South Koreans Secure Defenses of Yongchon; U. N. Aircraft Mangle Red Regiment of 3,000 in Nakdong Bulge; Bitter Fighting Rages 7 Miles from Taegu As For Masses Men

Tokyo, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Allied and Red big-ranged fighting shurged at each other in bitter, close-run and lightening today seven miles north of Taegu. A fresh Red Korean offensive was expected there at any hour. Allied artillery and warplanes hurled showers of steel at Red troops and artillery pieces throughout Monday.

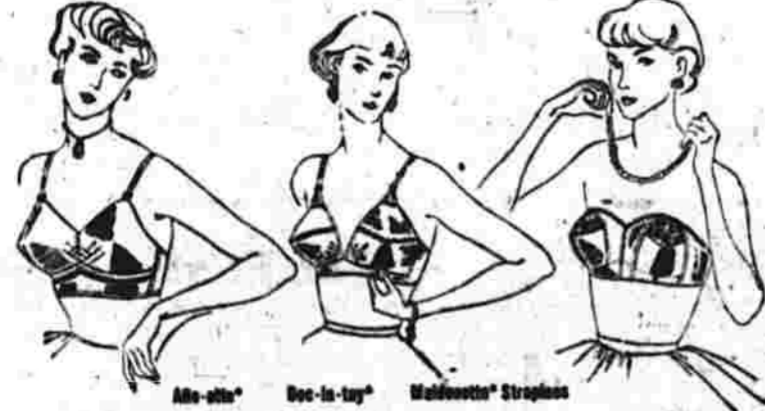

Little Resigns, Blasts Group

Says School Building Committee Was Not Influenced by His Advice

As rumored last week in the Herald, Wilbur T. Little this morning handed in his resignation as member of the Town School Building Committee. His resignation was accompanied by a statement to the taxpayers of Manchester in which he gave the detail for his action.

In the resignation, addressed to the Board of Directors, Little said: "I herewith submit my resignation as a member of the School Building Committee of Manchester."

"I regret the necessity of this action, since I had looked upon the appointment as an opportunity to assist in carrying out the wishes of the voters who were desirous of having a school built in the Broad street area, but wished to do so as economically as possible."

"Soon after my appointment I realized that the Committee, a majority of which were the original group, were not to be influenced to any great extent by any suggestions on my part, or by anyone, which would have resulted in real economy.

"Any further participation on my part as a member, seems to me futile as I am unable to reconcile my views with a majority of the Committee."

"The apparent readiness with which your Board accepted the resignation of the Committee report, seems to me to be further justification for my resignation."

"In his statement for the taxpayers, Little pointed out: "Since my appointment by your Board of Directors to the School Building committee, I have continually striven to influence the other members of the committee in favor of more economy in the construction of schools."

"The fact that the committee has now voted to present to the taxpayers essentially the same plan as was rejected by the taxpayers indicates that my participation as a member was unavailing."

"I believe Manchester is fortunate in having several well qualified men seeking the Republican nomination for State Representative. Results in the coming elections, made public this morning, showed that Manchester, with some 3,000 independent voters, can present a very independent slate.

Two Lives Lost As Home Burns

Mother and Daughter Burned to Death in Ellington Blaze

Rockville, Sept. 11.—(Special)—Mrs. Minnie Still Brigham, 88, and her daughter, Miss Lucille M. Brigham, 25, were burned to death, and their two young daughters nearly lost their lives when a fire swept through the old Brigham home at 36 North Park street, Ellington, just outside of the Rockville city limits, early yesterday morning, causing damage estimated at \$20,000.

Christine Brigham, the eldest daughter, discovered the fire, she said she heard an explosion and went downstairs to investigate. When she found the flames spreading through the lower floor she was unable to get to the upper floor but she found her mother and daughter had not come down.

The fire started back up the stairs but flames and smoke blocked her way. She was unable to get down the stairs and was overcome by the smoke. She was found by the fire department and taken to the hospital where she died.

The cause of the fire or of the explosion was not determined by the investigating officers. The fire was reported by a neighbor who saw flames coming from the house at about 10 o'clock.

The funeral will be held at 10 o'clock at St. Bernard's church, Ellington, on Tuesday. The interment will be in the St. Bernard's cemetery.

