Europe Must Work for Aid

...one high American official commented.

He recalled that military leaders of the Atlantic Pact nations are generally agreed about how many divisions, combat ships and planes would be needed to stop a Russian onslaught. Offers of ground forces for the common defense have been made, but this official said the total so far falls far short of overall requirements.

American officials believe that western Europe has little cause to doubt United States sincerity and determination to oppose Communist aggression. They say the whole world can witness the build-

up of U. S. Military manpower and armaments at a cost of billions of dollars.

"We will fight in Europe if necessary just as we are fighting in Korea," one informed officer said. "We have the right to expect that the Europeans will do their share of the fighting."

American officials in France are known to have been pressing Washington in recent days to give a solid promise to aid Europe with more troops and a supreme commander. These officials are relaying the pressure that is being exerted upon them primarily from French quarters.

Four Two Effects

Defense officials here fear that specific American pledges at this time might defuse the whole concept in Europe that if necessary, the United States will fight for them.

1. It would encourage the Communist propaganda that paints Uncle Sam as a dictator over subservient western allies.

2. It would tend to spread a feeling already current to some degree in Europe that if necessary, America is going to boss and do the job, why can't we just sit and wait?

U. S. officials generally oppose Winston Churchill's idea of a common defense ministry for Western Europe, preferring to work through the Atlantic Pact toward an allied general staff.

It will be time enough to name a supreme commander, a highly placed official said, after the staff is organized and knows that it can count upon an allied force in being or in an advanced stage of training with adequate arms.

Europe Must Do More

The primary American aim now is to persuade Western Europe to do more for itself. Military officials hope that the \$4,000,000,000 in additional arms aid funds which Congress has been asked to vote on will go toward stepping up Europe's arms production. So far, military assistance funds have been used primarily to send arms to U. S. stockpiles in Europe.

Electricians' Strike Today

Electricians' strike vote was taken today by 6,000 workers at the big General Electric Company at Syracuse, N. Y. GE has no contract with the International Union of Electrical Workers.

The rail strike threat was to the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen and the order of railway conductors.

A trainmen's union official commenting on the long wage-hour dispute with the carrier, told newsmen in Washington that "unlike representative of the country among the union's 200,000 members."

"We have reached a very acute stage and it is difficult to say what may happen," said President W. P. Kennedy of the trainmen's union.

Truman Optimistic

President Truman told his news conference yesterday he remains hopeful a settlement can be reached that will head off a national rail walkout.

A total strike by the 300,000 members of the two unions would paralyze the nation's major arteries.

But labor experts in Washington said the calling of only short "hot air" strikes at strategic points was obviously a tactic designed to avoid a national emergency. Such an emergency would undoubtedly bring a swift injunction.

Union officials were expected to meet with John R. Steilman, presidential assistant, today. Management representatives met with him yesterday but made no comment.

Rejects Seizure Pica

The work stoppage was ordered after President Truman rejected the union's request for government seizure of the carrier. The trainmen called the walkout of 3,000 yard workers at key terminals in Louisville, St. Paul and Cleveland, starting at 6 a. m. Monday.

Five-day token strikes against the short lines, the Joliet, Joliet and Eastern railroad with headquarters in Chicago, and the Pittsburgh were called by both both unions. The walkout will affect some 6,000 workers.

Both short lines are steel-carrying lines. A spokesman for the Joliet-Joliet line, which is owned by U. S. Steel Corp., said the strike would cut production of the Carnegie-Illinois Steel Company by 50 per cent.

Violence Flares

The first violence in the walkout was in the iron mines at Birmingham broke out last night. Picketers at the big Fairfield Mills hurried strikers and homes at midnight entering the plant shortly after midnight started a mass meeting.

The miners, affiliated with the Steelworkers Union, struck Monday in a wage dispute over job reclassification. The coal miners' members of the Independent United Mine Workers of America,

on Malik by Cuba's Alberto Alvarez and China's T. F. Wang.

Austin's speech was the first official statement of full U. S. aims in Korea since fighting began June 25, an American diplomat said.

Austin declared, in substance, that all of Korea must come under U. S. supervision as a step toward independence.

Austin did not say whether this would be accomplished by military conquest or by negotiation. But he made clear that hostilities must end in such a way "that no opportunity is provided for another attempt at invasion."

The assembly discussion tracked further progress of Indian's suggestion for a committee of the six non-government council members to seek a Korean peace settlement.

The Indian plan drew open support at yesterday's meeting from Yugoslav delegate Alos Boblec. An Indian spokesman said French delegates were interpreted as supporting the plan, but he added other governments are shying away until they see the plan detailed in print.

The spokesman said this probably would be done before council members meet again privately on the procedural deadlock.

Austin stressed to the council that "the United States has designs on Korea as a military ally and as a potential ally in the defense of the Pacific."

He said that the U. S. is determined to see that Korea is free for further attack on Asia.

"U. S. forces," said the U. S. delegate, "are not fighting in Korea, but mobilizing their resources over the world in order to further the political or military interests of any country. They are doing so because they believe they protect one small country, they are protecting all countries from political oppression and military invasion."

Malik ignored a United Nations command report, circulated yesterday, of operations in Korea between July 20-31. It is the United States called on other U. N. members to support the report.

Malik was quick, however, to read to the council communications from North Korean authorities. They mentioned that U. S.  If the present world crisis deepens, the world will see every American of physical capacity for military service will be involved sooner or later, and there can be no question of opinion in this country over the necessity for that. There is no division in this country, today, over the government's call for propensities manpower, nor would there be any division if the extent of this call for direct preparation duty should be expanded.
 But when universal military training is brought up, the issue is not only preparation for partial peil, now, or full peil later, it is also an issue of a way of life. Meeting the needs of the Korean campaign is one thing; establishing a system of life which, once established, would be most difficult to abandon, is something else. Preparing for a Third World War is one thing; accepting a permanent system of universal military training is another thing.
 Even were we to accept the possibility that in the third world war is inevitable, that would not necessarily be an argument for making conscription a part of American life. It would not be an argument for the immediate creation of a large regular army. It would surely be an argument for taking all the steps which would insure the American system of universal military training.
 This country has fought and won its great wars in the past in order to escape the kind of life and the kind of creed which would impose things upon human beings, which ought to still hope to escape that kind of life. Let's recall and treat all the men we think we need, now, and in the future. But let us not, under excuse of present emergency, surrender future American life to something this nation has fought and refused all through its existence to date.

Praise For One Corrupt
 Any one really eager to find out what is wrong with public service morality in this country might get a lead by reading the Congressional Record for last Tuesday when, in the House of Representatives, two distinguished Congressmen joined in fervent tributes to a former colleague, who is now serving a term for accepting bribes for the use of his influence in the award of contracts during the last war.
 That would be former Congressman Andrew J. May of Kentucky. The glowing tribute to him on the House floor was led off by House Majority Leader John W. McCormack, for the Democrats, and joined by Representative Dewey Short, for the Republicans.
 According to McCormack, May is a great American. The people of his district are justified in being proud of him. He and his country ally and courageously.
 And Congressman Short chimed in with more praise for May, who served faithfully, diligently and untiringly as chairman of the old Committee on Military Affairs during the greatest war in the history that men can be free.
