**Progress of the Battle**

By the optimistic view of the military situation in Korea, we are doing rather better than we expected. This is, we suppose, startling news to those arm chair generals who thought that the appearance of a few American uniforms would be enough to send the North Koreans plunging back toward their own border in panic.

The theory that we are doing better than expected held, from the beginning of the Korean action, that our eventual bridging of Korea would be reduced to a 70 or 80 mile arc around the port of Pusan, which meant that we would lose about seven-eighths of South Korea before we made our final stand. This was based on a realistic appraisal of North Korean strength and necessary American weakness.

**First "World Commander"**

General Douglas MacArthur, in accordance with his own appointment as United Nations Commander in Korea, has begun to assume "United Nations Command" and "United Nations Resolutions" that carrying one step further the symbolism of the first ever fought for the cause of world law.

In his position as the first "World Commander" in Korea, he has taken to the MacArthur career. There is every indication that, with his personal love of the dramatic, he will be a fascinating story, and with his own previous awareness that only a new kind of banner representing higher spiritual aspirations of mankind could save humanity and civilization, he not only relishes his role, but considers himself to have been destined for it.

**Moonlight World**

There are those who argue whether nature is basically cruel or kind.

But such arguments, we think, cannot last very long under the kind of moonlight which has been visiting us of late.

In that moonlight, the hills and trees in full verdure are turned into shadows whose more close to one, in what seems obvious friendliness and comforting guardianship. In the dawn they are brighter, and more remote, more like individuals who lead separate lives. But in the combination of moonlight and shadow they are all brought into one blended atmosphere. Their kindly touch extends through the moonlight mist and rests upon your shoulders, and if you move about they wheel and turn and follow, always just as close, always reassuring. One is never lonely, only in a moonlight summer night. One never thinks of loneliness. For one is in a good and kindly world, in which the life that is human and the life that is the looming of the trees and the travel of the moon's light are mistily, indistinguishably one.

### Health Plank Is Released

**Platform Touches Upon Delicate Subject of State Role in Medicine**

Hartford, July 27.—A cautious approach to the touchy issue of government's role in medical care is made in a section of the proposed Democratic state platform.

The platform's plank on health problems were made public today by the drafting committee, which also released a concluding section summarizing its appeal to the voters to pull the Democratic lever when they enter voting booths next November.

The complete platform will be submitted for approval at the state convention being held here tomorrow and Saturday.

In writing the health plank, the drafting committee was aware of the controversy which has been aroused by various proposals put forward by the Truman administration. Doctors have organized to fight the national administration's health plan, contending they would result in "socialized medicine."

**Equal Right to Health**

The proposed health section of the state platform opens with an assertion that the Democratic party believes that the right of all people to an equal opportunity for good health is a basic right in a democracy.

It quickly goes on to add: "We recognize that progress towards this goal must depend upon the fullest voluntary cooperation of private, group and governmental agencies, and that no program can be successful which violates the professional integrity of our doctors, or which destroys complete freedom of choice for both doctor and patient."

In discussing the problem of equal medical care for all, the proposed section avoids definite pledges to any specific course of action. Instead, the party's statements were made more in terms of what was needed.

**Catastrophic Illness**

Under the head of "catastrophic illness," for example, it said: "We need to develop some way to protect our families from the tragedy and waste of this kind of disaster."

And under "preventive medicine," the proposed plank states: "We need to assess carefully our present disease prevention and to find some way of making periodic medical check-ups available to all."

The proposed health section also said there was need for more medical personnel and that "we must determine programs for training these people and supplying these facilities."

"Certainly," it added, "every
