Davis to Urge Changes In Voting System Here

Pointing to the crowded conditions at the polls Monday night as many voters were lined up waiting to vote at the 8 p. m. deadline, Republican Town Chairman William S. Davis this morning urged that the voting system here be changed to place a greater distance between the check lists and the voting machines.

"The present voting law states that when the polls close only those people who are in the process of voting can vote," Davis said. "Persons who have passed the check list are considered, according to the law, to be in the process of voting."

"Under the present arrangement it is possible that citizens who have not passed the check list, but who are in the process of voting, are denied entrance into the polls," Davis said.

"If more room were provided between the check list and the voting machines, persons could be checked off and standing on the 'legal' side of the check list when the polls closed and there would be no question as to their right to vote after the deadline."

Davis pointed out that under the present system a delay at the machine means a delay at the check list table because of the limited room.

The Manchester Council of Church Women has designated the week of October 8-13 as Ecumenical Register Week. It was announced today by Rev. Dorothy Pease of Central Congregational church, president of the Manchester Branch of the United Council of Church Women.

Release Study On Police Pay

Wages of Local Department Just Above Average for State

If Manchester adopts the 40 hour work week for its police department, it will be the fourth town in the state to do so according to a study of police department pay published by the Connecticut Public Expenditures Council. One town has a 72 hour work week for police.

Charles M. Atkins, executive director of the Council notes that the 48 hour work week for police is in effect in 45 of the 74 police departments of the state, many of which work longer than 48 hours.

Pay Above the Average

Pay here for police appears to be just above the average. Also average is two weeks' vacation with pay.

In the state there are 74 police departments ranging in size from 243 men in New Haven to one full time policeman in Easton and Norfolk. Municipal police departments have a total personnel of 38 chiefs, 823 other officers including 73 detectives, 1,863 patrolmen and 149 chiefs—a total full time paid force of 3,553. In addition there are 1,001 supernumerary personnel available.

Owe, said Talbot, was "a frequent contributor to the Daily Worker" and "has been known to be only the private enterprise man, but the church and patriotism as well."

Second—"to communicate" with the North Koreans. "Third—to see that the 'Assembly' resolution gives authority for both steps and also assures the men fighting in Korea that the 'Assembly' reports wholeheartedly the work they are carrying forward."

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Natural Gas Plans Ready

Algonquin Co. Assets It Can Take Any Reasonable Action in N. E.

Boston, Mass., Oct. 6. — Algonquin Gas Transmission Company is ready, able and willing to take any reasonable action to bring natural gas to New England as quickly and as advantageously as possible.

The statement came after a finding today by the Federal Power Commission that neither the application of Algonquin nor that of Northeastern Gas Transmission Company (the wholly-owned subsidiary of Tennessee Gas Transmission Company) should be granted in the form as presented to the Commission.

Mr. Swan stated that Algonquin would be willing to take any of the following actions: 1. To serve a part of New England, consisting of Boston, Cambridge, Worcester, southeastern Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut, under a feasible two-system plan recently worked out by the staff of the Federal Power Commission.

2. To endeavor to provide under Federal Power Commission auspices a single New England distribution company which would buy gas from the national trunkline companies which are owned or controlled by the Northeastern and the Tennessee Gas Transmission companies.

3. To provide gas service for the entire New England area through the planned Algonquin facilities to cover and serve areas now served by other companies.
