Hill Outlines Bolton Work

Commissioner Tells of Highway Changes in Talk Before Club

Plans for the projected new Bolton Notch railroad overpass and highway changes, with relocation of the interesting parts of Routes 3 and 44, were outlined last night by State Highway Commissioner Hill at a meeting of the Bolton Married Couples' Club in the town hall.

Commissioner Hill stated that the Bolton Notch project actually will serve as the eventual eastern terminus of an expressway connecting the Wilbur Cross Highway in Manchester. The Bolton Notch section is considered the most urgent part of that, he said, which explains its priority on the list of projects.

It is anticipated that the improvements which are to be made in the existing two lane route and replace it with a modern expressway will reduce accidents there to one-third of present total.

Proposed Changes
Hill said that the entire improvement would serve to eliminate the existing grade intersection at Routes U. S. 6 and U. S. 44 and at the same time replace the existing bridge over the New Haven Railroad.

Over the adequacy of the state's proposals as to the Notch construction. Residents and property owners in the area were opposed to a "throughway" idea, with limited access to the highway from adjacent property for considerable distances from the Notch. Rockville School Study Plan Viewed

Big Furniture Buying Noted

Americans Purchasing At Rate of Three Billions a Year, Is Report

Washington, May 24.—(AP)—Americans are buying furniture at the unprecedented rate of \$3,000,000,000 a year, the Commerce Department said today.

The department said the chief causes are (1) fat pocketbooks, with personal incomes at a \$201,000,000,000-a-year rate, after taxes, and (2) the record home-building boom, providing vast acreages of living space to be furnished.

Credit was rated of minor influence in the furniture sales boom. Actually, the department said, a smaller proportion of furniture is now—around 45 per cent—than in the last three years before the war.

The department's \$3,000,000,000-a-year furniture sales figure excludes outlets for household appliances and equipment. It compares with the previous peak of \$2,900,000,000 in 1948 and \$2,800,000,000 last year.

The average household at the present time spends about \$70 a year on furniture, a study in the department's May survey of current business showed.

Tram Hits Bus, Seven Killed

Loaded Glasgow Two-Decker Bus Upsets In Path of Trolley

Glasgow, Scotland, May 24.—(AP)—A speeding trolley crashed into an overturned double-decker bus, killing seven persons and injuring 43 here today.

A girl, about 17 years old, and six men were killed. Twelve of those injured were reported in a serious condition.

The bus went over on its side with a crash, said Alec Carmichael, one of the uninjured passengers on the lower deck of the bus.

The passengers were thrown about like tin cans.

"Almost immediately there was another violent crash as the trolley plowed into the bus roof. I heard screams coming from the upper deck and the crunch of twisting and breaking glass and metal work."

"Then just above my head I was horrified to see the driving cabin of the trolley pierce through the ceiling of the lower deck."

Doctors and nurses gave morphine to the injured, sobbing and screaming in the ruins, while workmen burned away the tangled steel with oxyacetylene burners to get them free. Most of the dead and injured were on the second deck.

Hundreds of horrified onlookers helped in the rescue and treatment of the passengers before police cordoned off the area. A priest hurried from a nearby Roman Catholic church to administer last sacraments in the wreckage.

The bus driver grooved out of his smashed cab and tried to tear open the sides of the bus with his bare hands to free the injured. Blankets and mattresses were laid in the streets to make temporary beds for the injured. A fleet of ambulances from nearby hospitals was rushed to the scene.

General Motors Contract
 The General Motors contract announced yesterday goes beyond existing industrial pension contracts by providing that if federal social security is increased, the total amount of industrial pension shall also go up. General Motors, in other words, agreed that if federal payments are increased, that will benefit the worker, not the company.
 In addition, the General Motors contract continues the "cost of living" index rule of General Motors wages. The so-called "escalator" clause, which provides that the union wage shall be increased if the cost of living goes up more than a certain amount, is retained. Moreover, there is a floor under the escalator, in that the union wage shall not go down more than a certain amount.

