### New England Kiwanis Meet

Expect 1,200 at Convention in New London Sept. 7, 8, 9 and 10

Plans have been completed for the annual New England convention of Kiwanis International to be held this year at the Griswold hotel, Groton, on September 7, 8, 9 and 10, with the New London Kiwanis Club acting as hosts to the other one hundred and sixty-four clubs, comprising a membership of more than 9,000 business and professional leaders, who will send delegates to the four-day meeting.

Armed Forces Demands Force Pratt, Whitney To 48 Hour Schedule

Hartford, Sept. 1.—(AP)—Pratt and Whitney Aircraft is going on a six day, 48-hour week schedule next week, and plans to increase its working force by 7,000 to 8,000 employees in the next 12 to 18 months. Company officials said yesterday urgent demand for aircraft engines by the armed forces made necessary the stepped-up schedule.

About 8,000 of the plant's 15,000 employees will go on the six-day week effective next Tuesday. Officers will change over to the new schedule as instructed by the plant's general manager.

Washington, Sept. 7.—President Truman said today he will go on the radio Saturday night to tell the nation what he has in mind in the way of homefront economic controls during the emergency.

He said the plans will be put into civilian hands and added emphatically that there will be no military dictator in charge.

In making these statements at a news conference, the President reported the anti-inflation bill passed by Congress was being analyzed by many federal agencies. He said he will answer a lot of questions about it in his radio address over four networks Saturday at an hour still to be set.

Mr. Truman, in reply to questions, said he is not now considering setting up an independent agency to handle price and wage controls when and if needed.

Warn Europe On Inflation

Monetary Fund Experts Urge Curb on Reconstruction Spending

Paris, Sept. 7.—Directors of the International Monetary Fund warned Western Europe today that unless reconstruction spending is reduced, inflationary pressures will be increased.

The international money experts also asserted that continued wage increases will push up prices to a point where vital American markets will be lost.

The statements were contained in a 160-page report made public today by the current meeting of the Board of Governors. The Government members of the fund, representing 40 member countries, rule both the fund and the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development.

The directors voiced a viewpoint directly opposite to that of the left wing members—both Communist and Non-Communist—in Spain which is to be held.

Devaluation Aided Sales: The three parties maintain wages must be raised to meet increased living costs and tremendous reconstruction jobs still must be done. By contrast, the Fund directors said the danger of inflation would persist "as long as government expenditure and private investment are high."
