Dewey on Formosa

Governor Dewey, up in Canada, faced up to one of the dramatic issues of the present.

"Because Great Britain and India have recognized the Communist Government in China, they may imply recognition of Communist claims to Formosa.

"What will happen, therefore, when the Communist offensive is launched against Formosa? Will the Communists then have succeeded in splitting us apart? Will the councils of the free people in the United Nations then be divided?"

"I say to you, with the knowledge that I am right, that it is Soviet Russia's clear purpose to divide the English-speaking people."

"We must stop waiting for catastrophe to happen and then rushing in to the United Nations and to our own inadequate defense forces."