Is the Choice Ours?
 Up in Boston the other day, Dr. Henry Winston, president of Brown University, warned that the war is inevitable if America continues "along the muddy-minded road to materialism."
 Now that is a strange statement. One of the only things about it is that it refers that we ourselves, here in America, have a choice about whether or not there shall be a war.
 The normal American line is that we have very little choice about whether there shall be war—that that fatal decision is in the hands of the Russians almost exclusively.
 Normal American policy, too, is based on the assumption that it is the Russians who have exclusive possession of the choice for war or peace, and on the further assumption that the only thing we can do is to frighten them so much that they won't dare make the choice for war.
 Yet Dr. Winston goes on to Boston and declares that it is inevitable if America continues "along the muddy-minded road to materialism."
 He amplified his remark somewhat. He said that we are centering altogether too much attention and effort on military and economic preparations, and all too little "upon the essentially of intellectual clarity and moral courage."
 With this the situation, he said, that not only would war come, but that we might well lose it, for if we are going to use materialism to battle Russia, we are choosing the field in which Russia specializes.
 So it is a strange statement, but it is, after all, one which makes sense.

What it says, if we may venture to put a few more words in Dr. Winston's remarks, is that this country of ours will be choosing war if it reacts to the presence of Russia in the world by indulging in imitation of Russia and in battle with Russia on Russian terms. What Dr. Winston was saying was that our chance of winning peace depends not upon guns and dollars, which can merely tighten the present world deadlock into an actual physical one for an explosion, but upon our hitting the world conflict in the realm of such materialistic dead-end.
 Perhaps his point is a little intangible for common grasp. Perhaps it is hard to understand that the key safety and security of this country reside in qualities we cannot touch, that, even in the age of the atom, our greatest and most reliable strength is still spiritual.
 But, if we look at history, we will find that many nations great in size, great in natural resources, great in manpower, great in military might, great in wealth, have nonetheless gone down into history's twilight because they lacked something quite intangible. Probably they never consciously thought they were making a choice between survival and lack of it, or between some specific events like peace or war, but what kind of a nation we are. And we are, here we think, what principles we follow. And we are, in the end, influenced on whether or not there shall be peace or war. Our guns, our dollars, may merely look Russia into a corner in

