Red Mystery. Column Races from North

Truman Deplores High Living Costs; Vows Quick Action

Approves Attack on Taft By Harriman; Says Controls Plan Urged By Gov. Bowles Is Under Consideration; Pleased With Congress

Washington, Sept. 21.—(AP)—President Truman said today he is concerned about the high cost of living and he is working on plans to meet it. He told a news conference he will act as speedily as possible but is trying to avoid the mistakes of the last world war.

The president said his administration does not want the nation to go through the travail of the last price control period when it tried to follow the road of trial and error.

Mr. Truman was asked about wages not going up and prices rising fast. He said he agreed this was so and he is working on a plan.

Commenting on a statement made yesterday by Gov. Chester Bowles of Connecticut, former OPA administrator, favoring selective price controls, the president said:

"I am in and punch your time clock, but do not work. Don't leave the plant. If you get a pink slip (dismissal notice) forget it. This is not a strike. This is a work stoppage and protest."

Pilot of Death Train Breaks Down While Testifying in Court

Minneapolis, Sept. 21.—(AP)—A pilot of a train that broke down on the witness stand today as he told of his feelings after the wreck of his train with a toll of 32 lives.

He said he was given first aid at the scene in Rockville Center the night of Feb. 17 and was then taken to his home, where he found his wife in the living room "in a terrible accident."

Burial Face in Hands As he recalled the scene from the witness stand, he buried his face in his hands. His wife, in the front row among the spectators, broke down on the witness stand today as he told of his feelings after the wreck of his train with a toll of 32 lives.

Study Plan to Build Faster Cargo Ships

Washington, Sept. 21.—(AP)—A program for building super-speed cargo ships capable of traveling in combat zones without escort is under active consideration by Federal maritime officials.

Informal sources who cannot be named said today the aim is to build cargo carriers capable of outspeeding submarines and fast enough to dodge torpedoes, and make attacks from the air more difficult.

The fact that a whole group of ships traveling in convoy could be attacked by a submarine is a serious problem.

The House and then the Senate are expected to approve the bill, probably tomorrow.

The agreement cleared the way for Congress to adjourn this week until after the November elections, when it will come back to consider a "second installment" tax measure.

U. S. Lawyers Propose World Criminal Court

Bar Association Urges Trial of Leaders Who Ordered Invasion of South Korea Republic

Washington, Sept. 21.—(AP)—The American Bar Association (ABA) was expected today to call on the United Nations for creation of an international criminal court whose first defendants would be those who "ordered or caused" the Korean invasion.

The proposal, drafted and endorsed by the ABA's criminal law section, was up for action by the House of Delegates.

Lawyers here for the 73rd annual meeting of the ABA predicted prompt approval.

Washington, Sept. 21.—(AP)—Senator Humphrey (D., Minn.) said today that instead of restoring delivery cutbacks made last spring the Post Office department may have to curtail service even further.

He told a reporter the Post Office department will certainly have to absorb a portion of the \$200,000,000 cut in non-defense spending ordered by Congress when it approved a grant \$5-billion for the national assembly.

John Foster Dulles, described it as "target figure" by Congress for international peace and security.

The fight over the proposal is expected to start today in the Assembly's 14-nation steering committee.

The House has passed a bill on the subject of the Post Office. The bill would curtail delivery of mail to the Post Office.

Allies Speculate Whether Column Speeding from Manchurian Border Is Composed of Chinese Reds; Marines Enter Capital from 2 Sides; 5,000 Communists Trapped at Waegwan

Tokyo, Sept. 21.—(AP)—American Marines battled for ancient Seoul today while a Red military column was reported rolling down on the Korean capital from Soviet-dominated Manchuria. The nationality of manpower in the heavily-armed Communist column was not known to U. S. intelligence officers.

The Marines' entry into north-west Seoul's narrow streets was met by stiffening resistance.

Field dispatches reported the task-led leathernecks entered the city at 8 p. m. Wednesday (6 a. m. EDT) from their flight base, crossing eight miles downstream.

House-to-House Fighting The allied 10th Corps advanced from the original second front landing beaches at Inchon, 220 miles away, and have reached the almost house-to-house fighting zone of Seoul.

A big battle seemed in prospect. Besides the threat of the united Communist columns of 40 tanks and 200 other vehicles approaching Seoul from the north, the Communists were reported to be in possession of the city.

Marshall Takes Office Today

Washington, Sept. 21.—(AP)—Gen. George C. Marshall was sworn in as Secretary of Defense today at a ceremony attended by only two other persons.

The General was given the oath of office by Felix Larkin, General Counsel of the Defense Department. Stephen Early, the outgoing Deputy Secretary, was the only witness.

An announcement of the ceremony was made by the press. The ceremony was held at 8:45 a. m. in the office of the Secretary of Defense.

Marshall, who has spent only a few days in the office of the Secretary of Defense, will have a busy day today.

Marshall Tito Denies Curbs

Belgrade, Sept. 21.—(AP)—A world-touring American congressman today said that he had learned that Marshal Tito today was saying the "entire religious situation" in Yugoslavia is now under review.

The statement came in an interview with the Sunday Paper "Pravda" which along with Senator Brewster (R., Me.), Representative Boydy (D., N. C.) and Representative Poage (D., Tex.), left by plane today for Trieste and a three-hour chat with Tito.
