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"Prodigal Son" Sermon Topic

Dr. James V. Claypool is guest preacher at the South Methodist church. The guest preacher at the morning services Sunday at the South Methodist was Dr. James V. Claypool, who is vacationing at his summer home in Killington, Conn. He is secretary of the American Bible Society in Chicago but is well known in this area having preached here on a number of occasions.

His sermon entitled "Two Ways of Becoming a Sinner" was based on one of the great stories of the Bible "The Prodigal Son." He illustrated the lives of the two sons as an example of how wasteful and sinful our own lives can be. One son squandered not only the material things of life but also the love of his parents and friends. He had no sense of responsibility or self respect. 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Reds Push Yanks to Kum River Line

Washington, July 12.—(AP)—The American Government was reported today to be following with great caution as well as intense interest the progress of Anglo-Soviet talks on possible steps to end the Korean war.

So far American officials have shrugged in silence whatever behind-the-scenes roles they are taking in the diplomatic sparring.

Secretary of State Acheson scheduled a news conference for today and it was certain that he would be questioned about developments in the Korean conflict. However, there was no advance assurance that he would be willing to disclose the progress of Anglo-Soviet talks, which British has kept the government informed.

The next move in the diplomatic exchange appeared to be up to Russia, following the talks between Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko and British Ambassador Sir Malcolm Macmillan in Moscow.

It was assumed here that Kelly, responding to an earlier opening by Gromyko, had given some indication of a concrete proposal, of the kind of action the West would like Russia to take to help bring the Korean crisis to a close.

Diplomatic informants said warily that it was too early to say whether the Russians are really maneuvering to help and the conflict or whether they are simply encircling a hope that they will do so, while the actual fighting continues in favor of the North Korean Communists.

The British Foreign Office announced that it was in effect receiving their familiar "greetings" from Uncle Sam by Saturday—and all of them by the first of next week.

Byrnes To Be Next Governor Of So. Carolina

Columbia, S. C., July 12.—(AP)—James F. Byrnes will be the next Governor of South Carolina, and Sen. Olin D. Johnson will go back to the U. S. Senate.

South Carolina Democrats decided yesterday, in this State the nomination is equal to election. The 71-year-old Byrnes, former Secretary of State and Supreme Court Justice, easily triumphed over three opponents.

With primary returns in from most of the State's 1,572 precincts, the former "Assistant President" rolled up 208,418 votes. Lester I. Bikes, Columbia insurance executive and 61-year-old Thomas H. Pope, Speaker of the South Carolina House, had 38,080 and Marcus A. Stone, Dillon hatterman, 4,485.

Byrnes thus had an overwhelming majority of the vote, and the necessity of a runoff July 23. Johnston defeated Gov. J. Strom Thurmond 1950 States' Rights Democratic Presidential candidate.

Campaign Was Bitter Nearly complete returns gave Johnston 159,026 and Thurmond 14,002.

Johnston, 53, had declared his loyalty to the "national Democratic Party" and had accepted the charges the Senator "ran out" on the State Democratic Party. Thurmond's renomination two years ago. The State party supported Thurmond for President in 1948.

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Seek Big Cut In Money Bill

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### State Exports Status Better

**Drop in Shipment of Manufactured Materials Is 8.8 Per Cent**

Hartford, July 12.—Connecticut's direct exports of manufactured products held up somewhat better last year than did foreign sales of manufactured goods for the whole United States, according to preliminary estimates announced by the State Development Commission today. The decrease in Connecticut's direct manufactured exports from 1948 to 1949 was 8.8 per cent. Current statistics show manufactured exports for the whole country declined 10.3 per cent.

Among the major export categories, Connecticut recorded gains in 1949 over 1948 in transportation equipment, largely aircraft and parts and automotive parts, and in ordnance consisting of firing and ammunition. Other major classifications followed the general downward trend of U. S. overseas sales in 1949.

**Leading Products**

The state's three leading export categories last year were non-electrical machinery, fabricated metal goods and electrical machinery. Non-electrical machinery constituted nearly one-third of all Connecticut's direct foreign shipments last year. Based on an 88 per cent return in a state-wide survey, the Development Commission estimated Connecticut's direct foreign sales of manufactured goods had a value of \$122,181,609 in 1949 as compared to \$133,800,000 in 1948.

The commission said the latter total was reduced in accordance with changes made in industrial classifications by the U. S. Department of Commerce since its survey of a year ago.

**Direct Sales**

The development agency pointed out that its statistics are estimates of direct foreign sales only, since it is not possible to trace the large quantities of Connecticut-made parts which are sold to manufacturers in other states and used by them in making finished products finally sold abroad. It cited as an example of these indirect exports the fact that Connecticut makes about one-third of all the ball bearings manufactured in the country, but no one knows how many Connecticut-made bearings go into the hundreds of thousands of motor vehicles made in other states and sold abroad each year.

