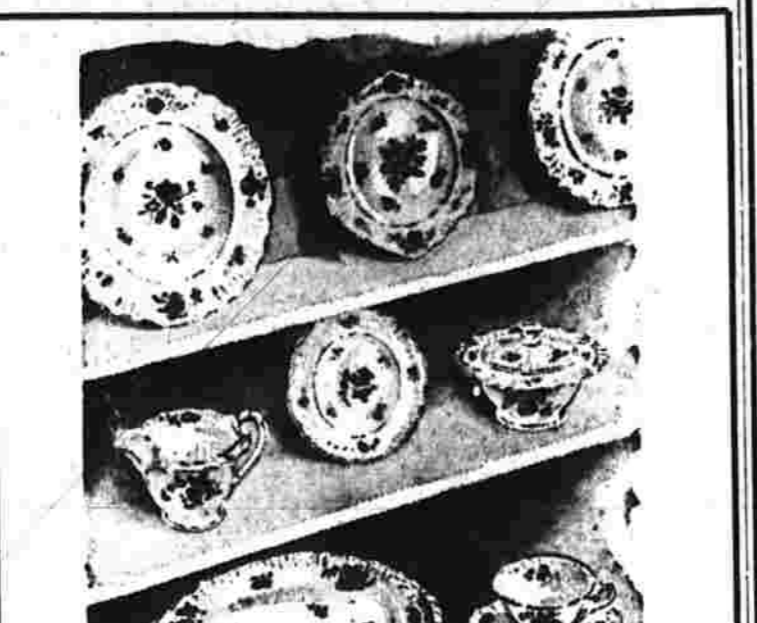

Our patented election prediction system has operated in two state elections since it does better than any other system in use today. It is based on a "scientific" system of "analysis of known data" which, if validated by tests, will have "serious political, sociological and economic implications," since it will do away with even the necessity of campaigning. By his system, the result of the 1950 election is statistically ordained, beyond outside pulls of personality, beyond shifting tides of opinion, beyond the "trial vote" of 700,000, and beyond the "trial vote" of 600,000, and picked the winner, McGovern, by 69,000 votes. We have bet our system against it.

Editorial No One Forgets

Two years ago, on election day, this column carried one of its more impressive masterpieces. It was a discussion of an issue learned and buoyant and confident, of the foreign policy which would be launched by Secretary of State John Foster Dulles. We saw much good in that foreign policy. We hailed it as a policy which would neither appease Russia nor founder in blind fear of Russia. There was no doubt that, by this policy, the world was saved.

There was, of course, one slight proviso to all this. Before Mr. Dulles could step into the office of Secretary of State, the voters of America had to go through a certain routine function that day and elect one Thomas E. Dewey to the Presidency.

Our discussion of Mr. Dulles' foreign policy as Secretary of State passed over that condition lightly and confidently. There was, of course, no doubt about the result of the day's voting. That result was universally considered. Some little fellow out in Missouri, name of Truman, was whistling bravely, just to keep his own front up. Some people even felt a little bit sorry for the little fellow, who just hadn't measured up to such a big job.

All we were going on in our editorial was to accept a foregone conclusion, and go on from it to gain a little editorial scoop on the country. We were the only newspaper in the country, probably, to be so far ahead of the trend that we were discussing the foreign policy of the new administration on the very day it was being elected.

Something went wrong. We still don't know just what. All we know is that, of all our masterful discussions of foreign policy, that became the one our readers remembered best.

Spare Us That Blare
 On this election day we think we can, with certainty, write the obituary of two political institutions. One is the old-fashioned political rally, presided by colorful parade—we dismiss a little badly. Yet the hard facts are that no political organization of itself is any longer capable of drawing out its rally audience which isn't by its paucity of numbers, an insult to the nation's winning its visit to it. In all this campaign, there was only one successful rally in Man-

