League of Women Voters Reveal Candidates' Views

Do you wonder what the views of the local candidates are? Do you want to cast your vote for the person whose opinions come most nearly to your own? Then here may be some help.

Manchester's Republican and Democratic candidates for the House of Representatives have told the League of Women Voters where they stand on a list of state government questions sent out by the League for answer.

The town will send two representatives to the legislature. Last term the two were Republican Sherwood G. Bowers and Democrat John D. LaBelle. Both men are again running for re-election. In addition, two new candidates are on the tickets. They are Republican Ray S. Warren and Democrat E. Mac Holden.

The questions asked are these:

1. Do you favor any constitutional changes and if so, what?
2. Would you favor calling a constitutional convention? How should representation be determined?
3. What statutory changes in our present state government would make it more responsible, efficient and economical?
4. Bowers' View: "I favor the reduction in the size of the House of Representatives from a probable 277 members in this next session to 150-160 from each town in the state. I think it was a mistake to give officials a four-year term, but I doubt if that can be changed in any reasonable future. Otherwise, I guess the only treatment the old constitution really needs is to be brought up to date by having the superseded articles sifted out and replaced by new ones beginning to end with a sense of value and accuracy in each article that requires revision in force."
5. Holden's View: "If any wholesale constitutional revision is contemplated, I suppose that the convention would be necessary. As to representation, I think that about 375, ought to be divided into 150-160 districts, making a single senatorial district, making the more confusion may be generated."
6. Holden's View: "No doubt there are many ways to improve the operation of our state government. One of the valuable suggestions brought out in the session on organization last spring concerned a central purchasing department for the state, which it admittedly does not have at the present time. However, it must be remembered that most of the politicians, office and job holders who might be affected by any changes in the state set-up, are very loath to have any alterations in their status."

LaBelle Position
 Representative LaBelle, in his reply, says:

"I favor some constitutional changes. Annual Sessions of General Assembly (at least for budget purposes); Short Ballot for State Officers; Abolition of County Government; Prohibition against passage of Special Acts for great or Home Rule one representative for each town with periodic redistribution of Senate; change in method of Amendment of Constitution; Direct primary for nomination of Members of General Assembly; Unified Court system."

"I would favor calling a Constitutional convention with one member from each town and one member from each Senatorial district."

"Statutory changes in our present state government would make it more responsible, efficient and economical by reorganizing the Executive, Finance Department, Annual Budget, Department of Personnel, Public Works Department, Reorganizing of State Departments."

Candidate Ray S. Warren replies:

"I favor the following Constitutional changes: A. An amendment providing for one representative from each town in the House of Representatives. B. An amendment prohibiting 'dead jobs' and preventing members of the Legislature from holding salaried positions in the State government. C. I do not favor the calling of a Constitutional Convention at this time. Our present constitution is time-tested and works well. If changes are advisable they should be made by amendment as the Constitution provides for ratification by the people by vote on individual questions. If a Constitutional convention is called, the precedent of the 1902 convention should be followed in the method of calling it and the basis for representation."

"I believe that some procedure should be established to guarantee that the Constitutional process along the lines of both House Bill 48 'Creating a Temporary Commission on the Government Organization and Operation' should be enacted to eliminate overlapping functions in State departments and to consolidate governmental operations where the operations are similar and the consolidation will effect savings in force."

Mrs. Holden's Stand
 Mrs. Holden, replying, says: "I favor some constitutional changes: Abolition of County government. Culture placed under an efficient manager. State Welfare Department, State Planning Program and the State Department of Education. I would favor calling a Constitutional Convention. Representation to such a convention should be determined by population. It must be remembered that our present state government to make it more responsible, efficient and economical are: Redistricting of Senate. Reduction in membership of House of Representatives to one member for each town."