In gaining in foreign sales last year, transportation equipment jumped from \$12,823,556 in 1948 to \$14,052,081 while ordnance rose from \$4,418,778 to \$6,850,623, the estimates show.

Machinery (except electrical) headed Connecticut's 1949 export list, showing sales amounting to \$39,546,723 against \$44,677,007 the previous year. Export of fabricated metal products were estimated at \$22,321,200 in 1949 and \$18,612,816 last year. Electrical machinery had estimated foreign sales last year of \$17,078,660 against \$18,111,519 in 1948.

**Primary Metal Goods**

Transportation equipment and ordnance were next in line followed by primary metal products with overseas sales of \$8,345,421 in 1949 and \$7,005,768 in 1948; and instruments, \$6,321,243 and \$5,415,148 in those years respectively.

Although the bulk of Connecticut's exports were in the above named durable goods categories, some non-durable goods were also shown in some of the non-durable lines. For 1948 and 1949 respectively, their exports were estimated as follows: textiles \$2,980,556 and \$2,534,283; chemicals, \$1,906,487 and \$1,712,000; rubber products, \$1,720,066 and \$1,430,302. The miscellaneous group declined from \$3,014,201 to \$3,977,844.

### Water Costs Ark District

**Mahoney Says It May Be Turned Over to the Town to Operate**

Asserting that the "South Manchester Fire District may be turned over to the town within a year for municipal operation," Walter Mahoney, last night, told the Board of Directors that a substantial group of people in the District can't see how it can stand the high water cost and other expenses" laid down by the town, which "doesn't pay the District anything for protection of public buildings." The situation Mahoney said, may come to a head soon, with the possibility of the town being asked to take over the District as a municipal activity.

While there has been growing sentiment expressed for a town combination of the North and South End fire fighting systems, the reasons so far laid down have been on the side of efficiency and unity of action rather than on the score of water expense.

**Was Brought Up Before**

The approach from the new direction brings out a contention made before by SMPD officials that water charges so now imposed are more than the District should bear. Some time ago, however, town officials brought out that local "fire water" costs were actually lower than in many similar community districts.

Mahoney did not indicate what support he has in his contention, but he stated that the sentiment for handling the problem of fire protection over to the town is substantial and growing.

His statements came as the Board of Directors discussed the 1950-1951 town budget last night.

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Pentagon Fears Asia War May Last Till Fall

through protected inland routes. U. S. supplies must move by sea over distances ranging from the 110-mile crossing of the straits between Japan and Korea to thousands of miles from bases in various places in the United States.

It was recalled that more than a week ago there were reports of about 200,000 Chinese Communist troops assembling on the Manchurian border with the apparent intention of moving to the aid of the North Korean Army.

There now are reasons to believe that the force was only the beginning, that the foreign support for the North Koreans poised to come to their aid may have become much greater.

Should that be done (and the belief that it quite possibly will happen is prevalent in high quarters) the scale of war up to now would become only a preliminary skirmish between patrols.

So far, battle front reports reaching Washington, either official or news dispatches, have made no mention of Russians being among groups of North Koreans captured in the fighting.

Whether or not the "volunteers" are reaching front lines, Pentagon officials have discerned substantial evidence that back behind the front the North Korean campaign is being brain-trusted by able Russian staff work.

The key question in all this is whether Russia is or will be interested in trying to arrive at an understanding which would be acceptable to the Western Powers.

Other nations composing a majority of the Security Council have committed themselves to stamping out the Red invasion of South Korea. A compromise on this commitment is regarded here as impossible.

One current speculation is that any effort involving Russia, to solve the Korean crisis in the Security Council inevitably will raise the issue of Communist China's representation in that body.

Russia has declared flatly that any meetings held without the Chinese Communists are illegal and Russia will not participate.

Therefore, it might develop that Russia's main condition for settling the North Korean regime to call off its conquest might be acceptance by a majority of the Security Council members of the U. N. The United States has declared that it will not vote for such a change but neither will it veto a change which a majority of the other members might vote.

Washington officials
The British and American governments, however, are known to have been in close touch on the developments and presumably agree on further steps to be taken. These points are understood to be basic in their position:

1. On the chance that a settlement is reached, the United States will be approached through direct contact with Moscow, they will make every effort to explore the possibilities through the current talks.

2. The urgent need is to stop fighting and get North Korean Communist troops to withdraw north of the 38th Parallel, across which they launched their attack two weeks ago.

3. If and when a settlement becomes possible as a result of the informal talks, the United States is working it out in the United Nations Security Council.
