Heaviest Since July of 1947; Water Dept. Reports; Little Damage

The heaviest week-end rain since July of 1947 was recorded here by the Town Water Department for Saturday and yesterday. The Department gauge shows a fall here of 3.83 inches of which 2.74 inches fell from Saturday morning to Sunday morning and 1.10 inches fell from Sunday morning to this morning. In 1947 there was a period in which 4.33 inches of rain fell.

Brooks overflowed as the shower downpour succeeded each other, and many householders discovered leaks in roofs that have previously been weather tight.

No Serious Damage Some, but not large damage was done on the roads by reason of local washouts and flooding, and some collars took water. The dry ground however sogged up a great part of the moisture, and by last night, in many places where rain had fallen heavily, the ground was wet and damp, but not muddy.

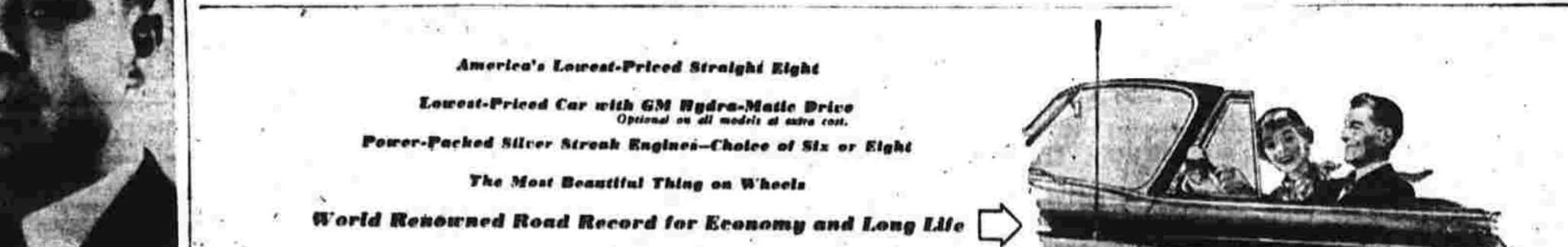