Give Scholarships On Conservation

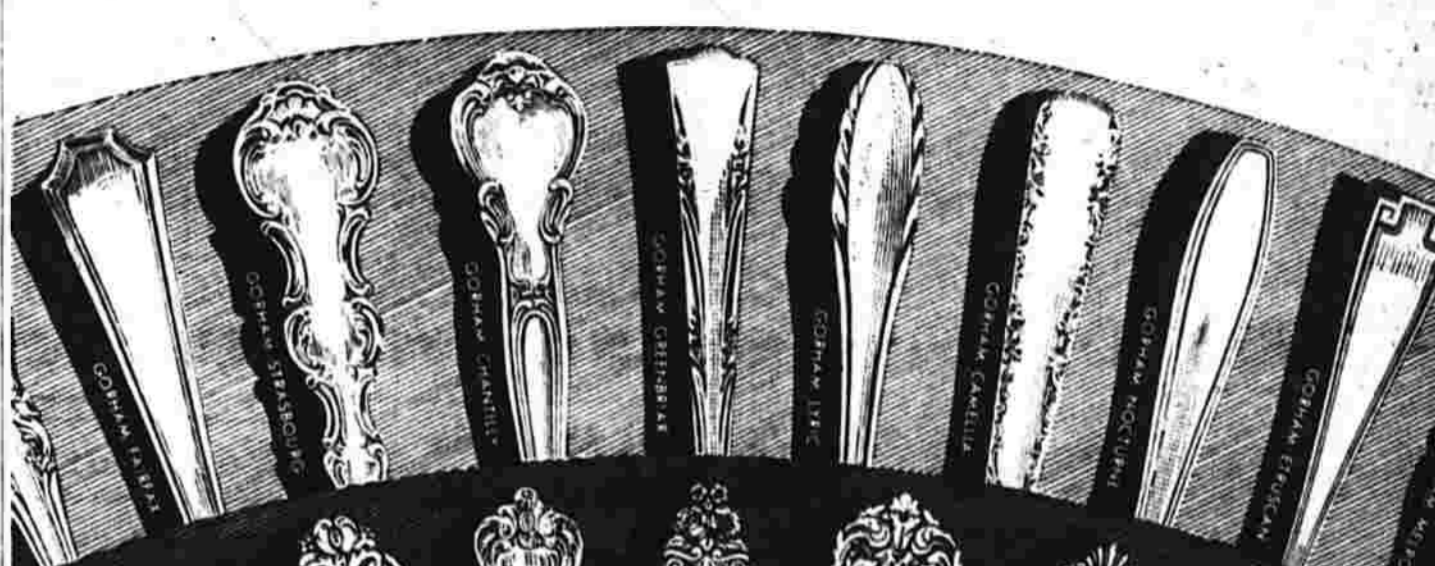

The new venture of the Connecticut Society in the field of self-defense recreation will open June 20.

The camp is located on the Huntleigh Turpines in the town of Nichols. It occupies over seven acres of land heavily wooded with cedar and hemlock trees.

"Three years ago the Hartford Junior League came to our rescue by including among its projects the raising of money to finance a summer camp which culminated last July with the purchase of the land we now own at Nichols."

"For this project," Mr. Love said, "the Connecticut Society is able to pay fifty per cent of the purchase price. Our share was raised through donations and our annual sale of Easter Seals."

For the first year the camp will have a capacity for 42 children and will be housed in seven cabins, six for youngsters and one for the older campers. Each group will remain in the camp for a three week period.

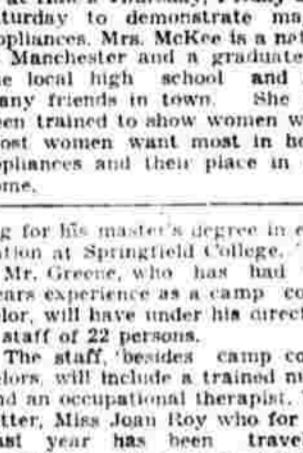

Columbia Baseball Coach, Al Lyman, a Real Veteran

Columbia. — (Special) May 24.—It was in 1893 and later burned. The company sponsored the American Legion baseball team. They just won their first game in the three years. He played with the town and was a star. He also came very near winning the professional league championship from Norwich with the team. Pleading to Note Balk Rule Is Being Ignored

New York — (NEA) — It is pleading to note that by common and unwritten consent the one-second balk rule is being quietly ignored.

The rubber-striking edict demanded that the pitcher stop for a full second before delivering the ball with men on base.

Jim Turner called it the worst piece of legislation passed in the history of baseball, and the old right-hander coaching the Yankees pitchers has been around for 25 years.

The one-second rule fouled up the even tenor of the game.

It was confusing to pitchers, bats, umpires and spectators.

There were no more than 25 balks called in the National League all that season, only 59 in the American.

With plate umpires one-second calls those respective totals were exceeded in the first four weeks of the current campaign. No fewer than 49 balks were called the first week of the Pacific Coast League season.

Stylish Vic Raschi of the Yankees was declared guilty of four in one championship game.

Previously, of course, the rule read that the pitcher simply had to come to a stop before delivering the ball with men on base.

The one-second business placed too fine a line on interpretation. Some umpires were strict, others lenient.

It strapped an additional burden on the plate umpire as well as the pitcher.

The older fellows were the hardest hit, so much so that there was talk of exempting them from the one-second rule but as agitators were permitted to finish out their careers with a glorious heave when it was banned.

"How silly can they get?" Veterans had to learn to pitch slow, in addition to having to get a fresh start on the plate umpire. "If we were pitching wrong all those years, why didn't they let us know," asked the Cardinal's Max Lanier.

"The pitcher is thinking of only one thing," said Coach Turner of the Yankees.

"That is holding the runner on base and getting the hitter out. When he has to take his mind off that, he's likely to be in trouble."

"And he isn't concentrating entirely on the hitter when he has to worry about how an umpire will measure his stop.

"Pitchers develop habits; they anyone else their own way of getting the hitter out, and it was wholly unfair to ask them to change.

"It was a physical impossibility for some pitchers to control the stop to a greater extent than before."

