Figures Drop In Idle Here

Decrease of 9.9 Per Cent From Previous Week; Only 209 Out of Jobs

Unemployment figures here continue to tumble, according to the weekly report issued by the State Labor Department. Claims filed last week dropped 9.9 per cent from the previous week, the total unemployed reaching a new low of 206 of which 196 were females.

Jobless claimants filed for state claims number 205 of which 17 were initial, 180 continued and eight again. Four veterans filed, one being new and the remaining three continued.

In the State

The number of jobless claimants in Connecticut was down to 14,717 from 16,188 the previous week and 58,828 during the corresponding week a year ago. Last week's total was the lowest since December, 1947. There were 400 claims last week due to vacation absences. Women claimants numbered 6,930 or 47 per cent.

Initial claims dropped to 1,423 for the week from 1,784 the previous week. A year ago there were 4,066 initial claims.

Claimants exhausting their benefits numbered 415, making the total 31,625 since January 1st. There were 25,166 exhaustions a year ago.

Washington, Sept. 12.—(P)—Allied troops got word today that they will kick off on the offensive soon against the big Red Korean war machine they have huddled to a standstill for a month. Lt. Gen. Walton H. Walker, Allied ground commander in Korea, said in a fighting talk to his frontline troops:

"Soon we are going to give up the attitude of defense. When we start forward and break the crust in front of us, the enemy will fold."

"We can feel a weakening of the enemy now, in some positions they actually are pulling out."

Red Units Flatlined The Sixth Army commander described the long weeks of delaying action as necessary "t agony and suffering."

Only through such an ordeal, he said, could the Allies build up power for an offensive.
