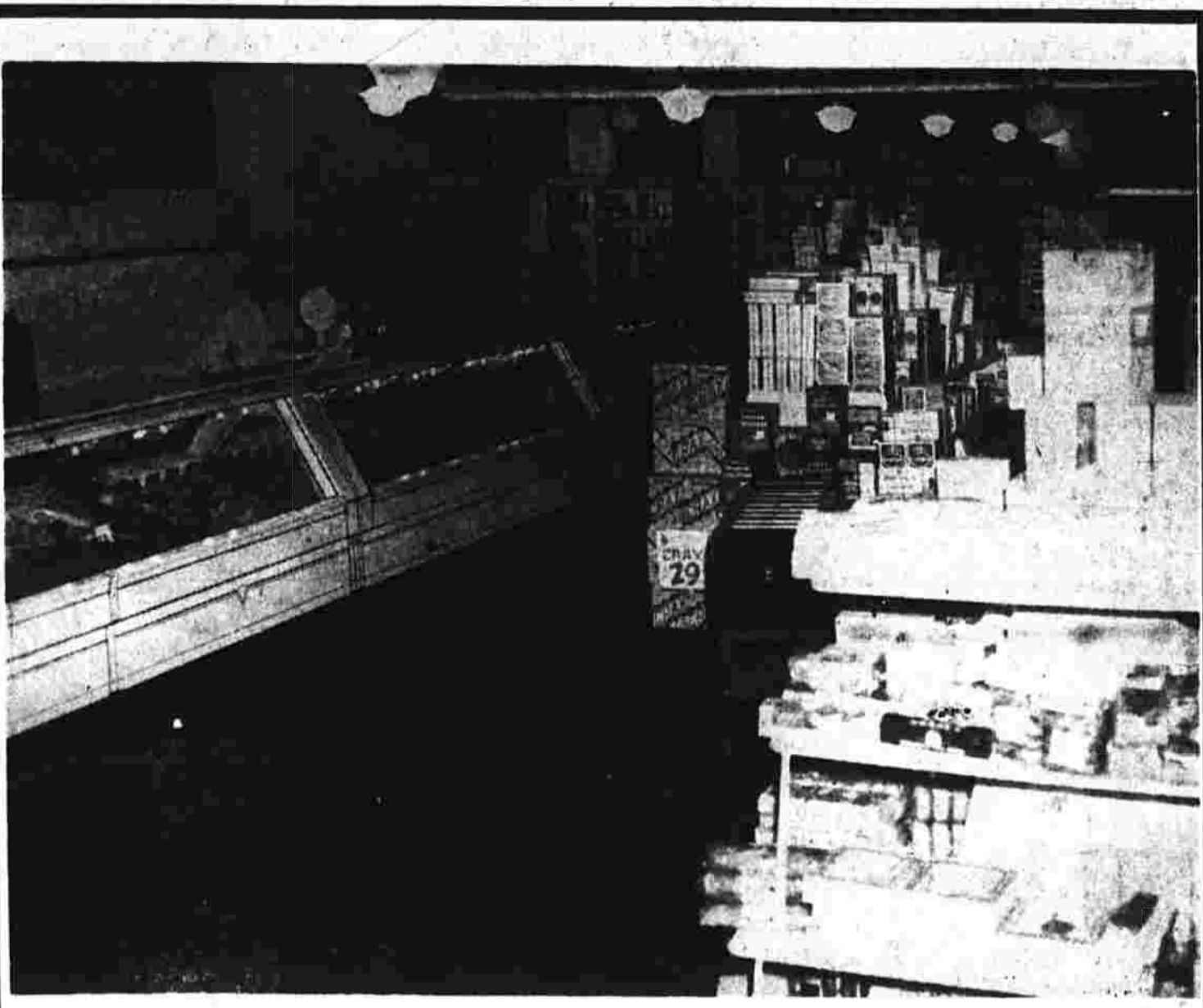

Threat of Atomic Attack by Russia, Bradley's Warning

General Says United States Must Shore Up Defenses of Possible Assault 'in Few Years'; Plans for Mobilization Urged. San Francisco, May 19.—(AP)—Gen. Omar Bradley said today the United States must shore up its defenses to meet the threat of a possible Russian atomic attack "in a few years."

The chairman of the joint chiefs of staff called for "mobilization plans which can be put into effect at the first warning signal of emergency" including standby war emergency powers for the president.

While the Russians may not be able to catch up immediately with the country's stockpile of A-bombs, Bradley said, in a relatively short time "they will probably have enough to deliver a devastating blow at any area they choose to strike."

When that time comes, he added, the United States and its allies will face a difficult choice. Ruling out the possibility that this country might choose appeasement, isolation or preventive war, Bradley said:

"What then is our choice? It is clear but not simple. Facing the fact that such Russian atomic strength may become a reality, we must prepare our own defenses so that an attack on the United States will cripple leaving it to be supplied at the mercy of Communism and Soviet Russia."

"Our defenses must include mobilization plans which can be put into effect at the first warning signal of an emergency. Initially, this includes legislation to give emergency powers to the president."

"Plans must include all-weather civil economy while they include the legal measures for tightening our belts for defense," Bradley prepared remarks for a combined Armed Forces meeting of the Chamber of Commerce and the Commercial Club here today.

Acheson was in large measure personally responsible for the approval yesterday by the foreign ministers of the 12 North Atlantic Pact countries of new measures to speed the economic rehabilitation of Austria to the west.  
He has been the chief proponent of the strategy of limiting the Western nations into a tighter, more cohesive group, rather than the loosely-organized alliance which has functioned in the past. He left Washington May 7 with a plan for a permanent council to oversee the military and economic progress of the pact members.  
At the opening meeting yesterday the foreign ministers adopted that plan. The council will consist of one representative from each of the 12 nations, plus the United States and the Soviet Union. It will meet in Geneva before the first meeting of the new group. American representatives say Acheson is convinced the pact is at least on the right road.
