Racial Ruling Gets Praise

Methodist Leader Says Supreme Court Decision Blow to Reds

Boston, June 8.—(P)—A Methodist leader says the Supreme Court's recent decision on racial relations "will do more than a thousand sermons" in stopping Communism.

Dr. Charles Ross, Jr., of Chicago, executive secretary of the Methodist World Peace commission, said "the church should lead in creating moral forces requisite to peace."

Speaking at the first evening session of the 154th annual conference last night, Dr. Ross said:

"The Commission on World Peace has officially concluded the view that war with Russia is inevitable. It is inevitable. 'Nor do the facts make war probable in the next four or five years or perhaps ten years.'"

"However, there are many who believe through distrust, hatred or fear of Russia that war—perhaps preventive war—is possible."

He said that many church committees on world peace "do little about it."

"We should demand," he added, "that the national government, Christian people give moral and financial support."

Dr. Ross said he believed that Mrs. Alice Campbell, president of the program, could be broken after the Chinese question is settled and the Soviet delegates again participate fully in the United Nations.

Christian Force Needed

Dr. William Cronland of the Asbury First Methodist church, Rochester, N. Y., told the Board of Evangelists that America needs all the world "desperately need" the Christian force of the church, which comes to those who daily practice the Christian way of life.

The Rev. Frederick W. Smith, executive secretary of the Maryland-Delaware Temperance League, called for a social revolution in regard to the public attitude toward alcoholic beverages.

He said that the church must believe that the solution of the problem lies in education.

He called for a constructive "crutch" to lead the way.

"About the most damnable thing I can think of," he added, "is to take liquor away from an alcoholic and offer him no substitute to deal with the craving that is set in his mind."

Meat Demand Reaches High

Statistics Reveal Consumers Using Wages To Buy More Beef

Washington, June 8.—(P)—The American appetite for meat is stronger now than at any time since the summer of 1948.

The Agriculture department in reporting this today said the desire for more meat—particularly beef—is reflected in a heavier demand at the meat counter and in rising prices.

Just after the war, demand for meat was unusually strong because of 1948 demand rose to a peak. It then declined, beginning a prolonged decline.

In 1949, consumers spent a smaller portion of their incomes for meat than they did before the war.

"The strengthening this spring is the first material increase in demand for meat since the summer of 1948," the department said. "Nevertheless, the gain in demand is probably no greater than the rise that has occurred in income. The retail value of meat consumed is probably remaining slightly below a prewar average relationship to incomes."

The department said it is unlikely that demand for meat will increase much more in the coming months or the next year or two, unless it is stimulated by a further rise in personal incomes.

Nevertheless, prices of most meats and meat animals are likely to go higher during the summer. They usually advance during that season, inasmuch as it is the period of about supplies.

Senate-House Committee Readies Building Project for Passage

Washington, June 8.—A \$200,000,000 program of defense construction was agreed upon today by a Senate-House conference committee.

Chairman Vinson (D., Ga.) of the House Armed Services committee said the bulky measure should cover all army, navy, and air force projects needed during the next two years, including the "sense emergency."

Approved from the bill was approximately \$100,000,000 worth of family military housing in the continental United States which had been voted by the Senate.

The House had struck this out on the theory that the so-called Wherry act should provide ample military housing in this country. This act provides government insurance for rental projects built by private investors.

The compromise measure authorizes a long list of defense projects in this country and throughout the world where army, navy and air units now are established. Congress must provide actual funds later.

An originally passed by the Senate it included about \$400,000,000 worth of projects to be given priority among \$2,000,000,000 requested by the House.

Waddell said this morning that the prediction has been registered, and that while some have registered alarm, there seems no question about the raising of a choice between more business development or more tax expense.

People today commenting on the Waddell statement were generally of one opinion: "We have got ourselves into a jam because ten years ago we didn't say 'no' to mass development."

One person said that if the town decides to try to stay residential, it cannot make it. He pointed out that many owners of small houses are foot individual property tax bills of \$300 or so. They would be forced to move. Large numbers of small houses would be brought on to the market, and their values in town. Only a very few persons, independently well off, it was held, could afford to pay the length of keeping the town predominantly residential in character from now on.

Business Faced To Come Others say that Manchester is fated to be a business center, and that light industry is the only way to seek locations here, if it can get in. These people feel that the town, not able to afford a full residential restriction, should now systematically seek to give such new enterprises a "chance."
