Washington, Nov. 3.—(AP)—Federal agents moved on far-flung fronts today to nip any offshoots of the plot to kill President Truman which ended in blood-spattered failure for two Puerto Rican revolutionaries Wednesday.

The President continued to show no emotion as his official residence was searched for fingerprints and other evidence.

But the guard around him was increased and FBI and Secret Service men moved swiftly in an attempt to track down any of the pair's accomplices who might be dangerous.

The guard around Mrs. Torresola, 21-year-old wife of slain assassin Gerardo Torresola, was increased today.

The young woman had been the object of an intensive FBI search since her husband was killed by gunfire when he tried to storm Blair House.

He studied at Clark University, Worcester, for a year and was graduated from Augustana Theological Seminary, Rock Island, Ill., in 1935.

He was pastor of Emanuel Lutheran church here 1939 to 1944, when he accepted the position of director of stewardship of the Augustana Lutheran church with headquarters in Minneapolis. When in Manchester he was a member of the Board of Education, the OPA War Price and Rationing Board and a member of the Rotary Club. "Ned" Allen's Candidacy
 The other day, the people of Hartford probably noticed a certain mercantile establishment of that city would observe and establish new mercantile minimum wage standards despite the fact that the state retailers association had succeeded in gaining a temporary court injunction against the order of State Labor Commissioner John J. Egan.

There was no fluke about this advance, uncompleted observance of a new benefit for those who work for a living. The same man, against years ago, before any organized demand for such benefits existed, pioneered in the voluntary establishment of pension and paid-vacation plans.

The gentleman who is the management of that particular mercantile establishment has also been found in other interesting news stories over the years. Many of these stories told of his activities as chairman of the State Inter-Racial Commission. Others told of special citations to him as a pioneer and noteworthy example in the endeavor to make all Americans, of all races and creeds, better Americans together.

The same individual, Edward N. Allen, candidate for lieutenant governor on the Republican state ticket, has, over the years, appeared in many civic roles—he has always been a business man who believes that business men should take a positive and constructive interest in the actual processes of government—and in many honors in the world of Hartford, Connecticut, and American business.

Such well-rounded distinctions and activities reflect a well-rounded man and personality. Those who know the warmth of his personality, his modest lack of self-assertion in the midst of all his honors and accomplishments, the innate human decency which governs his relationships and attitudes, toward him themselves.

His nomination on the Republican ticket reflects a growing feeling that, and this is particularly so with state officers shifting into to four year terms with this election, the capacities and capacities of the man chosen for second place on the ticket should be equally worthy of selection for the first place on the ticket. The people of Connecticut should be able to think of the candidate for lieutenant governor in the capacity of governor without any sense of let-down or injury to the high prestige of that office.

No Safe Solution
 After months of disclaimers, the United States, are now regarded as the chief advocates of a rearming of Germany, and on the continent between the United States and France, which still fears an arming of the North Atlantic Pact defense of Europe seems likely to continue unimpeded.

Chronically, popular sentiment in Germany itself is closer to the French view than to ours. Perhaps it is that the Germans are truly sick of war. Or perhaps it is that they distrust the adequacy of the proposed European defense program, and don't want to be pushed into the front line of a possible war with Russia unless they are assured that there is going to be, in Europe, the stuff for more than a token resistance.

It is a sticky, grisly business, in which one of the victors in a war supposed to create peace seems to impress the manpower of the defeated aggressor into service against another victor who is now seen in the role of new aggressor. Nothing we do about it can seem quite right or safe. Not even the knowledge that the Russians may be doing the same thing with their part of Germany is reassuring. For all that would mean, in reality, is that it is high time both got out of Germany, unless we both stop preparing to use Germany in new war, we are going to have that war and destroy each other in it.

Setback in Korea
 The United Nations forces in Korea have run into a costly trap, consisting of concealed North Korean and Chinese Communist fighting forces which succeeded in surprising what the "New" Nations command expected to be a relatively unopposed march to the northern border of Korea.

There does not seem to be much doubt that General MacArthur can retrieve the military situation, at least to the point of getting things back under control. The question which will still be left, apparently, is one of continuing warfare in the northern section of Korea, which may resolve itself, if Chinese Communists supply enough force, into a stalemate of some duration.

When United Nations forces succeeded in crossing the 38th parallel without any military response from either China or Russia, and when progress up to the proposed MacArthur line, where we originally intended to halt in order to leave a buffer zone between American troops and the northern border was also relatively unopposed, we apparently felt quite certain that it was now all together too late for Communist China to intervene. On that assumption, we apparently, we revised our strategy and decided upon a full march up to the border. And now we have discovered that the Communist China has intervened, even though it was very late in the campaign, and that the intervention is of a serious nature.

What Nehru feared would happen if we went past the 38th parallel has now happened. It might not have happened if we had held to the original plan for a MacArthur line, which would have involved no direct approach to the Chinese border. Possibly it might not have happened if President Truman had not made a speech, the other day, in which he said that the power which has been supplied to China from North Korean reservoirs would be cut off.

But now it has happened, and the incipient enforcement of United Nations law is no longer concerned with a minor puppet, North Korea, but also with a major force, Communist China. It is a situation both ticklish and grave, which demands the full wisdom of all the nations committed to the United Nations program in Korea. The question to be answered is whether United Nations authority and prestige can be preserved without recognition and prosecution of full war with Communist China. Until a good answer is discovered, we must move slowly and cautiously, both diplomatically and militarily.

Lazy October

Did You Know That—

The Javanese "wayang" is a shadow play produced with leather figures. Potato production in Aroostook County, Me., is greater than that of any other entire state. The name of Baton Rouge, La., is a literal French translation of the Indian words "Red Post," used to describe a hunting-ground boundary marker. The Red River is so called because of the reddish-brown silt it carries. The Black Hills of South Dakota are covered with dark pine woods.
