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See Completion Of Control Bill

Senate Group Will Work All Night If Necessary To Finish Measure

Washington, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Senators banking committee members today predicted completion by tonight of a home front mobilization bill giving President Truman a free hand to invoke wage-price-ratio controls.

The committee worked for three and a half hours behind closed doors. When the group recessed for lunch, Chairman MacLean (D., S. C.), and Senator Sparkman (D., Ala.), reported considerable progress.

They are going to stay until, even tonight if necessary, until they have finished the bill, MacLean said.

The Senate tentatively plans to start debating the bill Wednesday.

East Friday the committee approved the general principle of letting Mr. Truman put wage-price controls and rationing into effect if and when he saw fit that is the sort of plan the president has said he would accept.

Today, Sparkman told the committee backed down to the job of actually writing the bill. He tentatively approved at the committee's first session today.

1. Encouragement of voluntary action by business, labor, agriculture and consumers designed to keep the wage price and rationing situations in hand without mandatory controls.

2. Selective use of wage and price controls in the case of commodities which are necessities, meat or lumber. The committee made no final decision on whether price controls in those cases would be only at pre-arranged levels or would include the rationing level.

Controls based on ceilings from general wage-price controls. The section dealing with that authority says wage controls would have to be effect generally whenever price ceilings had been established on a selective basis on materials, services and property comprising a substantial part of all sales at retail and materially affecting the cost of living.

Those three steps would not have to be taken in sequence. The bill would authorize Mr. Truman to put general wage-price-ratio controls into effect if and when he saw fit, without resorting first to the voluntary steps and selective controls.

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Washington, Aug. 7.—(AP)—President Truman appeared certain today to get broad powers to wage price and rationing controls, but Congress was fretting over how to get them.

Banking committee of the House and the Senate called the bill today in an effort to untangle the legislative knot that prevented action last week.

To give its committee time to work out compromise, the House today passed a controversial control bill until tomorrow.

The terms on which they agreed were likely to agree would give the president authority to:

(1) Allocate materials and say who has first call on them; (2) Invoke wage-price controls; (3) Order rationing of scarce materials; (4) Make government loans for production and distribution of the extension of credit.

This is more than Truman would agree to accept if all Congress does is ratify the bill. The House, which voted for a mandatory automatic control provision and then reversed itself, appeared ready to let the president have his way on that subject.

The Senate Banking Committee has voted to give the President the free hand he asked for.

However, Senator Lyndon Johnson (Tex.), said yesterday that without the automatic feature tied to living costs, "I am afraid that controls may become a political football."

In related preparatory and anti-inflation steps over the week-end, Rep. Vinson (D., Ga.), chairman of the House Armed Services committee, called for a \$500,000,000 for a further expansion of the Marine Corps. Vinson is pressing for a speed-up in production of the first new type of atomic world War II, and for earlier completion of the half-finished system of radar warning against aircraft approaching the U. S.

Senators Charles McNichols (D., N. H.) and Byrd (D., Va.), suggested that the country's intelligence operations need improvement. They said they believed Korea war developments should be demystified by the press in the present system.
