 must be used to get China out of the Korean War peacefully since the alternative might easily touch off World War III.
 Moreover, the direct threat of a Soviet vote of Security Council action against the Chinese Federation is even more urgent, from a practical standpoint, to try alternate means of influencing Peking.
 Although the Assembly now has the power to take military action against an aggressor when the Security Council is hamstringing, no one is apparently willing to take the irrevocable step of sending the problem there before every other possibility is thoroughly explored.
 A Chinese Communist delegation is now enroute here from Peking but is not expected to arrive until late next week. Whether the final decision can be postponed until then is problematical.
 One of the more important factors in the opinion of India. Its chief delegate, Sir Benegal N. Rau, has been insisting that action be postponed until the Peiping delegation arrives.
 Meanwhile he has been preparing a resolution which asks the Security Council to ask the newly-established U. N. peace patrols to investigate the situation on the Manchuria border.
 Sir Benegal told a reporter yesterday that he had read in the Christian Science Monitor.

Acheson's Statement
 Secretary of State Acheson was definitely stated—and his statement marks the first time such assurance has been made anywhere on the United Nations side of things—that we are willing to negotiate with Communist China over the preservation of China's water power rights in North Korea.
 This statement performs, tardily, a function which should have been performed before Chinese intervention in Korea ever took place. Instead of this reassurance, all that was on the record with regard to the matter was the statement of South Korean sources to the effect that power supply to China from the Yalu River would be cut off once North Korea was conquered. What followed that, after Chinese intervention, was an unflinching suggestion that we would destroy the power dams in North Korea if the Chinese Communists did not get out. But until Acheson spoke in Washington on Wednesday, there was no public assurance that the United States did not intend to take away from China something China had possessed long before the Korean trouble.
 That this should be made clear is important, for only such a statement and such an assurance can make a real test of China's intentions. If China is intent upon the conquest of all Korea, such assurance from the United Nations will mean nothing.
 If, on the other hand, China is merely interested in the Yalu River power installations—and the conduct of Chinese troops for the past week, which has consisted of withdrawal rather than advance seems to lend at least temporary strength to that theory—then our offer to negotiate the Yalu question is necessary in order to solidify that limited Chinese Communist intention.
 It is because the offer was so necessary that it has been greeted with such relief and approval in British sources, and in the United Nations itself, where there has been some fear that the United States might never explore the chances of peace in Korea.
 Incidentally, interesting gossip which is background to the present situation is now being relayed from Washington. It is to the effect that it was Secretary of State Acheson himself who pressed for the crossing of the 38th parallel in Korea, and then for the march full up to the Manchurian border, and that he did so against the insistent advice of George F. Kennan, the erstwhile State Department adviser who is credited with having originated the policy of containment of Russia. It is, of course, a little unusual, considering the McCarthy-style attacks upon him, to think of Mr. Acheson as such an fool-hardy in his measures against Communism, but perhaps Mr. Acheson's inner weakness is that, with the election coming on, he did not dare be otherwise.
 For what chance of peace is still left, there is one thing which ought to be said again and again. It is that the situation is so ticklish and complicated, the stakes, World War III or not, so very high, that there should be only one consideration in the mind of every American, citizen or high official. We have to do exactly the right thing, in spite of complications abroad, in spite of political controversies here at home, or we are lost, and the whole world with us. And we have to do it in time. If we do not conscientiously explore what slight chance of peace

Truman No Help To Truman
 President Truman, going out to Missouri to deliver his one labeled campaign speech on the Saturday night before election, apparently could remember only the popularity of his closing campaign speeches in 1948, when the harmless lit-out of his underdog suddenly turned on his triumphant pursuers, and was applauded and used as political and colloquial language in his last ditch defiance of them.
 But this year things were different. Truman was no longer the abashed underdog. He was the sensational victor of 1948.
 Now had Truman himself been much of a campaign target, who might finally be excused if he reached for a little mud himself. There was no reason for his temper or blood to be up. In 1948 he was fighting back, against odds which seemed to be overwhelming. In 1950, he himself went on the offensive. In 1948 he had been so much abused that a few cheap cracks from him went forgiven. In 1950, he produced his cheap cracks with artificial, underdog spontaneity. And in 1950 his cracks were cheaper.
 The result was that, delivered thus and in such a campaign context, what was considered an "fighting" speech in 1948 became an insulting speech in 1950.
 The biggest and most spectacular piece of mud in a very muddy campaign was thrown in country-wide fashion by the President himself at St. Louis.
 If President Truman wants to analyze the results of the election, let him count his own speech in, heavily. It was the climax of poor faith in a campaign distinguished by poor taste.

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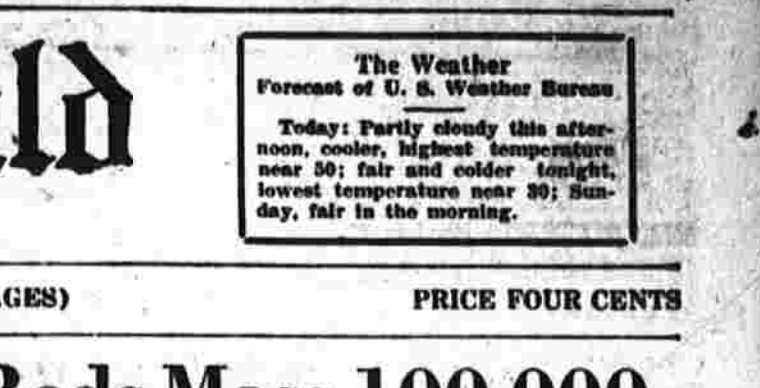
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