"Worrying about the timing of the stop was tough on control and threw the pitcher's rhythm out of gear," said Max Lanier.

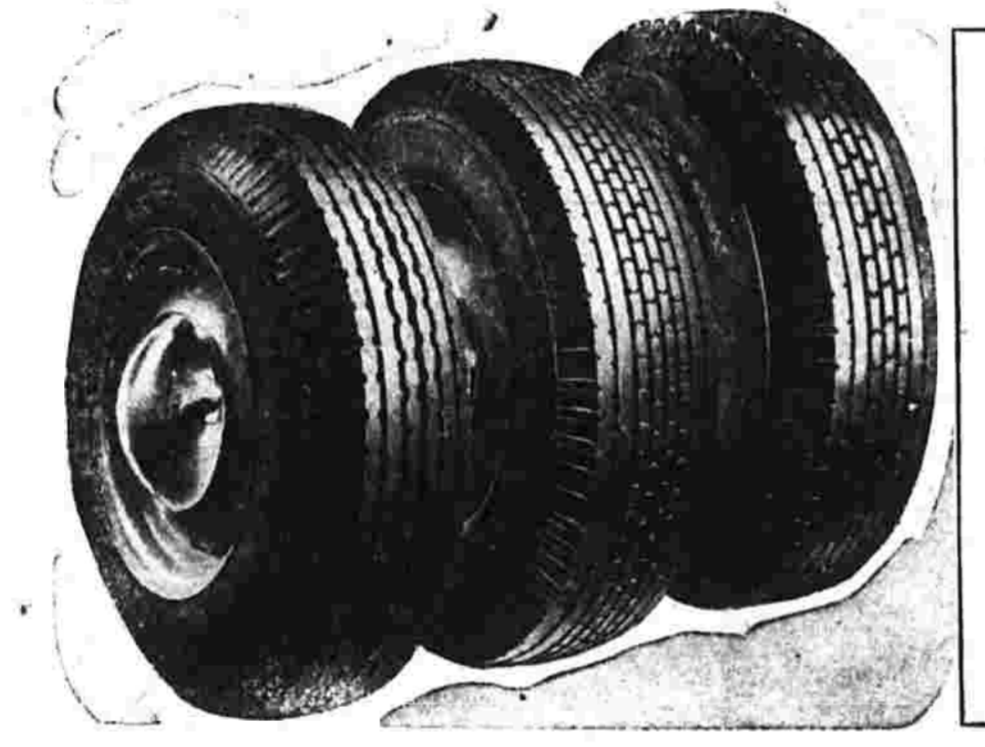

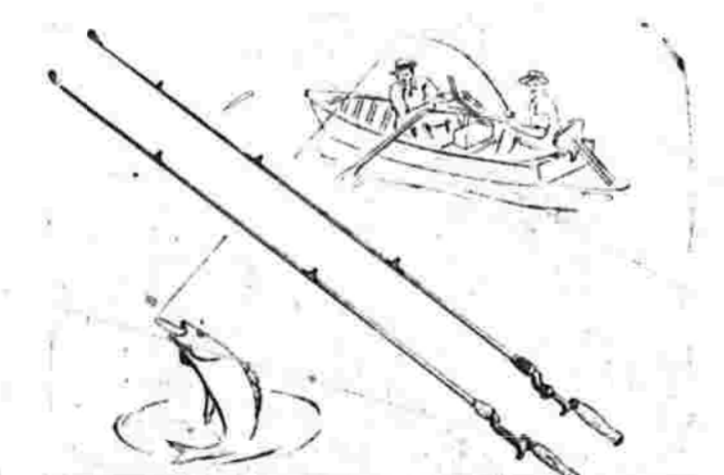

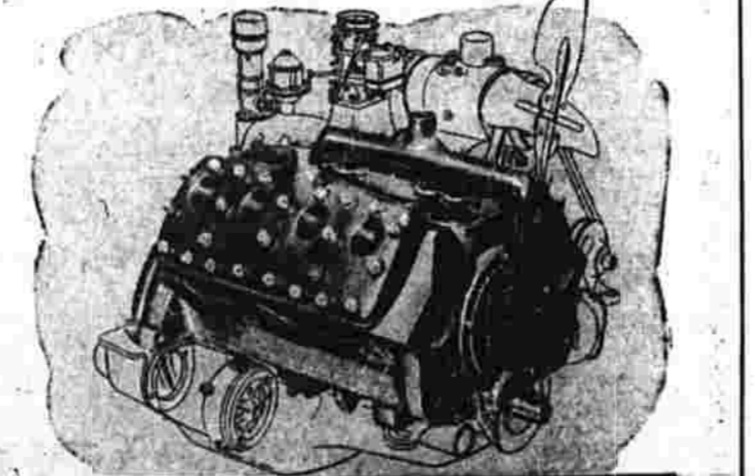

Acheson Will Tell of Parley

Secretary Sees Truman And Congress Next Week on London Talks
Washington, May 24.—(AP)—Secretary of State Acheson will report to Congress and the nation next week on the cold war affray talks he has held with Western European leaders.

Acheson will return from London where he met with the British and French foreign ministers and this with the foreign ministers of all the Atlantic Pact nations.

The State Department said today Acheson will confer with President Truman on Sunday and then appear before Congress on Wednesday, May 31.

Press Officer Lincoln White explained that Acheson will first make a public report to the Congress members and then talk to them in a closed session with the public barred.

White outlined plans for the public report after Senate Democratic Leader Lucas had announced questions at a private session May 31 at the verity of Congress.

Lucas made the announcement after congressional leaders met with Mr. Truman at the White House.

White then told a news conference.

