Canada Dollar On Jamboree Hits New Highs

Cuts Loose Over Weekend; Ranges from 93 Cents to 96 Cents in Terms of U. S. Dollar

By The Associated Press The Canadian dollar cut loose over the weekend to find its own level and gained three to nearly six cents in terms of the United States dollar in world money markets today.

In New York, most quotations were around 93 3/4 cents to the U. S. dollar, compared with the former official rate of 91 cents and the closing rate Friday of 90 7/8.

However, New York quotations ranged up to 94 5/8 and down to 93 cents, and there were very few transactions as traders waited for the Canadian currency to stabilize.

In Montreal, the Canadian dollar fluctuated between 93 and 95 cents in U. S. funds in early trading.

Three-needle street is high. The Bank of England announced new Canadian dollar rates in London that were the equivalent of 96.6 cents in U. S. currency compared with 90.7 cents last week.

The Canadian Government, acting Saturday when transactions were suspended for the week-end, removed its control over the exchange rate for the first time since 1939.

Westinghouse Awards Raise 50,000 Employees Get New Contract and 10 Cent Hourly Increase

Pittsburgh, Oct. 2.—(AP)—Nearly 50,000 employees of Westinghouse Electric Corporation went to work today under a new one-year contract, giving them a 10-cent hourly pay boost and improved pension benefits.

The pact with the CIO International Union of Electrical Workers (IUE) expires September 30, 1951. It can be reopened for wage talks after six months.

The pay boost is retroactive to last September 18. Affected workers had been making an average \$1.56 an hour under the old contract.

Negotiations are continuing with three other unions in Westinghouse which have another 50,000 workers.

\$100 Minimum Pension The CIO-IUE contract provides a pension guaranteeing a \$100 minimum, including social security, for workers retiring after 25 years service. The company agrees to completely finance the pensions for workers earning less than (Continued on Page Four)

'World Citizen' Wants to Be An American

Garry Davis Asks Return of U. S. Citizenship Which He Renounced 2 Years Ago

New York, Oct. 2.—(AP)—Garry Davis, the World War II bomber pilot who proclaimed himself "first citizen of the world," now wants to be an American citizen again.

In a letter to U. S. Attorney General J. Howard McGrath yesterday, Davis explained his change of sentiment and asked for return of his citizenship at once.

Two years ago in Paris the 29-year-old combat veteran gave up his American passport and nationality to dramatize his ideal of a single world citizenship.

Married Dance Instructor Later, abandoning active work in his movement, he came home as an immigrant on a French visa and married Audrey Peters, a Hollywood dance instructor.

In his letter, Davis listed his American birth at Bar Harbor, Me., and his war record and honorable discharge.

"I am requesting immediate reinstatement of my former status," he said, "because along with the inalienable human right which will accrue to me as an American citizen, I wish to assume with a minimum of delay my full share of responsibility in safeguarding these rights."

Chief Inspector John J. Deary said Carl Hansen, 44, admitted in a signed statement he shot Mrs. Jeanette V. Worley, a divorcee, and her daughter, Lorraine, 13.

Mrs. Worley died in Rhode Island hospital a short time after she was shot in her cottage yesterday. Her daughter was reported in critical condition with a bullet wound in the chest.

Strike at 15 Philly Hotels Is Postponed

Philadelphia, Oct. 2.—(AP)—Representatives of two unions met today with officials of 15 major Philadelphia hotels where a strike set for last midnight was postponed at the last minute.

Three thousand hotel workers were scheduled to walk out their jobs two days before the opening game of the World Series and on the eve of the Master Brewers National Convention.

Shortly before the strike deadline, a joint negotiating committee announced the walkout had been postponed and that a meeting would be held today.

Judge Issues Injunction The joint committee was authorized to speak for the hotel workers at a meeting last night attended by members of the AFL-Hotel and Club Employees Union and the CIO-Hotel, Restaurant and Bartenders Union.

Earlier, management representatives said they wanted to negotiate with the two unions separately because the committee did not have the authority to bargain jointly. Last night's meeting provided that authority.

Judge James J. Gordon, Jr., of Common Pleas Court, last week signed an order restraining the CIO Union Local 856 from striking the Bellevue-Stratford Hotel.

