disparity shall be systematically replaced by enforced conformity with the pattern of Soviet totalitarianism.

"That basic issue does not concern merely, or even primarily, the United States. If the United States gave way, the smaller nations would first pay the price, for they cannot survive unless there is collective support of a basic issue from which stem the particular controversies that create the danger points."

"Take Austria, Germany or Korea. It would be possible to reach agreement at any time if we accept conditions which would subject all Austrians, all Germans and all Koreans to dictation and servitude such as is now imposed on Poles and Czechs."

**OK Is Assured**  
The set-free system of collective security for which Dulles spoke has been overwhelmingly approved in the Assembly's 50-nation Political Committee. That assures the resolution's ratification by the Assembly itself.

The plans call for a peace patrol to check on the world's trouble spots, for the calling of emergency Assembly sessions, for 24-hour notice and for member countries to earmark some of their military units for use by the United Nations in time of crisis.

The Soviet Union already has several notices that it will make an all-out fight against the plan.

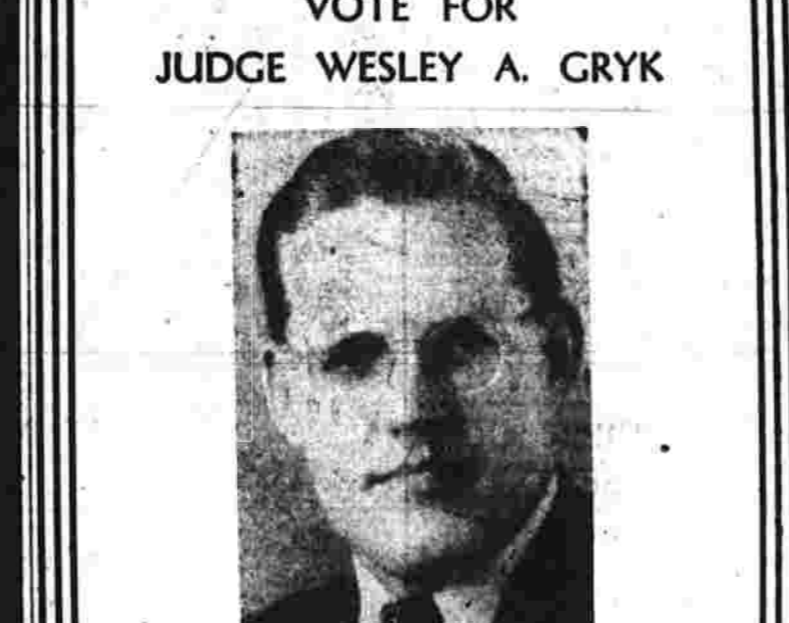

 Lindstrom obtained the decree in allegations of cruelty and desertion. It will be one year before the divorce becomes final. Under California law they are still considered to be man and wife. He and the Swedish actress had been married 15 years.  
 Miss Bergman did not contest the divorce but had previously filed an answer denying Lindstrom's charge of cruelty and desertion.

 Socialists and helped lay the foundation of the present Labor Party.  
 He claimed to be a Communist and an atheist. But if he was a Communist, the brand was not orthodox. Some of his comments, if made in Russia, would have landed him in Siberia. He attacked Karl Marx, the writer of Communism's "bible," as an out-of-date fuddy-duddy, and said most Communists were talking through their hats.  
 His atheism also was questioned. He himself once declared, "religion is always right. Science always is wrong."  
 The quizzical sage, whose bushy, once-red eyebrows and beard and unruly white mane were known to millions, kept the ear of the world for 50 years by his mastery of the studied insult. Though his career spanned the years from the Victorian to the atomic age, he never lost the knack of getting attention by wounding the pretensions or questioning the world's most cherished notions.