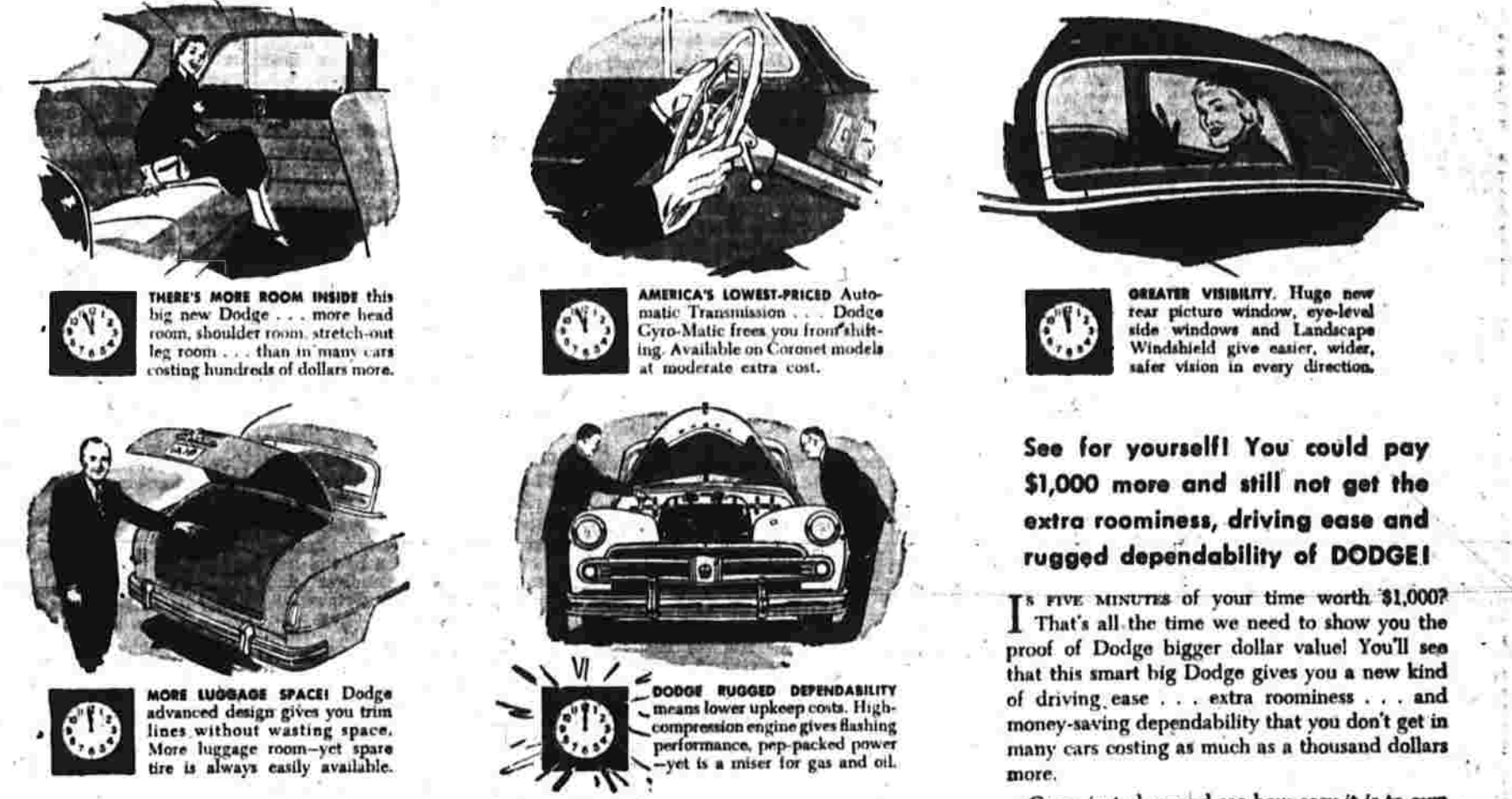

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U.S. Wants Red China Ordered

Out of Korea

Ask U.N. to Demand Immediate Withdrawal; Denies Peiping Claim Fighters Volunteered

Lake Success, Nov. 6.—The United States today charged the Chinese communists with the military intervention in Korea, and urged the United Nations Security Council to require the Mao Tse Tung regime to withdraw its forces.

Warren R. Austin, chief American Delegate, told the Council there are indications that 50,000 Chinese communist troops are in Korea and that the number is increasing. He said the United Nations should assist in settling any problems relating to Korea's frontiers.

That in offering assurance, the Security Council must also see to it that the authorities in Peiping are under no illusion that their conduct is condoned by the United Nations or that the organized world community is in any way inclined to assist in settling any problems relating to Korea's frontiers.
