Police Chief Makes Report

Total of 548 Parking Violations in July; 23 Crashes in Month

A total of 548 parking violations is reported by Chief of Police Henry O. Schendel for July as against 513 in June. The number of arrests on other charges is listed at 81 while in June there were 84. July complaints investigated totaled 114. Traffic arrests were 59 in July.

There were 23 accidents reported in the past month, a decrease of two from June.

Two Breaks Reported patrolmen reported 65 street lights out, 113 buildings found open and secured, 102 windows open, 30 windows broken, 12 lights left burning in buildings and 52 vacant homes were checked.
