 When the other day, we  
 printed newspaper columnist H.  
 L. Phillips' "The G.I. and the  
 Flag" as a fine example of the  
 experience as they considered the  
 new world prominence of the  
 United Nations blue and white  
 flag, we felt called upon to re-  
 scribe ourselves, the hope for the  
 future bound up in that new  
 world flag.

Subsequently, Columnist Phil-  
 lips himself gave the other side of  
 the picture, giving the "Blue and  
 the White" as fine a tribute as he  
 had previously given the "Red,  
 White and Blue."

In fairness to Mr. Phillips, we  
 now reprint his "Lines To The  
 Global Colors" as follows:

"Flag of the United Nations....  
 You rate a Francis Scott Key....  
 You fit into a George Chan-  
 song.  
 Long ago you were

 "I have compassion on the multi-  
 tudes"....  
 "Peace on earth, good will to  
 men"....  
 And the equivalent in all faiths:  
 You'll see, Flag of UN....  
 A grand old rag!—No, not  
 yet....  
 You've got to be tested....  
 You must know the rocket's red  
 glare....  
 The bombs bursting in air....  
 You've got a job out for you,  
 baby....  
 But few flags in history have  
 meant more!

Many flags have been symbols  
 for a nation—  
 You are a symbol for a world!  
 Many have stood for republic  
 or kingdom....  
 You fly for the Brotherhood of  
 Man!  
 For the civilized concepts....  
 For the Sermon on the Mount....  
 For sacrifice and commiser-  
 ation....  
 For honor and decency....  
 You will bear jeers and sneers,  
 but not from this corner....  
 Come what may, old "Blue  
 and White,"  
 You stand as high as the hope of  
 mankind.

 near crucifixion!  
 Long may you wave through the  
 perilous night....

 Stars and Stripes

 A flag to which all mankind  
 May pledge allegiance!

**No Stabilization Yet**  
 Stabilization of the Korean  
 front has not come yet. This time  
 it has not been the fantastic hope  
 that the sight of a few American  
 would rout the North Koreans  
 which has been blunted. This time  
 there was hope on the part of mil-  
 itary authorities that the Kim  
 Ri-sev defense line could be turned  
 into something that might hold  
 at least long enough to slow down  
 the war measurably.

Once again, the North Korean  
 resources for attack have been  
 stronger than we hoped. The Kim  
 Ri-sev line has held a day longer  
 than the natural defense line we  
 needed in view of our inferiority  
 in numbers and equipment had  
 been dissolved, no other line of  
 defense would have been possible  
 on the Korean peninsula. That means  
 that the story will have to be  
 told, if it is told in terms of United  
 Nations victory in Korea, by an  
 adequate number of troops  
 adequately equipped.

The race for time still goes on.  
 Our military leaders profess con-  
 fidence in ultimate victory. But  
 even they must be aware of the  
 fact that we have been gain-  
 ing in return for our un-  
 necessary trading in of space than  
 was hoped.

It will have not blunted the  
 vigor of the North Korean as-  
 sault. Its object is obvious it is  
 to keep us moving backwards as  
 fast as we do move forward. We  
 must organize a defense line in ad-  
 equate force. Nothing can defeat  
 this purpose except enough men  
 and guns, on the spot.

Stockholm Peace Appeal  
 The trouble with that Stock-  
 holm Peace Appeal which has been  
 circulated in so much of the  
 world and which is now being cir-  
 culated in this country is that,  
 along with its appeal to all coun-  
 tries not to use the atom bomb in  
 the next war, it didn't also carry  
 an appeal to the North Koreans  
 not to use ordinary guns to start  
 that next war.

In this respect, the Communist  
 formulators of the Stockholm  
 Peace Appeal were unfortunate-  
 ly, taking part of their cue from  
 American atom policy. We have  
 been the ones who have insisted  
 that the atom bomb had to be  
 classed as a special kind of weap-  
 on, apart from other routine  
 weapons, and who have pressed  
 for atomic disarmament ahead of  
 routine disarmament. Russia, on  
 the other hand, has, in its own of-  
 ficial position, maintained, soundly,  
 that all kinds of disarmament  
 must go together.

In the Stockholm Appeal, how-  
 ever, Communist thought has, for  
 purposes of expediency, accepted  
 the American distinction. That, in  
 effect, says that it's all right to  
 have war providing you don't  
 atomize it. That is the fault of  
 the petition, as it was the fault of  
 the American position before it,  
 and that it is why it is no true  
 approach to the problem of peace.  
 The inner logic of the petition  
 demands it, for it is the logic which  
 permitted Communist aggression  
 in Korea at the very moment this  
 so-called peace appeal was being  
 launched in the United States.

**153 Current Periodicals  
 Found In Cheney Library**

A mere eighteen thousandths of  
 one dollar is the portion of the  
 tax dollar, in 1948-49, which  
 was used for library service to  
 the township of Manchester as  
 dispensed by the Mary Cheney  
 Library. This was the mean es-  
 tablished by the budget of  
 \$29,361.30 for the year ending  
 August 31, 1949 and the total tax  
 assessed to the township was  
 \$1,725,783.43.

A service made possible by this  
 budget is the file of 153 current  
 periodicals which the library  
 acquires, ranging from A for Aero  
 Digest to Y for Yale Review.  
 These magazines, various and sundry,  
 are placed in the reading  
 room until the subsequent issue  
 takes its place. Many regular  
 subscribers of the reading room  
 for the advent of their favorite  
 magazine and arrive almost  
 as soon as it does.

When a magazine is replaced  
 by its succeeding issue in the  
 reading room it is ready for filing  
 or circulation. Such material as  
 gardening periodicals, women's  
 magazines, hobby sports, art mag-  
 azines, and digested subject matter  
 are placed on the magazine rack  
 where they may circulate wher-  
 ever. The circulation figures of  
 such magazines for the year 1948-  
 49 was 5,429.
