THIS IS HISTORY!—

Or is it just Protestant propaganda, unfair and unfounded?
NO! Christian love and fairness forbids unfair and bitter statements. No one should be hated personally for his or her belief, inherited or acquired. But the question still remains: What is the Right Belief?

Neither religious nor secular clargy shrank from the direct sale of spiritual gifts, and gave absolution for money to those who did not even profess to have contrilien. Martin Luther, himself a Roman Catholic Augustinian monk, priest, and professor of theology (D.D.), protested against the abuse which manifestly was not originally intended by his Church, which he loved. He was merely seeking now to correct the abuse when he POSTED NINETY-FIVE THESES, OCTOBER 31, 1517. on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Such posting erved the purpose of a bulletin board, for information and dis served the purpose of a bulletin board, for information and dis-cussion especially among the university people. Luther nailed these theses or sentences to the church door for the best interests of his Church.—Did the Roman Catholic Church officially teach what Tetzel preached? NO! But it happened. And that startled and started Luther when Tetzel came to town with considerable are. Some of Luther's own people came to the confessions as if the indulgence letters were sufficient.

The chief and central doctrine of the Bible, old and new Testaments, Saved by Grace Through Faith in Christ, the Savior of Sinners, brought real comfort to the Monk Luther. He was seeking by monastery life to earn extra credit for forgiveness and to get inner peace for his rest-seeking soul, by fasting, watching, denying himself in the cloister. Here he received some comfort from his superior, Staupitz, but when Luther himself really rediscovered the Central Biblical truth: "The Just Shall Live By Faith" (Habbakuk 2:4), he felt like a free man, at case in heart Faith" (Habbakuk 2:4), he felt like a free man, at case in heart and soul. This central doctrine alone satisfies sinful human beings in life and in death. It is, in short this: That we are saved by grace through faith in Christ entirely, and not even partly by our own merit or deeds. 
