GOP May Shift Campaign Plan

Strategy Change to National Issues Object of Politico's Meeting

New Haven, July 28—(AP)—A shift in Republican strategy in 1950 state campaign from state issues to national issues may be in the offing.

About 60 Republican leaders, including the entire state ticket, met here last night to discuss campaign strategy. Reliable sources reported that the meeting, held behind closed doors in the Hotel Taft, that much of the discussion centered on the new situation created by the fighting in Korea.

Party leaders were reluctant to discuss in detail what went on at the meeting, but John Lodge, Republican leader for governor, made this remark to newsmen: "In these urgent times it is our duty to make people realize the danger we are in."

Blaine Washington Ervold, Lodge said, said that the present crisis arises from "mistakes in Washington" made in 1945, and "We must learn from the mistakes of the past and provide fresh and forceful leadership in the critical days ahead."

State Chairman Clarence F. Baldwin told the news that the meeting had decided that "this is no time for business and politics as usual."

Baldwin said he intended to select from the group at last night's meeting an advisory committee to study the state of the party and the State Central committee.

In addition to the state ticket those present at the meeting included former Governor James C. Shuman, William Purcell, president of the Manufacturers Association of Connecticut, Glenn Saxton, Yale economics professor, National Committeeman William Brennan and National Committeewoman Julia Keeney.

Others in Mr. Truman's executive office believe the direct author of the all-out substitute announced immediately he will take the fight to the House floor when the bill comes up there next Tuesday. His measure would roll back prices to their lowest level before July 24 and 28.

The company denies the charge, made yesterday by James B. Carey, administrative head of the CIO International Union of Electrical Workers (IUE).

Carey said GE has shown partiality toward the United Electrical Workers (UE).

The UE, now independent, was ousted from the CIO on the ground of Communist control. The CIO set up the IUE to replace it.

Make Progress With GE Carey said UE is a "dangerous fifth column" in a vital industry and has "seen able to make the 'headway' in GE 'than any other large corporation in the country.'"

"Company propaganda" is GE plants in Schenectady, N. Y., and Erie, Pa., Carey said, had helped the UE win recent representation elections conducted in those cities by the National Labor Relations Board.

The charge was scoffed at by Luntel B. Bouhaver, a GE vice president. He said the company had not influenced the voting "one way or another" and added: "But Carey kept trying to get us to step out and work on his side. We refused to do that and said we had kept neutral."

In the companywide elections, which were held in Schenectady on June 25, the UE defeated the IUE.