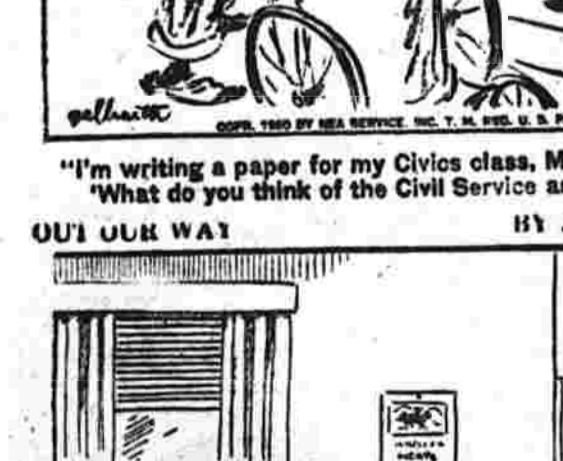

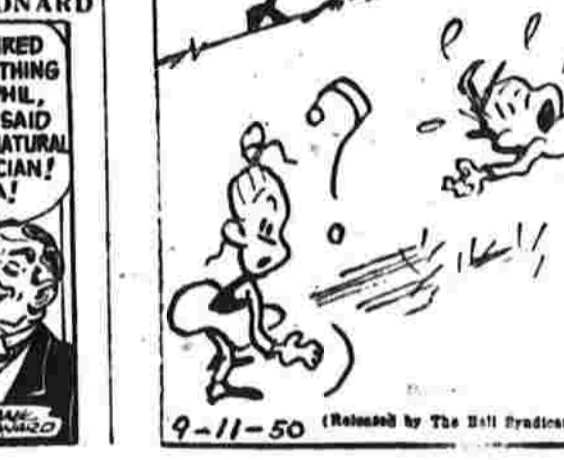

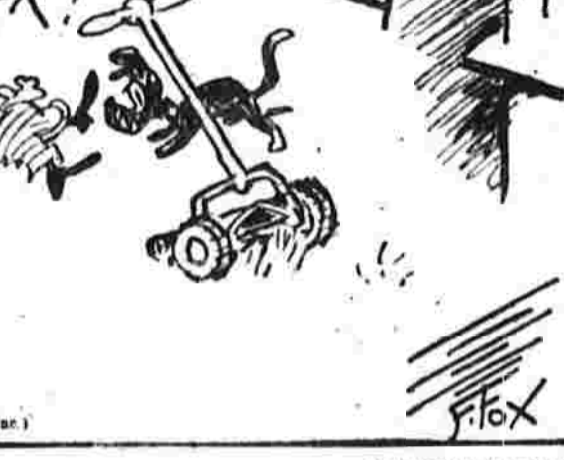

2,500,000 workers will be mobilized into arm production as part of a \$2,000,000,000 (20 billion) defense program during the next three years.

New austerity measures—rationing of cars and other luxuries—will be necessary because of the drain on Britain's economy.

The government is reviewing its controls over export of goods of potential war value to Russia and her satellites.

If necessary to keep the arm program going at top speed, the government will take over the allocation of scarce raw materials.

We shall have rather more than three fully trained divisions in Germany, the prime minister told the opening meeting of an emergency session of Parliament.

Connelly says protests against Ex-Mayor Won't Get Very Far

Washington, Sept. 12.—Democrats today discounted complaints against President Truman's appointment of Ex-Mayor William O'Dwyer of New York City as ambassador to Mexico.

O'Dwyer was asked to appear before the Senate Foreign Relations committee but Chairman Connally (D., Tex.), strongly indicated to reporters he doesn't think the protests against him will get very far.

Connelly announced that Representative Marston (R., N. Y.), who he said "started all this," won't be on hand to testify or to question the former mayor.

The anti-Communist pamphlet Marston had written the committee that it ought to investigate the "political machinations" involved in O'Dwyer's resignation as mayor of New York City.

The resignation forced a special election which some Democrats had hoped would bring out a heavy vote and boost their state-wide chances of electing governor and senator.

That hope has been clouded, however, by a party split in New York City. Acting Mayor Vincent Impertutti, a Democrat, announced he will run as an independent because he didn't get the party's nomination for mayor.
