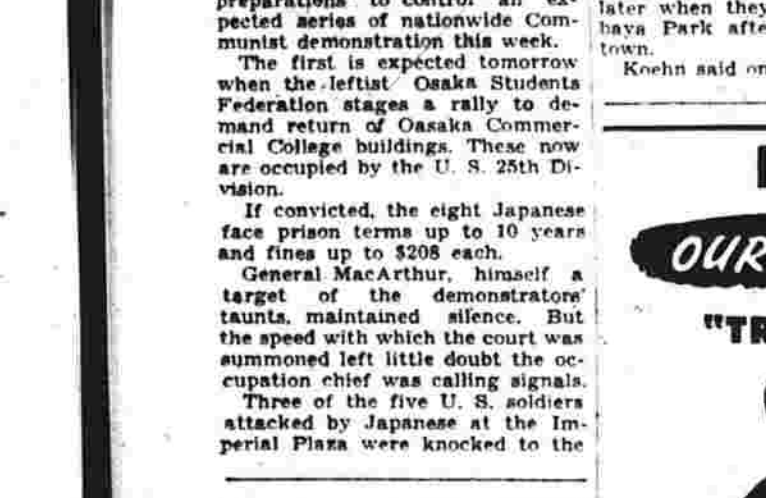

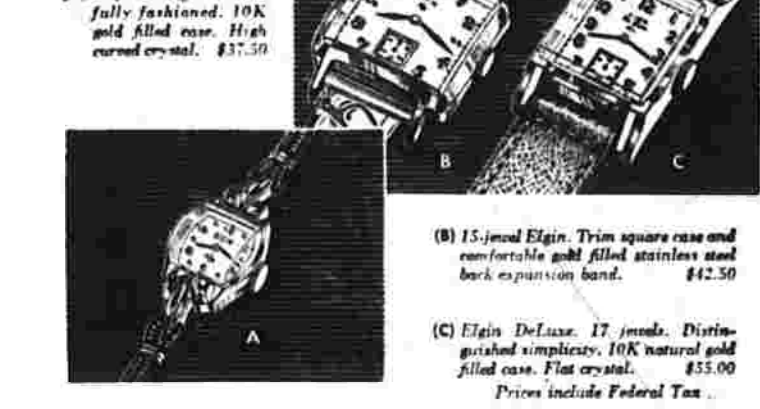

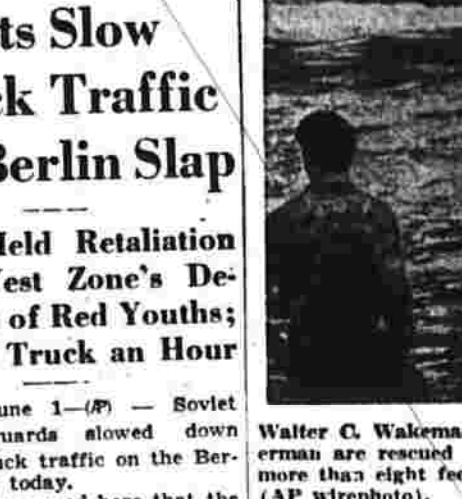

Increase Seen In Quota Here

State Blood Administrator Gives Reasons Before Local Workers

John Holloran, Connecticut Blood program administrator, told workers for the Manchester Blood Donor Drive at a meeting in the Holloran school building.

"Besides the benefits to the health of Connecticut residents which have been secured under the program, over 60,000 pints of blood have been collected and distributed during the eleven months following June 12, 1950 which formerly would have cost the patients \$20 a pint," Mr. Holloran said.

"Our quota for the coming year will have to be raised considerably because of increased demands from both the Armed Forces and the National program. At the present time we estimate that Connecticut will be producing in excess of 100,000 pints of blood next year."

"We are now supplying blood on the following priority basis: first priority is whole blood going overseas to Korea, second, blood for Connecticut hospitals; and third, blood to be produced in plasma for a stockpile for the Armed Forces. The present Bloodmobile quota for each unit is 150 pints but this will probably have to be increased in the near future."