"President Truman has informed us that he has discussed this matter with Congressional leaders and on Wednesday, May 31, Mr. Acheson will give a report to the Congress and the people. The first part of his report will not be executive. He will give a public report and then the meeting will go into executive session."

However, Chairman Connally (D-Tex.) of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee said he doesn't think anything Acheson says at the closed session will be secret long.

"You fellows will have it within an hour," Connally told reporters.

He added that his committee may ask Acheson for a private report on the results of the London conference before he speaks to the Senate-House meeting.

Senator Smith (R-N.J.) also said he didn't think "off the record" remarks of Acheson could be kept that way for long.

The matter of the Acheson appearance came up in the Senate yesterday afternoon.

Senator Stettin (R-Miss.) said he understood there had been certain agreements in London concerning economic help to Europe after 1939—the scheduled end of the Marshall Plan program.

"Will he discuss these agreements?" Stettin asked Lucas.

Lucas said he is certain Acheson would answer "in a forthright way" any inquiries put to him.

Acheson is returning from England by ship. He is due in New York on Saturday.

Greenwich ship unloading

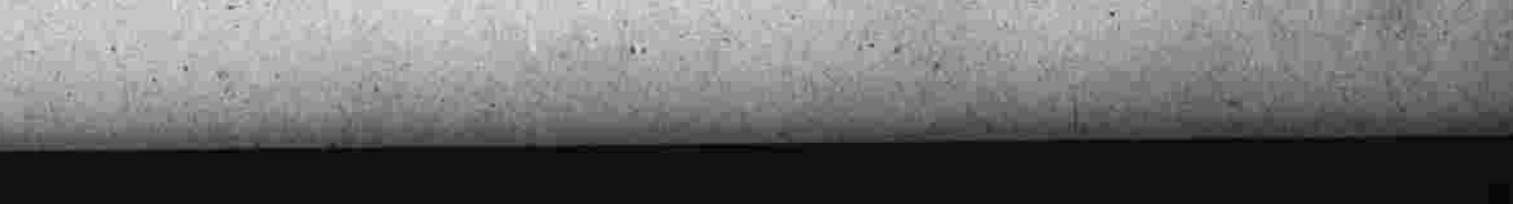

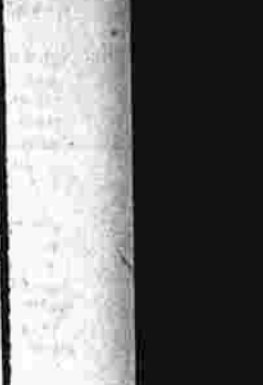