Washington, Oct. 2.—(AP)—The television industry today circled this date on the calendar, marking the start of a third year of the freeze on new TV station permits.

French Seize Key Red Town In Indochina

Saigon, Indochina, Oct. 2.—(AP)—A French column occupied Thainguyen, Communist communications hub in North Indochina.

Two other French columns were advancing toward that principal military-political center, 40 miles north of Hanoi, on the left and right of the forces that entered the city.

Thainguyen, a major Vietnam communications hub about 70 miles north of Hanoi, was seized during what was described as the largest French offensive of three months.

Blast Way Into City A military spokesman said French troops slogging up colonial Route No. 3 over rain-drenched terrain, blasted their way into the city. The two flanking columns were hammering north to seize positions around the city.

The spokesman said the troops advancing north fought a series of skirmishes against Vietminh units seeking to stall the French advance. The main Vietminh resistance was broken at Duthanh, a river crossing 18 miles south of Thainguyen.

The French offensive was supported by fighter and bomber attacks against Vietminh positions and by large artillery concentrations, the spokesman said.

Paratroopers Dropped An hour before the French spearhead thrust into Thainguyen, paratrooper units were dropped north of the city. The paratroopers broke into the city from the north to join the French ground troops in their mopping up operation.

Units participating in the operation included native Vietnamese forces, French metropolitan troops, Foreign Legionnaires, and North African units.

The French seizure of Thainguyen was considered to have fractured the major Vietminh positions in north Indochina. The city is the center of a triangular mountain position (Continued on Page Eight)

Hull Urges 'Double Alert'

Washington, Oct. 2.—(AP)—Former Secretary of State Cordell Hull urged today a "double alert" against the dangers of Soviet aggression.

In a birthday statement, the white-haired former cabinet officer praised the effectiveness of the United Nations in dealing with Red aggression in Korea, but he warned that "grave difficulties and dangers still confront us on all sides."

Vishinsky Says Terror Ruled At Korea Polls

Lake Success, Oct. 2.—(AP)—Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Y. Vishinsky charged today that the United States had "bung a chaotic mess" in the U.N. and international law by ignoring a four-power agreement on Korea.

Addressing the General Assembly's Political Committee, Vishinsky accused U. S. Chief Delegate Warren R. Austin of a "deliberate and willful misrepresentation of the facts" in the Korean case.

The Soviet Foreign Minister spoke during committee debate on an eight-nation resolution for the unification and rehabilitation of Korea under United Nations supervision.

Charges Illegal Acts Vishinsky maintained the report of the present U.N. Korean Commission showed illegal acts were carried out during the South Korean election of last May. He added that supporters of opposition parties were beaten up.

The election took place in an atmosphere of "unbridled terror" created by the police of South Korea, Vishinsky declared.

Assaults "Land Reform" "There was the so-called land reform in 1949," Vishinsky said, "it was not satisfactory."

Vishinsky declared a Fascist state had been set up in South Korea. He accused American authorities of endeavoring "to bolster that Fascist state."

The Soviet Foreign Minister said "tens of thousands of Korean patriots resorted" to civil war because of the police (Continued on Page Eight)

Battle Revolt Against Arming

Margate, England, Oct. 2.—(AP)—The ruling British Labor Party embarked on a campaign today to convince its many pacifist members that rearmament against Russia now is vitally necessary to prevent war.

Party Chairman Sam Watson, an officer in the National Union of Mineworkers, called for support of rearmament and conscription. Both now are being carried out by the Socialist Government, although they were for many years opposed by the Socialists.

The Party's pacifist wing in Parliament has threatened to rebel over these policies.

Armed Forces Required "The history of the world is not a history of attack of the strong on the weak," Watson said in an address to the more than 1,500 delegates at the first session of the Party's annual conference here. "Armed forces are required to (Continued on Page Eight)

West German Police Triumph

Duesseldorf, Germany, Oct. 2.—(AP)—West German police today claimed a decisive victory over Communists who attempted to turn yesterday into a bloody wave of riots and demonstrations.

Police jailed more than 1,400 Red ringleaders and broke up every attempt they made to start riots in a score of cities.

The day marked for bloodshed ended with nothing more serious than scattered fist fights and stone throwing. About 30 police were hurt in the skirmishes.

