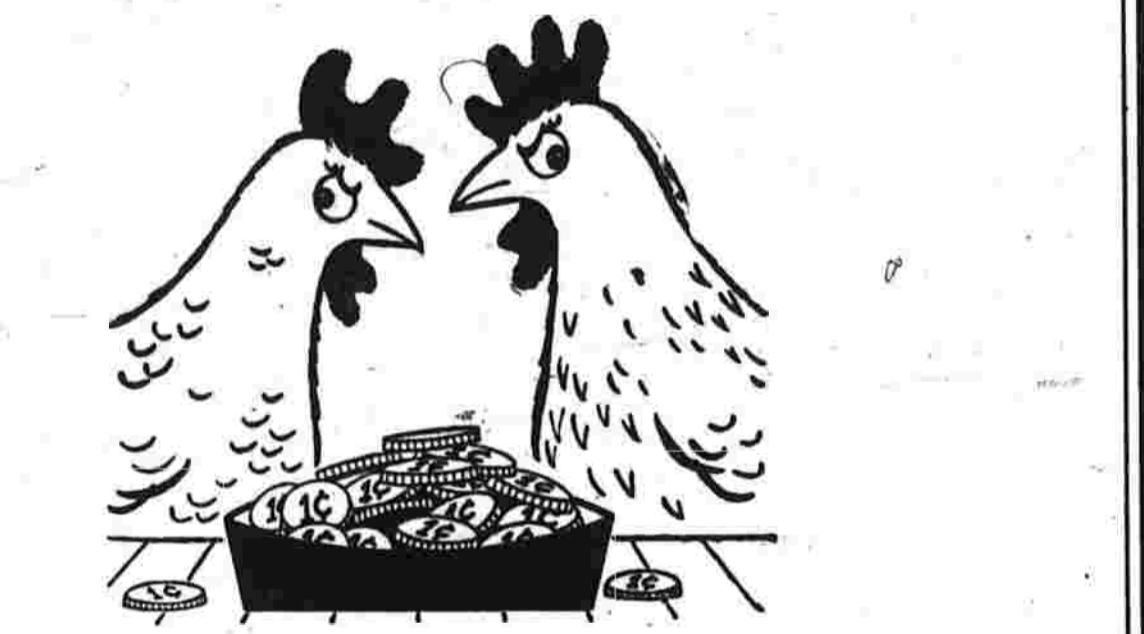

make new statements on the anti-Communist resolution which the council adopted Tuesday night by a vote of 1 to 1.
