

Labor Strife Recalls Police

Returning Non-Strikers To Be Guarded from Violence of Mobs

Morrisville, Tenn., June 12—(AP)—Twenty highway patrol reinforcements were sent to strike-torn Morrisville early today to police the return of non-striking workers after the weekend to the American Express Corp. rayon plant.

At Nashville, patrol headquarters said 22 patrolmen were ordered here, bringing the force to about 30.

New violence occurred yesterday. Sheriff Robert Modin reported dynamite was exploded in front of the homes of two non-striking businessmen.

No incidents have been reported since the dynamiting.

Berry Market Soon to Open

To Start Here Next Sunday Afternoon on Charter Oak Street

Plenty of strawberries will be on the market when the auction market of the Manchester Fruit and Vegetable Producers Association opens next Sunday afternoon at Charter Oak street.

The berries are expected to be smaller but the crop will be the largest in several years, according to farmers.

Gordon Field is the auctioneer and will conduct the auction. William Suggie is the auction master and the Manchester Fruit Company will be the treasurer.

Because of the dry weather last spring, the market was open for only 15 days. A total of \$311 crates of berries were sold with a total return of \$55,784.61.