"There is a tremendous job ahead for every city and town in Connecticut to meet the needs of the Blood Program. Although the Red Cross has been appointed the official government agency for the collection of blood for the Armed Forces, the cooperation of the Bloodmobile is necessary to put the program across."

Broad Street School Bonds

Directors to Be Asked to Authorize Their Issuance and Sale

General Manager George H. Waddell will, at the next meeting of the Board of Directors on June 5, submit a resolution that would authorize the issuance and sale by the town of \$800,000 in bonds for the construction and equipping of the Broad street school.

The resolution proposes 800 bonds in denominations of \$1,000 each at an interest not to exceed two per cent per annum. The bonds will be payable on the first day of July in each of the years of 1952 to 1966 at the First National Bank in Boston, with 60 bonds maturing on each July 1 of the 15-year period.

Reps. Gray, Best, Coolidge & Rugg of Boston is designated the law firm approving the legality of the bonds.

Was Approved by Voters

The \$900,000 appropriation for the 15-room Broad street plant, now under construction, was approved by the voters on October 2, 1950. Although the actual amount appropriated for the school now totals \$1,065,000, the difference of \$165,000 will be taken from the Capital Reserve Fund and replaced with the unexpended balance of appropriations from the construction of the Bowers and Verplanck schools.

The Board of Directors voted the additional sum after the appearance of a bid for the construction of the school, not including furnishings, was \$377,205. The \$165,000 was estimated as necessary to insure completion of the school and also provide a "safety margin" for unforeseen developments. The \$900,000 appropriation was made inadequate by a sharp rise in building materials since last year, the architect said.

Since the announcement of his appointment, Cervini has spent several hours in the collector's office to become acquainted to his new duties. Waddell has stated that he has every confidence in Cervini's ability to handle his new duties well.

A native of Manchester, the newly-appointed collector is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Cervini. He was educated in local schools and then for 18 years worked as a true revenue study man and road accountant at Cheney Brothers. He later worked at Steyer's store in Hartford as purchasing agent and foreman of the receiving and marking department.

Cervini has served as interim tax collector of the Eighth District and now is secretary and treasurer of the district and a member of its Board of Directors, from which positions he will resign July 15. He has been a member of the Manchester Fire department for 26 years and is its treasurer. He also serves on the house committee of House Company No. 2.

Nelson was first elected tax collector on October 3, 1926, and was then re-elected until November, 1947, when the new charter was adopted and he was appointed collector and his duties were increased. During his tenure, the town has been reorganized and expanded to keep pace with the rapidly growing town. When he took office, he was responsible for about 7,500 tax accounts, that has grown to over 18,000. The collector's office also handles 5,000 water bills every quarter and other income items totalling hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Waddell has paid high tribute to Cervini's ability and devotion to the interests of the town.

Holiday Toll For U. S. At 111

By The Associated Press

The nation's celebration of Memorial Day appears to have been one of the most successful in the history of World War II.

The death toll in violent accidents, 111, was one of the lowest for a single Memorial Day holiday in several years.

A new record low was set in the traffic death toll. The 66 killed on the highways was far below the National Safety Council's estimate of 110.

The Safety Council, noting that the toll was running below the estimate yesterday, termed the record "a marvelous achievement." Millions were on the highways for the season's first holiday outing.

The lowest traffic toll on a single major holiday since World War II was set last year's Memorial Day. Yesterday's traffic toll is not comparable to the 1950 figure as that day was counted as part of a four-day holiday. The staggering total in the four-day period was 208, including 240 traffic fatalities.

In addition to the 67 traffic deaths yesterday, 17 persons drowned and 16 others lost their lives in miscellaneous violent accidents.

He hasn't missed an annual reunion since entering the White House.

The White House yacht docked last night at Tappan, N.Y., Naval Mine dock. It will start out again during the morning. The president is due back in Washington Saturday, unless he changes his mind.
