**Little Change In Idle Here**

**Situation Last Week About the Same; State Statistics Are Given**

The unemployment situation here remained practically unchanged last week as 431 claimants filed at the local office, including 256 females.

There were 428 jobless claimants filing for unemployment compensation. Forty-nine were initial claimants, and 33 were re-registered.

Five veterans filed, three initial and two continued. Despite an increase of 2,005 in initial claims due to vacation shut-downs, the number of jobless claimants for unemployment benefits in the state remained unchanged at 28,125 during last week as compared with 28,022 for the previous week.

The increase in initial claims was attributed to claims from employees not entitled to paid vacations during plant shutdowns.

Layoffs were reported in the following industries: Garment, electrical appliances, machines, hardware, telephones, and sports-wear.

Bridgeport continues to lead the state in the number of claims while Manchester was next to last.

**Part of Fund Will Be Used to Push Experiments on H-Bomb; States Full Confidence in the Atomic Energy Commission**

Washington, July 7.—(AP)—President Truman today asked Congress for \$260,000,000 to speed development of atomic bombs and push experiments on the hydrogen bomb.

Mr. Truman said the money would be used to enable the Atomic Energy Commission "to build additional and more efficient plants to carry out his directive of Jan. 31 ordering work on the H-bomb."

The president said the fundamental objective is to achieve the atomic bomb for peace, but he added: "Until this objective is achieved, however, we must strengthen our own defenses by providing the necessary atomic capacity."

He pointed out in a statement that his January directive called on the AEC "to continue its work on all forms of atomic weapons, including the hydrogen or fusion bomb."

Mr. Truman did not mention the H-bomb.

A South Korean column, considered the most important of the recaptured of the two towns from North Korean hands, had not reported recapture of the towns. Both were taken by the Communists yesterday.

Unconfirmed reports said a Communist column led by two tanks and two armored cars had raced down the coast road to within 90 miles of Pusan.

Pusan is vital port. The column, hugging the coast road, was said to have reached Pyongyang, a tiny fishing village between Yongju and Yonju. South Korean troops were reported holding Yongju, 35 miles up the coast.
