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Secret Battle In Cold War

U. S. and Russia in Research Struggle for Better Submarines

 Washington, May 22.—The most intense and secretive battle of the Cold War is being fought underwater. The recent announcement of the 500-ton, 320-mile submerged voyage of the U. S. sub Pickens, from Hong Kong to Pearl Harbor, focuses attention on the importance of the sub race.

It is hardly a research struggle to develop better submarines and better anti-submarine measures. Many military experts believe that there are bigger stakes in the sub than in the atomic and H-bomb races.

Here's the status of the situation: The U. S. Navy has been evaluated the clock of super-secrecy which both nations have thrown around it.

Some experts say the U. S. Navy now has the edge in the rapidly changing arms race. Most liberal estimates put the U. S. Navy at a lead of 100 to 150 miles over the Russians.

The U. S. Navy has 20 operating subs of various types. Twenty-five are scheduled to be built in 1951, 19 of which have already been ordered.

Under construction are six fast attack class subs, probably better than anything the Russians have now, and three new small anti-sub subs, 105 feet long and adaptable to mass production.

The Russian Navy has 12 submarines in the Pacific. The numbers are extremely important. The experts claim that the Russian defense against them would cost millions of dollars.

Behind the market-expanding Pickens' voyage was the Russian desire to serve notice on the Americans that they still are capable of much in the offensive sub race.

It is likely that the U. S. has the edge in anti-sub warfare. The U. S. Navy is trying to keep up developments in its own waters. It hopes that this will mean they will be equally far ahead of the enemy's offense.

Anti-sub warfare in the Cold War is partly a struggle of nerves. The appearance of what are called "ghost" submarines off the coast of the U. S. Navy's recent announcement of the U. S. sub's ability to reach the North Pole is a part of this.

At the end of World War II, the U. S. Navy was able to turn the tide. The Nazis' U-boat fleet, though U. S. airplanes almost eliminated it, was able to sink a sub from air and sea radar detection.

Now, however, the airplane is back in the air. Recently the Navy announced that its Lockheed PV-2 Ventura "can find and destroy enemy submarines at sea."

The plane is used with new depth bombs and can detect "sonobuoys" which detect subs under the sea and transmit the signal to the airplane which is used to locate the sub.

These plans materially change the underwater defense picture.

According to Admiral C. B. Monahan, the Navy's chief of staff, the major underwater problem now is the fact that our subs are not as fast as the Russians' can carry torpedoes which have ranges greater than our own.

Monahan says that there are several research projects under way aimed at locking this advantage in our hands.

He said that a solution has just been found. All kinds of fantastic projects are included in Monahan's optimistic prediction, including one which would detect the exhaust gases of a sub with radar.

The three small anti-sub subs which the Navy is now building are the most radical and recent long-range developments in the field. Very fast, they are equipped with many kinds of detection gear. They are extremely quiet, greatly hampering the enemy's detection of them. Being capable of mass production, they might make a basic change in the sub picture in case of war.
