Truman Requests Two Hundred-Sixty Million For A-Bomb

Part of Fund Will Be Used to Push Experiments on H-Bomb; States Full Confidence in the Atomic Energy Commission

Washington, July 7.—(AP)—President Truman today asked Congress for \$260,000,000 to speed development of atomic bombs and push experiments on the hydrogen bomb. Mr. Truman said the money would be used to enable the Atomic Energy Commission "to build additional and more efficient plants to carry out his directive of Jan. 31 ordering work on the H-bomb."

The president said the fundamental objective is to achieve the atomic bomb for peace, but he added: "Until this objective is achieved, however, we must strengthen our own defenses by providing the necessary atomic capacity."

He pointed out in a statement that his January directive called on the AEC "to continue its work on all forms of atomic weapons, including the hydrogen or fusion bomb."

Mr. Truman did not mention the H-bomb.

North Koreans Throw 150 Tanks and Nearly 90,000 Men Into War; Small American Unit Stands Off Top Red Division for Six Hours; Air Smashes Continue

Tokyo, July 7.—(AP)—American and South Korean forces were reported tonight to have recaptured Chungju and Pyongyang, important road junctions in the area south of Suwon where a big battle was impending. A South Korean colonel, considered a hero for his part in the recapture of the two towns from North Korean hands, had not reported capture of the towns. Both were taken by Communist forces.

Unconfirmed reports said a Communist column led by two tanks and two armored cars had raced down the coast road to within 10 miles of Pusan.

Pusan is vital port. The column, hugging the coast road, was said to have reached Pyongyang, a tiny fishing village between Yongju and Yongju. South Korean troops were reported holding Yongju, 35 miles up the coast.

Pusan is the most important southern Korean deep water port. Its facilities were said to be back some of the first seaborne U. N. forces.

Truman Order Stops Walkout Of Switchmen

Four of Five Railroads Return to Operation; Rock Island Selected To Test Legal Strike

Chicago, July 7.—(AP)—APL switchmen have called off their 14-day strike against four of five big mid-west and western railroads. They acted yesterday after President Truman called the strike unjustified and threatened drastic action.

The strike against the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific coast lines, the Denver and Rio Grande Western, and the Western Pacific, went all efforts today to get rolling again.

The end of the strike on the four lines came eight hours after the president had called a new contract if necessary to halt the walkout of 4,000 members of the A. F. of M. Switchmen's Union of North America.

An American official said the note was a "surprising" powerful enemy, using whatever they had handy when they were under attack.
