There was no major fire and the damage listed for the month was extremely small. The biggest fire of the month was a week ago today when fire swept through a two and one-half story dwelling on Cambridge street. Estimated damages were listed at \$15,000 with practically all of the household furnishings and personal belongings being destroyed. The roof was completely burned off.

SHORT PROJECTS
The Route Conn. 12 and Laurel Hill Bridge project in Norwich is the shortest in distance of the three being 0.4 miles long. It includes two bridges across the Shetucket River, one of the site of the present Laurel Hill Bridge and one further up-stream and according to the estimate of the highway department will cost approximately \$300,000.

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Difficult "Middle Road"
 India, in its position, as stated at Lake Success and in Nehru's speech in India yesterday, is reluctant to bless the unification of Korea by force—even if the United Nations force. Yet India also opposes strongly the Russian proposal that the unification of Korea be attempted only after a withdrawal of United Nations forces from Korea. That India, too, would leave the North Korean Communists in a position to attempt to take over the government of the South, is a fact which the Communists would like to see. The Communists would like to see the withdrawal of United Nations forces would leave the way open for the Communists to take their forces again, thus illustrating the difficulty of the "middle road" Indian diplomacy is trying to recommend at Lake Success. The majority in the United Nations is most anxious to have symbolic India go along with whatever policy it adopts. Yet it is difficult, perhaps impossible, to put India's instinct into any formal course of action that could be voted on. India itself, for instance, does not present any formal resolution embodying its own recommended policy.

Yet, although it seems impossible to put India's wishes in the form of a stated policy, it should be pointed out that what is actually happening in Korea is, so far, not too far out of range of the Indian position. We are not insisting that Korea be united by force. At the same time, we are certainly not leaving any opportunity for the North Koreans to resume their efforts to unify it by force. If, as India believes, there are points of agreement between the Russian and the British recommendations for peace in Korea, in that both acknowledge that there ought to be one Korea, united under United Nations auspices, what is happening in Korea so far does not rule out progress along those lines. In fact, if India wishes to push its own position, it should do so by using its own diplomatic channels to produce more explicit assurances from Russia and the North Koreans that they really mean what the Russian proposal says, by suggesting the machinery by which that goal of unity could be accomplished without more fighting.

Not the 34th
 For those of us who have found that even a theoretical solution of the problem of the 34th parallel was a ticklish thing, there is some consolation in the fact that we never had to solve the problem of the 34th parallel. The 34th parallel? That's the parallel we might have had kids off of, had the fortunes of war in Korea happened to go against us. Had that happened, we would indeed have had a problem. We would have been confronted with a successful Communist offensive, which had gained its objective. And our decision would have had to have been whether to gather new forces and start all over again invading a peninsula where all military decisions would be against us. Probably, considering the fact that the United Nations had committed itself to halting aggression, the decision would have had to be to

build up forces and go back in. Yet it would have had to be a very costly success, uncertain as to its success. And we might have had that we couldn't afford to devote adequate force to the project at a time when Communist success might be going to Communist hands across the water. It's just as well we never had to face the problem. For the fact that we never actually had to face the problem of the 34th parallel, we can thank the averted travesty of the first troops who participated in the Korean campaign, the energy and speed with which they were reinforced, and the brilliant generalship with which MacArthur combined the defense of the Pusan beachhead with the organization of the assault at Inchon. These factors were present. The result is that what might have been a disaster, a defeat, a rout, is now a triumph. Street Meters All Paid For

Town Has Surplus of \$9,527 from Receipts of Parking Machines

Manchester's parking meters have paid for themselves and there is at this date remaining a surplus income fund of \$9,527.37 available for the purchase of an off-street parking area. According to provisions of local ordinances the income from parking meters is to be used in connection with traffic or parking projects.

Revelation that the meters have "paid out" is contained in the monthly report of Collector of Revenue Samuel Nelson. The figures published show that \$12,018.84 is held as a balance on hand from meter income. The total amount still due on the meters is \$2,491.47 to bring to full payment the cost of \$19,510.31 which the meter installation involved. This leaves an unexpended balance of \$9,527.37.

It may be applied toward purchase of the Archie Hayes property on Purcell place, a tract of 100 by 216 feet just off the Main street shopping area, said to be for sale by the Hayes estate for \$12,000. The Board of Directors last night considered the possible purchase of the property, which is a public parking place. It was decided that more complete information be presented on the proposal at the Board's next session.

The Nelson report on the parking meter income indicates a monthly take from the meters of about \$2,000. The property might be purchased within a month, therefore, without charge to any but parking meter income.

The meter report shows that subscriptions to date have totaled \$28,944.71 in the little more than a year the meters have been in use. The average yearly income from them appears to be in the neighborhood of \$23,000. Out of this must come maintenance which may grow more costly as the meters age.

However, the penalties and nickels mount up for provision for more parking space in crowded sections.

Lecture Given On Silver Here

Professional Women Enjoy Talk on History Of Precious Metal

A meeting of the Professional Women's club was held at Center church last evening, with Richard Michaels as guest speaker. Mr. Michaels talked on the topic, "The History of Silver," tracing the history of the craftmanship of silver, and explaining silver's great importance, both for its use in well-appointed homes, and as an investment of intrinsic worth.

Our own country has played an important part in the manufacture of both sterling and plate silver. From the time of the landing of the Pilgrims in the Mayflower came many skilled artisans who trained apprentices in turn. They worked in iron and other metals as well, and about 1600 some of them, from working with "white metals," began to be called silversmiths. Among the white metals one of the commonest was German silver which is an alloy, and not silver at all.

Plating discovered An American by the name of Rogers discovered the principle of silver plating about the time that Sheffield plate came into being in England. There, the process was learned by accident as the whitensmith by accident the broken handle onto a sterling knife. The first Sheffield plate was silver laid on copper; but because the copper, after a little wear, showed through, modern manufacturers sometimes use a different base.

The origin of the term "sterling" is an interesting one. In early times traders came from East Europe to England to barter, and were called in the common parlance "Easterlings" soon the first syllable was dropped; hence the word as we know it now.

Coin silver came into use in the nineteenth century. It was silver which was a fractional part less pure than sterling. The pieces made of it being struck from an alloy of about the same value as

Rockville Voters Adopt Town's Budget

Total of \$658,426 Approved at Annual Meeting in Rockville

Rockville, Oct. 4.—(Special)—With less than thirty voters present, a budget totaling \$658,426 was adopted at the annual meeting of the town of Rockville Tuesday night. Included in the appropriations are \$30,000 for general government; \$42,517 for highways; \$40,700 for charities; and \$219,900 for education. A new item this year is \$1,500 for fireworks. Chairman Kenneth H. Smith of the Board of Finance explained that this is for the community fireworks display which for the past four years has been sponsored by the American Legion through public subscription. The appropriation was approved by the Board of Finance with the understanding that, aside from the sale of refreshments, there would be no commercial features in connection with the display. Also included in the budget was \$20,000 for a new truck to be used in connection with highway work. Hereafter the town has hired trucks for this purpose.

Inspectors are expected to go over the roads shortly.