Truman Assures Berlin Meanwhile, the people of Soviet-encircled Berlin received assurance yesterday from President Truman of continued aid to keep the city free. The President's message was delivered by Paul G. Hoffman, retiring Chief of the Economic Cooperation Administration, in a speech at the opening of the German Industrial Fair in Berlin.

"Our aid will continue," Truman's message declared, "for we are confident of the eagerness of the German people and their Republic to join the free of the world in defense of all that we cherish."

Red leaders had promised to make Sunday a bloody day of "national resistance" to the Western Allies and the West German Government they sponsor.

Try To Foment Riots The Communists had shipped in thousands of young fanatics, trained in "troubleshooting" from Soviet-occupied East Germany.

They tried to foment riots in the streets and squares of many cities from Hamburg to Munich. But they didn't get far against 100,000 well-organized German police.

MacArthur Is Silent On Crossing of Border; Eyes Chinese Communist Armies at Manchurian Frontier; Leathernecks Drive North from Seoul; Mop Up South Korea

Tokyo, Oct. 2.—(AP)—South Koreans ripped 30 miles into Soviet satellite Red Korea almost unopposed. Nearly two divisions—about 20,000 solely Korean troops—made the advance while their United Nations allies remained a third south of Parallel 38. A third South Korean division was poised to jump across the artificial border.

American liaison officers said resistance was very light. Indications were that the going would get tougher, however. Captured Red prisoners said the Communists were preparing to make a stand some 70 miles north of 38.

Neighboring Red China made threatening noises but there was no further indication that the Chinese Communists might intervene to save North Korea from unity with the republic.

Drive Launched Sunday The South Koreans drive was launched Sunday along the east coast and carried nearly halfway to the line where the Red prisoners said the North Koreans were building up for a last-ditch stand.

This line runs roughly across the Korean Peninsula at its narrowest point 70 miles north of 38. It stretches from Wonsan on the Sea of Japan through the Red Pyongyang capital area to the Yellow Sea.

The 38th Parallel

There was and could be no firm and clear solution of the problem presented by the 38th parallel in Korea. The dilemma involved is not, by any amount of study of theory, susceptible to a clear yes or no answer. The result is that we are pursuing a policy which is perhaps deliberately unworkable.

The dilemma involved is that, without crossing the 38th parallel, we are not likely to be able to bring about an permanent cure of the Korean situation, that by going beyond the 38th parallel, we may invite world war.

There is also another dilemma involved. Nations, like India, which approved United Nations action to halt aggression against South Korea are nervous about having United Nations forces themselves cross the 38th parallel.

Types of dilemma are such that they cannot be solved clearly. Yet some course of action had to be formulated.

What we are actually doing is to use a curious mixture of theory to launch a military and political policy which we hope can side up to our objectives without producing world war.

We are claiming that there is implied United Nations authorization for advance beyond the 38th parallel, at the same time, the advance is being made by South Korean troops, and that action is also covered by a claim that there being one legitimate Korean government, these troops are automatically privileged to operate in their own territory.

It is easy to revivify history from a later vantage point. It is especially easy if you have a mentality which can assume that one set of circumstances can be changed without altering the circumstances related to it.

In condemning Byrnes now, President Truman believes that the crime of which he got accused was that he was not aggressive enough in the world, and that it was a mistake ever to try to get along with the Russians.

It is quite obvious that not even the most ardent of those who are shaping from what American policy happened in the same book.

Curiously enough, in the same book, President Truman confesses an error of his own, as he has previously done. That is, he confesses that he erred in his own abrupt termination of Lend-Lease to Russia, which was the first "tough" post-war action of this country toward Russia.

When, in the same set of recollections, President Truman admits that his own early toughness with Russia was a mistake, and at the same time condemns a friendly atmosphere again, he is not being consistent in foreign policy. In fact, he seems to be talking his views of foreign policy to a double for Byrnes.

And, on the one hand, he admits that his own brusque policy may have alienated and disturbed Russia, with consequent effects on Russian policy in the world, while, on the other hand, he assumes that Russian policy was so rigid and evil, even then, that it was not to be influenced by anything he has it both ways, so long as he cracks Byrnes.
